FOREIGN FASHIONS FOR AMERICANS

All sorts of dainty vests are in vogue.

Paris, July 23.—It is quite possible to glorify a blouse you are not particularly fond of by means of such cunning devices as the little vest arrangement illustrated here. This one is really not much more than a pair of jumper straps run over the shoulders and broadened below the bust, simulating the lines of a vest. The two pointed tabs extending below the belt complete the effect.

It is made of a stenciled chiffon backed with white net to give it body, and is put on over the blouse. In back the straps do not broaden out as in front, but are kept narrow and cross over each other at the center. The blouses that such little vests are worn with must be of sheer batiste or net, or the desired effect will be lost.

Satin velvet and plain or flowered taffetas are other popular materials to make up the vests in and in any color desired.

With its customary inconstancy, fashion suggests turning about this idea of the silk or chiffon vest with the net or lace blouse and fashions a vest of net or lace to wear with the silk blouse. No doubt the idea will be played up in many interesting ways before the summer is over, for it certainly has desirable possibilities, and by being well supplied with all such dainty trifles one can almost establish a reputation for being exceptionally well dressed this season.
