

POOR OLD CLEVELAND--EVERY MOVE SHE MAKES IS ONE OF DESPAIR

CHAMPIONS AND OAKS PLAY 20 INNINGS AND HONORS ARE DIVIDED

Kaylor's Hit Breaks Up First Game on Rieger in Twelfth Frame.

HIG GETS A-GOING AGAIN

Big Fortlander Kicks Christian's Crew to One Run and Helps to Hat in Tally That Puts Game Away.

San Francisco, July 29.—Twenty innings of baseball were played between the Beavers and the Oaks yesterday, the first game being won by the home team in the twelfth inning, and the second by the Beavers at the end of the eighth. There was a delay in getting started and it was agreed to call the second game at the end of the seventh, but a 1 to 1 tie existed and the managers concluded to play until the tie was broken, which the Beavers accomplished in the next inning.

Rieger pitched the whole 12 innings in the first game against Prough and Ables. Oakland made one run in the first inning, when Quinlan scored on his single, Gardner's sacrifice and Zacher's single. The Oaks made two more in the fourth, when Quinlan's single scored both Guest and Alexander.

Portland scored twice in the fifth. Fisher doubled and scored on Bancroft's single, the latter taking third on Alexander's error. Dave scored on Guest's error of Speas' grounder. Lober singled and stole with two out in the sixth and scored on Fisher's single.

The Oaks won in the twelfth, when Gardner singled and went to second on a wild pitch. Middleton walked and the pair advanced on Ness' out. Kaylor singled and scored Gardner for the winning run.

Oakland took a one run lead in the first inning of the second game. Quinlan was safe on Bancroft's error and went to third on two outs, scoring on Ness' double. Portland made a run in the third, when Rodgers got one of his three hits, went to second on a sacrifice and scored on Kores' hit.

Kores walked in the eighth and Lober attempted to sacrifice, but was safe on Helling's boot. Mitze threw Kores out trying to steal third, but Hig came through with a long single to center, scoring Lober, and Bancroft brought Yantz in with the second tally.

COAST LEAGUE TO EXPAND IS LATEST RUMOR

Third Club on San Francisco Bay and One at Seattle, Is Plan.

Los Angeles, July 29.—Persistent rumors that the Pacific Coast baseball league magnates have agreed upon a plan for enlarging the league to an eight club circuit were circulated here today. The plan, it was said, provides for the installation of another club at San Francisco and one at Seattle.

Arguments have been advanced that the million or more people around San Francisco bay would support three clubs as easily as two, thus giving San Francisco continuous baseball, and at the same time permitting the Oakland club to play all its home games in Oakland, a condition that the Oakland fans have long desired.

No date, it was said, has been fixed for the prospective change, but it was predicted that the move would be made within two years.

VEAN GREGG TRADED BY CLEVELAND NAPS TO BOSTON RED SOX

Star Southpaw, Former Portland Star, Unable to Agree With Birmingham.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 29.—Veau Gregg, the star southpaw of the Cleveland American league club, formerly a member of the Portland Coast league club, has been traded to the Boston Red Sox, it was announced last night. In return Cleveland gets from Boston Pitchers Combe and A. Rankin Johnson and Catcher Ben Egan.

Friction between Gregg and Manager Birmingham of the Naps was said to be responsible for the deal. Since joining the Cleveland club four seasons ago Gregg has won 72 games and lost 38, a good average of .667.

The trading of Veau Gregg, the greatest southpaw ever turned out of the Pacific Coast league, is just another chapter in the stormy career of Joe Birmingham as manager of the Cleveland Naps. Birmingham, who made a great finish last season, has proved to be a poor manager and his judgment of ball players has been weak.

This paper printed an interview with Buddy Ryan last winter, in which the Beaver outfielder predicted that Birmingham would be a colossal failure as a manager and he doubted if Birny would finish out the season as leader of the Naps. Ryan, a 300 hitter for the Naps, was turned loose by Birmingham in order that the latter might play regularly. Buddy charged.

His first blunder was in trying to place Larry Laine on the bench and use him solely as a pinchhitter. This drew a call down indirectly from President Ban Johnson. Blunder No. 2 was the trading of Roger Peckinbaugh, also a former Portland shortstop, to the New York Americans, with which he has developed into a cracking good infielder as a regular.

With the trading of Gregg, the fans are wondering what next. The addition of Gregg means that Boston stands a good chance of finishing close to the top of the American league pennant.
