

BOY HUSBAND KILLED BY FATHER OF BRIDE; IGNORANT OF WEDDING

Six Days After Ceremony
W. Cleary, of Haverstraw,
N. Y., Shoots Youth.

WIDOW MAY SAVE FATHER

He Shot, He Claims, Believing His
Daughter Had Been Wronged By
18 Year Old Eugene Neuman.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Haverstraw, N. Y., July 29.—
Widowed six days after her marriage
by the act of her father, 20 year old
Mrs. Eugene Neuman faces the alterna-
tive of seeing her parent—the slayer
of her husband—go to the electric
chair unless she comes forward with
a statement that her 18 year old hus-
band wronged her before her marriage.
All Haverstraw is waiting to see
what the girl widow will do. William
V. Cleary, her father, was political
boss of this little town and has scores
of friends.

Stricken with grief, both over the
killing of her boy husband, who had
been her childhood sweetheart and the
arrest of her father for the crime, Mrs.
Neuman, prostrated in her home, gives
no inkling of what her attitude
will be. She is known to have ex-
pressed anger when she first heard
that her father had declared "I killed
him because I thought he had wronged
my daughter."

Girl Sees No Friends.

The girl is believed to be fighting
out the battle alone, whether she
should preserve her honor and see her
father die or admit that she had been
wronged, and save her parent. She
refuses to see persons who have been
her closest friends.

That the girl's father will plead
"emotional insanity" seemed certain
today. He talked for the first time
declaring he had been driven half in-
sane over the belief that young Neu-
man had betrayed his daughter. He
took to drink and claims he was ir-
responsible when young Neuman came
to his office. The slayer professes
not to have heard Neuman say a word
when he came to tell him he had mar-
ried his daughter.

Frederic Neuman, Haverstraw pub-
lisher and father of the slain youth,
who has been a life long friend of
Cleary, declared tonight he does not
want Cleary to suffer capital punish-
ment for his crime.

Had His "Badge of Honor."

"I want to see him punished for the
murder of my son, but I do not want
him to be sent to the electric chair,"
he said. "That can't bring my boy
back to me. I think that Bill did
wrong to kill my boy. Gene was right
and had his badge of honor—a mar-
riage certificate—in his pocket. Bill
should have heard him and then there
would have been no murder."

Pacing up and down in his cell
Cleary had jail officials worried to-
night. They feared he might attempt
suicide. Even his suspenders have
been taken away from him, the guards
fearing an attempt to hang himself
with them.

Following a visit paid to him by a
physician five days before the mur-
der, Cleary is alleged to have been
looking for young Neuman. The boy
husband, it is declared had been to
see the physician accompanied by the
daughter and it is said the latter
visit to Cleary resulted from what
young Neuman told him.

Water Company to Complete Pipe Line

Coos Bay Organization Must Finish
Extensions at Marshfield and Bend
in 40 Days.

Salem, Or., July 30.—The State Rail-
road commission has ordered the
Coos Bay Water company to complete
its pipe line extensions at Marshfield
and Bend within 40 days and its reser-
voir within 60 days.

Several months ago the commission
made an order in the cases brought by
Marshfield and Bend against the Water
company directing that a reservoir,
with a capacity of 1,500,000 gallons,
be erected, and certain pipe lines be
built and fixing water rates.

The company asked for a rehearing,
declaring the rates were too low, and
also for an extension of time to make
the improvements. The rate matter
is under consideration.

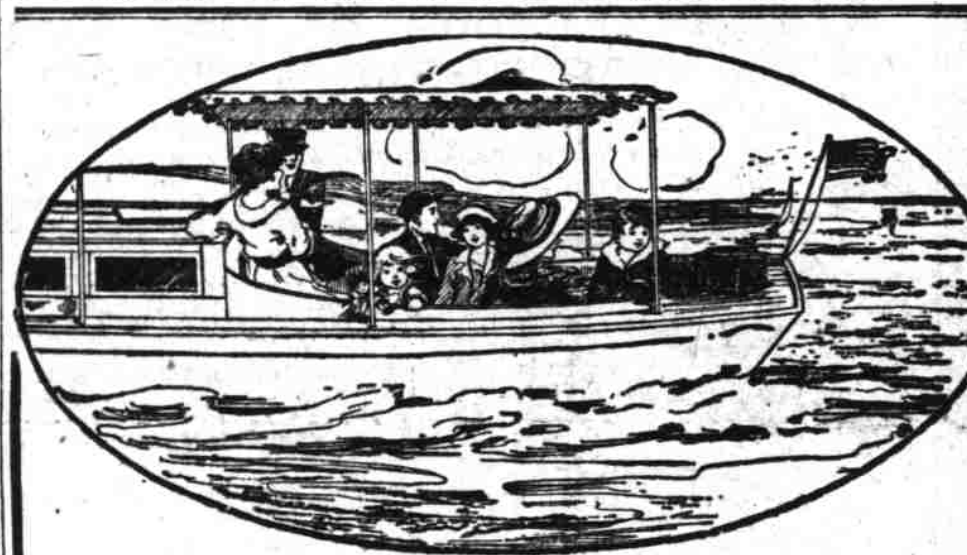

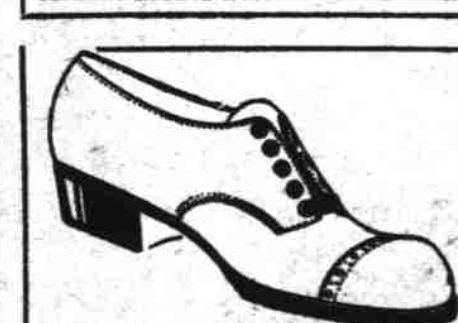
