

SAFE DYNAMITED BY ROBBERS WHO TAKE MONEY AND JEWELS

General Merchandise Store of Aaron Fox at Troutdale Is Entered Early Today.

OFFICERS JOIN IN CHASE

Money and Jewelry Taken Valued at More Than \$2000; Launch Used in Getting Away.

Two robbers early this morning dynamited a safe in the general merchandise store of Aaron Fox at Troutdale and escaped with \$1900 in cash and jewelry worth \$500.

The articles taken were: 140 \$1 bills, 50 \$5 gold pieces in rolls, \$25 in gold, \$500 in silver, three gold watches, a \$2.50 piece stoptoin and three diamond rings.

The thieves gained entrance into the building through a back window and left by the front door.

It is believed they escaped down the Columbia in a launch, which, with a rowboat, was missing this morning.

The thieves had a four hour start of the officers, who gave chase.

Approximately 400 worth of postage stamps left in the safe by the Troutdale postmaster were not touched.

It is believed the robbery was perpetrated by men who knew the "lay of the land" for the reason that they had secured a heavy hammer, a monkey wrench, crow bar and several steel punches from a blacksmith shop at Fairview, two miles from Troutdale.

They carried the tools from Fairview to Troutdale in a sack and left them in front of the safe.

Nitroglycerin was used to wrench the heavy iron door from its fastenings and more than enough to do the work was employed.

They operated boldly and used only a comforter to smother the sound of the explosion.

According to several persons, who heard the blast, the heavy charge of nitro was let go shortly after 2 a. m. this morning, but the robbery was not discovered until a few minutes before 6 o'clock.

As soon as he was notified, Mr. Fox, the proprietor, telephoned Sheriff Word, who, accompanied by Deputies Lundgren and Kuler, hurried to Troutdale in an automobile.

The deputies remained at Troutdale while Word went to Vancouver to ascertain whether anyone had observed a launch or rowboat on the river.

Mr. Fox said today that he had observed no suspicious looking characters around the store and said much of the money secured was in silver. Owing to the fact that there is no bank at Troutdale he had a habit of carrying several hundred dollars in the safe for business purposes.

Raymond, Wash., July 24.—The eighteenth annual meeting of the Washington State Federation of Women's Clubs came to a close in this city at 11:10 o'clock this morning, with the singing of the club song, "Blessed Be the Tie That Binds."

May Prosecute Boys

Aberdeen, Wash., July 24.—Following the killing of William Anderson on the Northern Pacific excursion train to Moclips yesterday, caused, it is alleged, through the criminal action of some boys in setting the emergency brakes, the railroad company has sent detectives here, and if the boys are located, action on a charge of manslaughter will probably be started against them.

Courteous Robbers Take Women's Coin

Southern Pacific Coaster Is Boarded by Three Masked Men, Who Refuse to Take Jewelry.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, July 24.—Three masked men boarded the rear end of the Southern Pacific southbound "Coaster" No. 22 when it stopped at Chatsworth at 9:33 o'clock last night and robbed the passengers of \$1215. One carried a shotgun and the others revolvers.

Rear brakeman C. T. Gundry was compelled to elevate his hands and precede two of the men down the train, the third standing guard at the end of the rear coach. The men made their way calmly through the coaches, gruffly and profanely commanding the men passengers to turn over their money. To the women passengers they were very courteous, but took their money. Throughout the march Gundry was kept between them and the front of the train as a shield.

The parlor car offered the most remunerative field, for 30 men were congregated there. All of these disgorged their money. Many of the women in the car, terrified, offered

their jewels, but the robbers took nothing but money. The robbers dropped from the train as it slowed down at Hewitt. Bloodhounds lost the trail on the edge of a road near the track, emphasizing the belief that the robbers escaped in an automobile.

Chinese Gamblers Caught at Medford

Police Raid Laundry and Find Devices in Operation and Money on the Table; Ten Men and a Girl.

Medford, Or., July 24.—Early this morning the Chinese laundry on Riverside avenue was raided by Medford police under the direction of S. R. Calling of the state board of pharmacy, assisted by W. K. Jeffries, Ten Chinese men and one Chinese girl were arrested while gambling and smoking opium and will be given a hearing today. The gambling devices and about \$1000 in money was taken in spite of desperate efforts on the part of Chinese to hide the cash in shoes and clothing.

New Pool for Pendleton. Pendleton, Or., July 24.—Through the action of the city council in indorsing plans for a public swimming tank

for Pendleton, work is expected to start some time next week, so that the tank will be finished before the end of the summer months. It will cost \$8000, and \$2000 of this will be furnished by the Round-Up directors, \$2000 by the city council, and \$2000 by public subscription.
