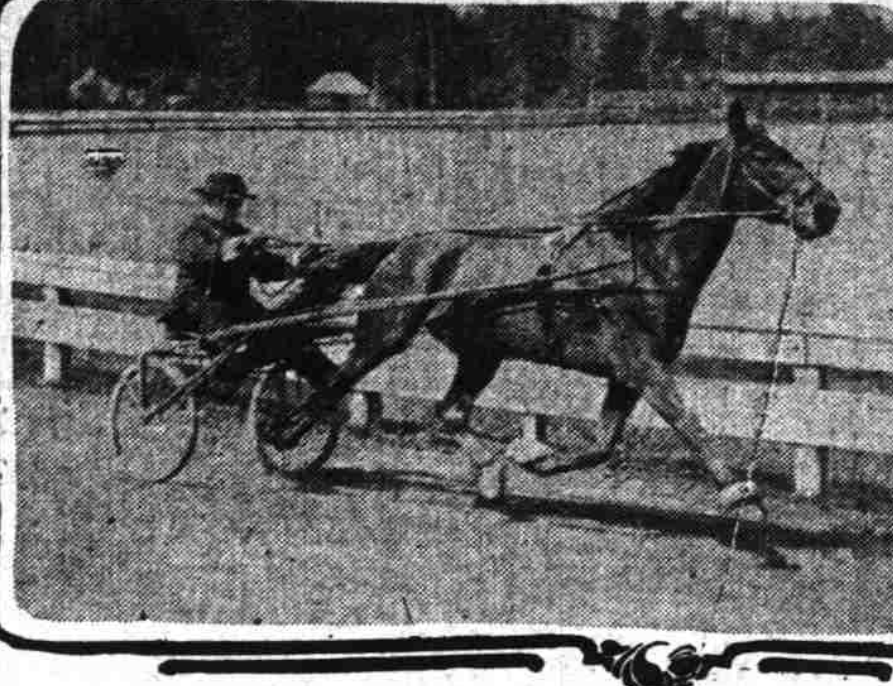

Peter O'Brien, of Portland, won the banner event in the ninth annual Pacific Coast Handicap, which came to an end last yesterday at the traps of the Portland Gun club.

The first Portlander to win the Pacific Coast title and he accomplished this feat by beating H. Ott, of Gresham, Or., in a 20 bird shoot-off.

At the close of the handicap event, O'Brien, shooting from the 19-yard line and Ott, handicapped at 16 yards, were tied for first place with the scores of 93 out of possible 100.

Don Morrison, of Portland, Or., was the high average man for the three regular events. He broke 325 out of 350 birds. F. M. Troeh was second with 322 birds.

The money winners in the handicap were P. H. O'Brien, C. Gilmore, G. C. Gregory, G. M. March, H. Whilon, L. Rayburn, W. E. Cooper, W. W. Caldwell, J. F. Dodds, M. Sledge and E. H. Wright.

Elmer E. Shaner, of the Interstate tournament, stated that the 1914 shoot was the greatest ever held on the Pacific coast. He was much pleased.

One hundred and thirty-eight shooters entered the handicap, more than the former record held by the local club. One dozen shooters appeared on the grounds too late to enter the handicap.

The next biggest shoot on the Pacific coast will be staged at Raymond, Wash., on August 17 to 21.
