

MARSELAISE RINGS OUT ON N. Y.'S HARBOR

As La Lorraine Sails With 1200 French-American Reservists to Join the Army Thousands Sing.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Aug. 5.—The liner La Lorraine carrying 1200 French reservists sailed today for France. Father Paul Renaud of New York was among the reservists.

Thousands of relatives and friends, mostly women and children, were at the dock to say good-bye. The women wept and moaned while the reservists stood on the deck, crying and praying.

Friends at the dock and the reservists on board joined in singing the Marseillaise as La Lorraine left the pier.

The demonstration as La Lorraine sailed was the most stirring seen in New York harbor in years. British, French and American liners tooted their whistles. The German liner Vaterland was silent, the reservists shouting in preparation at the sailors aboard as La Lorraine steamed past her dock.

Everyone on board La Lorraine carried either an American or a French flag.

Lusitania Carries Gold.

The Lusitania sailed from this port at 1 a. m. today, carrying 200 passengers and a cargo which included \$200,000 in gold. Captain Dow was confident that the liner would reach England in safety.

Lieutenant John Cyril Porte, royal navy, who was to have attempted to fly the Atlantic in a hydro-aeroplane next month, sailed on the Lusitania to fight for England in the European war.

The British cruiser Essex, which conveyed the liner Olympic into New York last night, is returning to the Lusitania on the voyage to England. When the liner sailed it carried only masts, head, port and starboard lights. All portholes were blanketed by canvas.

Wireless advices received here indicate that three British cruisers and three German cruisers are patrolling the waters off New York.

Firing Off Sandy Hook.

The liner Vaterland was believed today to be preparing to run the gauntlet of British and French cruisers with 2000 German and Austrian reservists. Local officials of the Hamburg-American line denied the vessel was preparing to sail.

Passengers arriving here today on the steamships President Lincoln and Kaiser Wilhelm said they heard firing off Sandy Hook at 3 o'clock this morning.

Foreign Reservists Can Sail.

San Francisco, Aug. 5.—The neutrality proclamation issued yesterday by the American government will not prevent foreign reservists returning to the old countries. Notification to this effect was received here today from Washington.

There has been much speculation on this point, and reservists of all countries who have been arriving on the Atlantic seaboard during the past week have not been sure whether they would be allowed to leave for their native land or not.

Washington officials decided that neutrality laws do not apply to cases of this kind, unless such expeditions of individuals are "entitled or organized" in this country for service in a foreign country with which this nation is at peace. It was held that reservists are already "entitled" abroad, in that they are subject to military duty in their native land and have certain rank in either the naval or military establishments of their country.

Claim Boy Confessed.

George Potts, a boy, is said by detectives to have confessed to them that he stole 17 suits of clothes from a cleaning and dyeing establishment on the Sandy road, owned by Olaf & Heck. He has promised to bring the clothes back from Hillsboro. The boy was arrested this morning.

Advance Made in Prices of Sugar

Wholesale Prices Go Up 20 Cents on Each Sack; Other "War" Prices Are Soaring, Too.

Portland housewives are directly affected by the European war now being waged. The price of sugar was this morning advanced 20c per sack wholesale and there is a corresponding advance in the retail price.

The meat market is being held firm and higher prices are being made for already there has been quite an advance quoted in canned meats. Coffee prices are being boosted all over the country and efforts are being made to force them higher here. If the war continues for an extended period it will stop foreigners from sending their butter, eggs and cheese to this market and therefore force higher prices for the home product.

Sharp advances are being made in the price of all shipping materials as a result of the demoralization of the shipping industry.

CARRANZA THREATENS TO ATTACK CAPITAL IF NOT SURRENDERED

Generals of Federal Army Plan to Evacuate City and Retreat Southward.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Mexico City, Aug. 5.—Whether to fight or to evacuate the city was expected to be determined late today at a meeting of 112 generals of the Mexican federal army. A mass meeting of business men also has been called by Provisional President Carranza to learn their feelings regarding the matter. The business men were told that Carranza had demanded the unconditional surrender of the capital and had served notice that failure to comply with his demand would result in the city being taken by assault.

The 112 generals, constituting the council of war, were in conference until a late hour last night. After the meeting this statement was issued:

"It was the unanimous sentiment of the generals last night that in case of joint action by constitutionalists and the American and Mexican federals should evacuate Mexico City, and, retreating southward, establish the present government in a city yet to be selected, thereby preserving the honor of the army. In case the capital was assaulted by constitutionalists alone, the federals are resolved to resist and employ the force of 40,000 men now available."

President's Wife Is Alarmingly Ill

Washington, Aug. 5.—It was admitted at the White House this afternoon that Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, wife of the president, had been suffering from nervous prostration for two months and that her condition was worse today.

Jessie Sayre and Miss Margaret Wilson were summoned to their mother's bedside this afternoon.

President Wilson appears strained as a result of Mrs. Wilson's illness. At his wife's bedside last night he examined state department documents and decided he could offer to mediate the European troubles.

Mrs. Wilson's condition is causing her friends much apprehension.

\$2,400,000 for Banks of Oregon

MAY ASK PERMISSION FOR RESERVISTS TO PASS THROUGH CANAL

Thousands Want to Return to Foreign Lands and the Problem Is Serious One.

CHARTERED BOATS URGED

United States May Be Called On to Allow These Vessels to Use Canal When It Is Opened.

With the problem of transporting their reservists home from America facing all the European governments that have issued calls, rumors were current in Portland this morning that a request will be made upon the United States government to permit the passage of chartered vessels carrying reservists through the Panama canal.

Some thousands of reservists are residents of the Pacific coast, and it is felt that routing by way of the canal would be a cheaper and more expeditious method of getting the men home.

Ireland, to preserve her neutrality, is the latest European country to issue a call for reservists to return to assist in the defense of their native land.

Call Is Received.

The call was received in Portland last night by Vice Consul J. W. Matthews from H. A. Van Coena Torchianna, consul general for the Netherlands at San Francisco.

The message states that all the Dutch forces are being mobilized and that all Netherlands belonging to the militia, or landwehr, have been called to the colors. They are requested to report at the consulate here in Portland, 222 Failing building, at once.

Volunteers are requested to register their names and addresses with the consul. Reservists will be routed to New York, where they will report to the Dutch consulate in that city. It is said money will be advanced to those who cannot pay their train fare to New York.

No further calls have been received at any of the other consulates in the city, although reservists and volunteers are coming in in considerable numbers.

At the offices of Woerdie & Haas, who represent the Austro-Hungarian consulate at San Francisco in this city, it was stated this afternoon that a number of medical students who are not Austrians have volunteered their services in the field. Their profilers will not be accepted, for the present at least.

There are some 6000 or 7000 Austrians on the Pacific coast, 2000 of whom live in Oregon, and 2000 of this number are in Portland.

Some 75 reservists reported to the German consul, Fritz Kirchhoff, yesterday.

No call has been issued as yet by Great Britain save for members of royal navy reserve, although there are doubtless a large number of Britons in this country who are willing to go to duty. The consulate here in Portland, for the present at least, is leaving the departure of British ships from this port to the discretion of the ship's owners.

While a number of French reservists have reported to Consul C. Henri Labbe, no call has been received as yet for Belgian reservists. Mr. Labbe is vice consul for Belgium.

In response to a request from Woerdie & Haas to release Austrian reservists on the city rockpiles they might go back home, Mayor Albion found, on investigation this morning, that there were no Austrians at either institution.

U. S. OFFERS SERVICES TO BRING PEACE

the plight of the American tourists was serious.

Following a conference at the White House, Secretary of War Garrison announced that all Americans would be brought home. If food supplies became low, he said, American transports will take supplies to United States citizens. The present plan is to take Americans to neutral territory, possibly Spain or Italy, or obtain a neutral port for exit. The house passed today the bill providing an appropriation of \$2,500,000 for the relief of Americans stranded in Europe because of the war.

May Use Pacific Ships.

Secretary of War Garrison was investigating the availability of ships on the Great Lakes and the Pacific for bringing home Americans stranded in Europe by the war. Vessels brought for this purpose from the Pacific, he said, would come by way of the Panama canal.

Official notification of the fact that Great Britain and Germany are at war was conveyed to Secretary of State Bryan today by British Charge d'Affaires Barclay. He asked that the United States ambassador in Berlin represent England during the interruption of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

Temporary arrangements for at least one mail each week to Europe were completed today by Postmaster General Burleson. Ships flying the Italian, Dutch, Norwegian or Swedish flags, it was announced, will be available at times to carry the Atlantic mails.

At Belgium's request, the international money order service between the United States and Belgium was suspended yesterday.

Sons of Dr. Nunn Drown in Columbia

Joshua and Jack Nunn, sons of Dr. and Mrs. Richard Nunn, 777 Flanders street, were drowned in the Columbia river this afternoon, according to a brief dispatch received here from Professor Arthur Evans Wood of Reed college.

The boys, with their brother, Richard, were members of the Recreation league camp, at Moffett, near Cascade Locks, on the Washington side, where they have been for about three weeks, in charge of Professor Wood.

Joshua was aged 13 and Jack was aged 3. Richard is aged 11. Details were not given in the dispatch, but it appears that all of the boys had fallen into the water and that Richard was saved.

The parents are prostrated with grief.

Late Bulletins

SUBMARINES SLIP AWAY.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 5.—Under cover of darkness and attended with the utmost secrecy, two submarines recently built at Seattle for the Chilean government and later rejected, left this port last night under their own steam. It is reported on good authority that the submarines had been sold to the Canadian government and were at once rushed to protect the Canadian Pacific coast line.

AMEMBASSADOR STILL IN PARIS.

Paris, Aug. 5.—The Austrian ambassador was still in Paris today. Paris newspapers voiced protests against his remaining in France, but he would not say when he would leave. The government appealed today to all men exempted from duty in the army to volunteer for farm service.

APACHE LEADERS TO BE SHOT.

Paris, Aug. 5.—Four hundred and fifty Apaches were arrested here today for looting. It was announced that the looters will be shot in the future.

Jack Johnson, the American negro heavyweight pugilist, has offered his six automobiles to the government for military use. He also declared that he wanted to enlist in the French army.

Paris was celebrating the French naval victory in the Mediterranean with wild joy.

GERMANY DEMANDS ITALY'S HELP

Rome, Aug. 5.—Official notification from Berlin was received here today that Great Britain and France were attacking Germany.

Italy was called on to lend aid to the Germans.

Heritho Germany has asked for Italian help. Now it is demanded. The cabinet was considering the matter. It was believed its decision would be to remain neutral.

The Italians do not consider that Germany has been attacked. They hold the Germans themselves are the aggressors. The triple alliance only requires the powers concerned to help one another in defensive campaigns.

Leaders of the anti-military element were watching the government closely, in readiness to tie the country up by a general strike if it showed any signs of allying itself with Germany.

GERMANS SHOOT 17 ALSATIANS.

Paris, Aug. 5.—Seventeen Alsatians who were endeavoring to enter France near Mulhausen to join the army of the Tricolor were captured by German troops today and shot.

The citizens of Alsace, as well as of Lorraine, being largely French, sympathize with France against Germany.

The provinces having been German possessions since the Franco-Prussian war, however, the Germans look on them as traitors when they seek to join the Gallic forces.

DID NOT SIGHT ENEMY.

San Pedro, Aug. 5.—The British tank steamer De Bahia arrived here today from Antofagasta without sighting the German cruisers supposed to be off the west Mexican coast. She will remain here indefinitely.

LINER HELD AT LIVERPOOL.

Liverpool, Aug. 5.—The liner Lusitania, scheduled to leave this port today for Canada, did not sail. It was expected that British warships will be rushed across the Atlantic to engage German fighting vessels and protect the Canadian coast.

BOY SCOUTS OFFERED.

London, Aug. 5.—General Baden-Powell, head of the Boy Scout movement, today offered the war office the services of 1000 Boy Scouts, who had volunteered to carry dispatches, protect wires, guard bridges and do other similar work.

Mobilization in Greece.

Athens, Aug. 5.—Greek army and navy officers were ordered today to report to their commands immediately in connection with mobilization of the country's land and sea forces.

RUSSIAN CAVALRY DEFEATED.

Amsterdam, Aug. 5.—A repulse by Germans of the Russian cavalry at Solda was officially announced here today. It was reported that the Russian losses were very heavy.

GERMAN CABLE IN CUE.

New York, Aug. 5.—The German cable company's officials here were announced today that they were unable to communicate with the Azores. It was believed the British had cut their cable.

This put an end to direct communication between the United States and Germany.

GOVERNMENT ORDERS CATALOGUE MADE OF COASTWISE TONNAGE

Collector at Frisco to Ascertain Craft Available for Commerce on High Seas.

EVEN DOZEN IS ESTIMATE

Out of 125 Vessels It Is Believed That Not More Than 12 Would Be Serviceable.

San Francisco, Aug. 5.—Collector J. O. Davis of this port received instructions today from Washington to catalogue the tonnage of all vessels engaged in coastwise traffic and communicate with the owners to ascertain which ones would be available for commerce on the high seas should ships of other flags be forced to desert the oceans.

It is estimated that there are 125 vessels of this character, out of which it is said no more than 12 would be available.

The instructions from Washington apparently indicate that such ships will be used only for freight traffic, and not to bring Americans from the war zone.

The naval officials at Mare Island have received no instructions as far as can be ascertained to have war vessels ready for bringing home Americans now in Europe.

There are available on this coast two ships at Honolulu, four on the Mexican coast and four constituting the Pacific reserve fleet at Bremerton.

BELGIANS DEFEAT GERMAN ARMY OF INVASION; BIG LOSS

with the French in the vicinity of Longwy, apparently were not making a vigorous attempt to advance until they were stopped by the army now held in check.

Around Belfort, La Fux and Mars la Tour the Germans were harassing the countryside by commandeering horses, cattle and provisions, but were making no advance. One force which attacked Belfort met with a severe reverse and lost many in killed, wounded and prisoners.

Business throughout France was prostrated. Paris was half deserted. Most stores were closed. There was no one to open them, the proprietors and their assistants having gone to war. Most of the shops where provisions are sold were open but women were in charge of them.

There was practically no street traffic. A few cars were running, but their number had been reduced by three fourths. Car life had almost ceased.

Warm appreciation was expressed on all sides at Italy's preservation of a neutral attitude. This had hardly been expected. It was admitted that, had Italian troops attempted an invasion from the northeast, the difficulties of defending the country's frontier would have been enormously increased.

GERMANY IS NOW ISOLATED.

New York, Aug. 5.—Germany was isolated today, according to the cable companies. London ordered the Western Union Telegraph company to reject all business offered by nations at war with England.

BRITISH TRAMP SHIPS FOR.

New York, Aug. 5.—The St. Bonian, a British freight vessel, returned to this port today after venturing 60 miles out to sea. The captain reported that he sighted a warship last night.

WILLIAMS QUITS COMMITTEE.

Washington, Aug. 5.—Sitting in the senate this afternoon to a question of personal privilege, Senator Williams announced the refusal of the foreign relations committee to report out a resolution recommending that the United States attempt to arbitrate the European war. He resigned from the committee and left the senate chamber.

German Steamer Captured.

London, Aug. 5.—Capture by British cruisers of the German steamship Wilhelm off Newfoundland was reported here today.

Attempt to Evade Responsibility Fails

Street in Bad Condition; Mayor Commissioner Dieck Reports Davis Suggests Street Be Closed.

Robert G. Dieck, commissioner of public works, failed in his effort this morning to get out from under the responsibility for the condition of Davis street between Front and Second streets.

An attempt to improve the street had been forestalled by a big remonstrance against the improvement, so Commissioner Dieck reported to the council that the street was in very bad condition, and that if an accident should occur there the city would be liable for damages. He submitted his statement without any recommendation.

"Is the purpose of your statement, then, to get out from under responsibility?" demanded the mayor.

Commissioner Dieck admitted that it was, as he said the city attorney had advised him that a city official might be held personally liable for damages for injuries sustained under such conditions.

It was decided to refer the matter back to Commissioner Dieck with a request that he make some recommendation.

The proposed amended traffic ordinance, which was scheduled to come up today, was not given detailed consideration. The council will take it up for consideration at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon of next week.

The ordinance regulating the speed and course of motorboats, and imposing penalties for motorboat operators who endanger the occupants of canoes or rowboats, was passed this morning.

To Discuss Plan of Temperance Fight

New League to Meet at Luncheon in Opposition to Statewide Prohibition Tomorrow Noon.

Plans for continuing its fight for temperance as opposed to prohibition, will be discussed by the newly organized Taxpayers' and Wage Earners' league at a luncheon at the Portland hotel tomorrow noon. Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway, president of the league, will preside. Mrs. Cora Talbot is secretary. The league now has a membership exceeding 150, including both men and women.

Manchester, Eng., Aug. 5.—The German steamship Dryad was seized today by the British naval authorities here. Its crew of 17 was arrested.

GERMAN FLEET SINKS BRITISH MINE-LAYING SHIP; CONSORT FLEES

Twenty German Vessels in British Ports Are Seized by Naval Authorities.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
London, Aug. 5.—The admiralty officially confirmed today reports that the German fleet sank a British mine laying ship Tuesday. The destroyer Pathfinder, which accompanied it, narrowly escaped owing to its superior speed.

About 20 German vessels were seized at British ports. A French gunboat arrived at Guernsey with an undamaged Transatlantic liner as a prize.

No German Ships Sunk.

London, Aug. 5.—The British admiralty officially denied this afternoon the report of the sinking of any German ships yet by the British fighting fleet.

Hull Hears Big Guns.

London, Aug. 5.—Sea firing was heard at Hull at dawn today. It was believed British and German scoutships were engaged.

Experts thought the main German fleet was near the mouth of the River Elbe.

From Margate came a report that firing was heard off that port.

Battle in North Sea.

London, Aug. 5.—A naval battle in the North Sea was reported in an edition of the Standard today, but it was stated that it "was not of decisive importance."

The French embassy here announced the capture by the French war fleet of another German cruiser.

It was believed also that a German scout cruiser in the North Sea had been taken.

German Steamship Seized.

Manchester, Eng., Aug. 5.—The German steamship Dryad was seized today by the British naval authorities here. Its crew of 17 was arrested.

Suspects Are Arrested.
