

INTEREST OF COMMON SCHOOL FUND TO BE APPORTIONED BY KAY

Fund for 1914 Totals \$373,490.95, Is Divided Among Counties on Basis.

MULTNOMAH'S, \$91,883.95

Although More Children of School Age Are Reported, Individual Apportionment Increases 2 Cents.

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.)
Salem, Or., July 30.—State Treasurer Kay announced today that the 1914 apportionment of the interest of the common school fund by counties is as follows:

Baker, \$10,920.55; Benton, \$725.85; Clackamas, \$21,472.95; Clatsop, \$850.49; Columbia, \$711.35; Cook, \$12,356.15; Crook, \$663.70; Curry, \$1539.20; Douglas, \$12,356.25; Gilliam, \$2075.70; Grant, \$522.40; Harney, \$2290.30; Hood River, \$5718.60; Jackson, \$12,591.10; Josephine, \$1238.20; Klamath, \$4711.95; Lake, \$2908.20; Lane, \$22,172.25; Lincoln, \$391.75; Linn, \$15,564.05; Malheur, \$3574.05; Marion, \$25,097.10; Morrow, \$2645.50; Multnomah, \$91,883.95; Polk, \$9401.70; Sherman, \$1831.50; Tillamook, \$3755.50; Umatilla, \$13,314.55; Union, \$10,150.95; Walla Walla, \$5581.45; Wasco, \$7346.30; Washington, \$15,310.79; Wheeler, \$1672.40; Yamhill, \$13,314.45.

The apportionment reaches a total of \$373,490.95, based on a school population of 301,587, an increase of 4777 over last year. The fund is also larger so the apportionment per pupil is \$1.85, compared with \$1.82 in 1913.

School Attendance Shows Big Increase

Salem, Or., July 30.—School census reports from Wheeler, Washington, Union and Umatilla counties were made public today and in each an increase in the number of children of school age is noted.

The following are the increases in 1914 over 1913: Wheeler, 862 to 904; Washington, 8098 to 8222; Union, 5443 to 5487; Umatilla, 7081 to 7143.

Washington increased the average salary of male teachers from \$70.01 to \$85, and female teachers from \$58.19 to \$60. Wheeler increased the salary of males from \$81.32 to \$96.44 and decreased the female wage from \$60.61 to \$57.25, while Umatilla turned it the other way by decreasing the stipend of males from \$104.44 to \$101.07 and increasing that of the females from \$69.30 to \$73.70. Union increased the salary of males \$25.03 to \$26.07 and females \$21.70 to \$22.19.

Enrollment increases were shown as follows: Wheeler, 633 to 712; Washington, 5208 to 5015, and Union, 4603 to 4675, while Umatilla fell from 4735 to 4636.

Would give \$50 for some poison oak salve, but there is nothing available.

Eats Some Grass.
Remembering that dogs eat grass when they are sick I browsed a while and the grass being a good emetic I soon recovered, though considerably the worse for wear.

Blundering onto a cave, just as it was growing dusk, and after investigating and finding no snakes or hornets, I concluded to leave it while I am doing this nature stunt, so after gathering plenty of leaves and moss decided to go to bed.

This has surely been a strenuous day, and I find that I have not made any great success in conquering nature as yet.

Have several stone bruises on my feet, my back is blistered, am covered with mosquito bites, one side of my head is swollen up from my experience with the hornets, my legs are a sight from poison oak and I am so empty that I can feel my backbone through my stomach.

Well, better luck tomorrow. Old Adam made a good job of it with my inherited instincts I should have a better chance than he had, especially as I am not handicapped with a woman.

If I live through the experience of tomorrow will send the second installment of this harrowing tale.

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SEN. CHAMBERLAIN AND DR. SMITH INDORSED BY BAKER DEMOCRATS

Vigorous Resolutions Declare No Chances Should Be Taken in Choice.

"RECORD GOOD AS BEST"

Democracy's Candidate for Governor Declared to Be Man Who Will Enforce Laws to the Letter.

Emphatic indorsement of United States Senator George E. Chamberlain for reelection, and of Dr. C. J. "We most heartily indorse George E. Chamberlain for reelection to the United States senate," declare the resolutions. Surveying for the work was done by Jack Martin, who is serving a term for manslaughter. Martin was formerly a lieutenant in the regular army and won medals for bravery.

The building is up to the second floor, and Kay believes it will be completed and ready for occupancy by October 1.
