

SPEED LIMIT ISSUE CAUSES MANY TILTS; URGE ROCKPILE PLAN

Argument Between Car Owners and "Pedestrians" Becomes Heated.

MINISTER TAKES A HAND

Danger to Children Discussed—Commissioner Bigelow Would Send All Offenders to the Rockpile.

Arguments for a lower speed limit for automobiles made by those who are not owners of machines caused many tilts between car owners and non-car owners yesterday afternoon when Commissioner Brewster's proposed traffic ordinance was informally discussed by the city council. Pedestrians argued that the speed limits in any part of the city should be not more than 20 miles an hour and they had the support of representatives of several of the large taxicab companies.

C. A. Bigelow, commissioner of finance, made a strong plea for enforcement of the law, stating that the whole traffic problem could be solved, he thought, by putting lawbreakers to breaking rock.

"In my opinion," he said, "the best method of solving the whole problem is the free use of the city rockpile. If a delegation of your automobile owners would ask the proper officials to have speed maniacs and traffic law violators put on the rockpile, I believe you would get results."

"Parents are more afraid of automobiles hitting their children," said J. H. Moon, "than they are of having their children contract diseases. They have a right to be, for hardly a day goes by but some child is struck by a machine driven carelessly or at an excessive speed."

Tells of Carelessness.
Levi W. Myers told of carelessness of automobile drivers, stating that owners and drivers should be held responsible for every accident in which they are involved. He was asked by C. W. Hodson what the whole idea of driving a car passing along a woodpile and a child suddenly spring out in front of the machine.

"I wouldn't run so close to the woodpile," said Mr. Myers, "and I would drive so slowly that I would be able to stop almost immediately."

"Well, knowing you are not to be an owner of an automobile," retorted Mr. Hodson, "I would have to take your answer with a great deal of allowance."

"Haven't the children a right to live?" asked Mr. Moon. "How are they going to live up to an ordinance that keeps them off of the streets. In New York the authorities realize the children must have some place to play and are now closing the streets for certain periods of the day."

"Children are the same as irresponsible persons—they must take the consequences," replied Mr. Hodson. "That's it, take the consequences. That is the opinion of all of you automobileists," shouted Mr. Moon.

Pastor Makes Protest.
Rev. J. D. Corby, pastor of the First Universalist church, said that he would present any restrictions that would place a 25 mile limit on the side of the congested district was not excessive.

L. R. Talbot of the City Taxicab company said that the cars of his company are not allowed to go more than 20 miles an hour in any section of the city. D. F. Stuart of the Portland and Columbia Taxicab companies said that the speed of their large cars is limited to 20 miles an hour and their smaller cars to 18 miles an hour.

A. N. Stanton, representing the Meier & Frank company, stated that the speed limit for his company's cars is 18 miles an hour.

Objection was raised to the proposed provision requiring all drivers to be more than 18 years old. Commissioner Brewster announced that he would probably eliminate that provision, as the state law required all holders of licenses to be older than 18 years.

Following the discussion of other features of the measure it was decided to have Commissioner Brewster revise certain provisions and return the ordinance for final discussion.

Auto Driver Exonerated.
Walter Walla, Wash. July 28.—George Gray, a taxicab driver, who piloted the car which struck and killed Peter Romer, a barber, Sunday evening, was exonerated from blame by a coroner's jury yesterday.

The jury decided that Romer became confused while riding his bicycle toward the car and that, temporarily blinded by the headlights, he ran into the side of the taxicab. The funeral was held this afternoon.

Union Hospital for City, County Plan

County Commissioner Holman Submits Tentative Scheme—Site Will Be Investigated, It Is Explained.

At a joint meeting of the members of the city commission, county commissioners and school board, held last night, Commissioner Holman submitted a proposition looking to the erection by the city and county of a hospital for the joint use of the city and county governments.

The plan tentatively outlined by Commissioner Holman contemplates the utilization of a part of the land as a site for the hospital, which was recently donated to the medical department of the University of Oregon by the O. W. R. & N. Co. Mr. Holman asserted that Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie, dean of the college of medicine, had agreed to the proposition.

"Why should the city and county duplicate the expenditure required in building two hospitals when one such building will be ample for the use of both?" said Mr. Holman. "If such a plan is to be carried out, plans will have to be matured within the next few weeks, so that provision can be made to cover the cost in the next city and county budgets."

Dr. Alan Welch Smith of the school board approved Mr. Holman's plan and urged the city and county commissioners to adopt it without delay.

no significance except that the soldiers were changing quarters, but the public disbelieved this.

The city was intensely excited. The government issued an order prohibiting street demonstrations. Twenty-seven meetings of socialists and others were scheduled for tonight. Some anti-military feeling was manifesting itself but the general sentiment was very warlike.

Runs on the banks were increasing. They were even more strenuous in Austria than in Germany. At Prague \$8,000,000 in deposits were withdrawn in 48 hours. Several banks were closed.

The Kaiser has accepted in principle the suggestion by British Foreign Minister Sir Edward Grey for mediation on the part of England, Germany, France, and Italy in the Austro-Serbian quarrel. It was stated here today. It was expected a formal reply to Sir Edward would be made shortly.

In the meantime it was understood England and Italy were trying to insure a localization of the conflict even if they failed to prevent one entirely.

On this point the German foreign office issued the following statement to the United Press: "The outlook for localizing the conflict between Austria and Serbia appears more hopeful."

A message was received from St. Petersburg denying that a general mobilization of the Russian army had been ordered.

The bourse here was still panicky. The bank runs grew worse and representatives of the big German financial institutions were in conference.

The Kaiser has ordered the crown prince to remain at Zoppot, a seaside resort seven miles from Danzig, where the prince has been playing tennis. This was taken as an indication that his majesty feared his son, carried away by war fever, might act indiscreetly if allowed to return to Berlin, rendering a conflict certain.

The Austrian consulate and the railroad stations were packed with Austrians who live or have been visiting in Germany, leaving to join their regiments, and with their friends and members of their families bidding them good-bye.

**Immediate Action
By Congress Urged**

East Side Business Men Wire Stirring Resolutions in Behalf of Rivers and Harbors Bill.

Stirring resolutions by the East Side Business Men's club calling upon congress to act at once and pass the rivers and harbors bill have been adopted and wired to Senators Chamberlain and Lane at Washington. A paragraph of the resolution reads:

"That with the opening of the Panama canal on August 16, the organization of steamship and boat lines, on ocean and upper and lower Columbia rivers, with nearly \$2,000,000 dock development under way at Astoria, with over \$5,000,000 dock development under way and contemplated at Portland, and very much depends upon the deepening of the mouth of the Columbia and the completion of the Celilo canal."

"These Columbia river projects are not 'portals' but their completion will float hundreds of millions of annual commerce facilitated by a down-grade, water level haul from 300,000 square miles known as the Columbia river basin."

LET CHILDREN FEEL A PARTNERSHIP AT HOME A MOTHER SUGGESTS

Romps to Music, Story Telling by Firelight Are Among Attractive Things.

CARES SHOULD BE SHARED

Parents Cannot Have Too Many Reminders of Their Responsibility Is Assertion.

Parents cannot have too many reminders of their responsibility to keep their children at home by making home attractive, says Mrs. Lois P. Myers, president of the Portland Parent-Teacher association, in a letter approving the "back to the home" movement inaugurated by the public education committee of the Oregon Social Hygiene society.

"If parents stay home themselves, and permit the children to enjoy a feeling of partnership in the home, sharing not only its pleasures but to some extent its cares and difficulties, we shall restore not only the home but the family," she said.

"We should have for general family activities, for general family activities, in our home from the time the oldest child could walk an after dinner romp to music has been a constant pleasure. A six-month-old baby will sway in response to the rhythm of a stirring march and our carpets are thrashed with the marching feet of all the children in the neighborhood."

Work of Surplus Energy.
"Follow the leader," leap-frog, "acrobats," somersaults,—the roughest play becomes orderly enough, at least, for our home, when done in time to music, and after the surplus energy has been worked off, singing in which all join gives pleasure to the performance even if it is hard on the neighbors."

"In the winter evenings, story telling by the firelight has been a never-ending joy, not only to our own children, but many of the neighbors. A 'make-up' story for which each child names a character is a star attraction, each child feeling a special proprietary interest in his own hero. This I have found is enjoyed just as much by the older boys and girls as by the younger ones."

Child Should Have Room.
"Any intelligent mother who approaches herself to the task can successfully compete with any moving picture or vaudeville show in offering attractive programs. At long intervals, a visit to the circus or good vaudeville show gives inspiration for many 'home shows.' We have had shadow plays, dramas, wild animal acts, sleight of hand performances, miniature puppet shows, Punch and Judy, all done in the crudest way, but of the deepest interest to all concerned."

"Wherever possible, each child should have his own room, in which he may enjoy an hour's quiet reading if he likes. It is important to teach our children not only to stay at home, but to stay alone occasionally without feeling bored. Personally I feel that a parent can give his child no greater gift, than a real fondness for good reading. No one who enjoys a good book, will long care for cheap amusements."

Encourage Collecting.
"The most used room in our home is one which is called either the play room or the sewing room, since it unites both functions."

"Here, on shelves are toys and books and in this sanctuary the worst sort of litter may be left undisturbed, while it is an uncompleted bridge, a farm or an edition of books. Some houses may not, but all homes should have a room like that."

"We should encourage and share in collecting, so long as really interesting things are sought. In our family just now it is stamps, each child having his own album and the rivalry, bargaining and exchanging, adds much to the interest. We have collected through other attacks, minerals, coins, badges, pennants, post cards and insects—live ones, not dead ones. A small collection of these things, some toys only for a very short time, may awaken an interest which will develop later into something worth while. At any rate the parents get just as excited over each addition to the hoard as the child does, and the feeling of cooperation will be worth while, even if collection never becomes valuable. Do not let the children collect any cigarette souvenirs, however."

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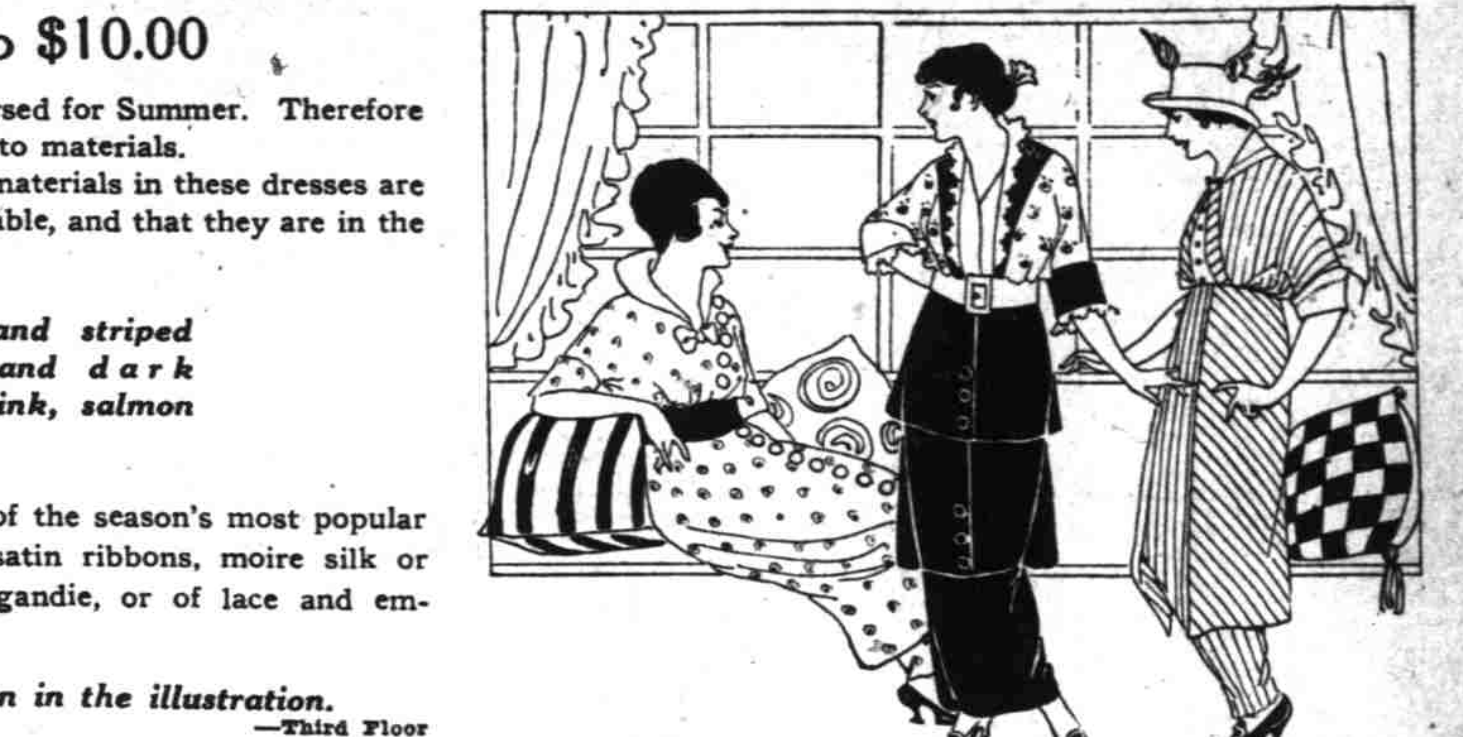
