

GERMAN ARMY IS HELD BACK IN HOT BATTLE

Severe Fighting Marks the Struggle to Prevent Invaders From Reaching France; Expect Further Encounter.

(United Press Special Wire.) Paris, Aug. 12.—That the French had checked the Germans at Longwy was announced here today.

It was said there was severe fighting. It was at and in the vicinity of Longwy that the German army of the Moselle attempted to invade France, striking at a gap north of Verdun on the Gallic frontier fortifications.

Further fighting about Longwy, Longwy, Stenay and Spincourt was looked for.

The Germans were reported in great strength, with cavalry raiders screening their entire front. It was said to be believed at the war office that this attack, however, was designed to divert attention from the German movement through Belgium in the direction of Lille.

Concerning developments in Alsace there was considerable uncertainty. The official version was that the French troops who invaded the province were entrenched south of Mulhouse, withstanding a fierce German attack.

The Germans, it was said, were using their new Krupp guns of tremendous range. The French artillery was declared to be extremely effective, also, and the brilliancy of the French cavalry charges was especially commended.

WAR—FOR WHAT?



Labor Organization Is Urged by Editor

E. B. Ault Tells Federal Commission on Industrial Relations That Laws Offer No Real Solution.

Seattle, Aug. 12.—"Labor laws! They help some. But they offer no real solution. The remedy is labor organization," said E. B. Ault, editor of the Union Record, testifying before the federal commission on industrial relations this morning.

"There never has been a labor law that was enforced where there was not the sufficient labor organization to enforce it," he said, "even where the public officers were willing to do what they could. The eight hour law for women in this state is constantly violated in the industries where the girls are not well organized. It cannot be enforced because the girls will not testify against their employers and you cannot blame them for not wanting to lose their jobs."

Judge Brown, president of the International Union of Timber Workers, branded the conditions in the lumber industry as the "worst in the country." He told of companies keeping up a system of hiring and discharging men constantly, orders being placed with employment agencies to keep them supplied with as many men as possible, so that organization among the employees might be prevented.

Wages to common laborers in this industry are \$1.50 a day, he said, from which the laborer must pay the company a hospital fee and railroad transportation.

No War Telegrams Delivered to Wilson

President Exhausted From Bereavement Ordeal—Due Back in Washington This Evening.

On Board Presidential Special Train, Lynchburg, Va., Aug. 12.—Exhausted by the ordeal through which he has just passed, President Wilson, returning to Washington from his wife's burial at Rome, Ga., slept for 11 hours last night. He was given a sedative last evening by Dr. Carey T. Grayson, and slept soundly until late this morning.

No war telegrams were delivered to the president. He spent most of the day on the observation platform. The special train was due in Washington at 5 o'clock this evening.

Japanese Cruiser to San Diego.

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 12.—The Japanese cruiser Idzuma is reported to be coming here to coal from Mazatlan, Mexico, which port she left two days ago. The United States torpedo boats Halsey and Hull are on their way to San Francisco from southern waters.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the family residence, 104 East Twelfth street, for Mrs. Louisa Partlow, widow of James M. Partlow, who died Tuesday. Interment will be in Lone Fir cemetery. Mrs. Partlow was 77 years old.

All Communication With Berlin Cut Off

Cable May Be Cut on Route Open Until Now by Way of Copenhagen Is Reported at Washington.

Washington, Aug. 12.—Communication with Berlin via Copenhagen suddenly ceased today. It was not known definitely whether the cable had been cut.

Early Day Relics Are on Display

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 12.—With a view to advertising the Columbia river interstate fair, which is to be held in Vancouver on September 7-12, and to stimulate interest among the people of this city in the things which had considerable to do with making the early history of Vancouver, the Portland Music House has taken a number of relics from the collection of Mrs. Elizabeth Funk and made a display of the same in their windows.

In the collection are the following: A hand carved bed 100 years old; an earthenware pitcher of the Hudson Bay company; a walnut table brought around the Horn by Lieutenant De Hart; an old bronze statue; a silver fruit basket of the Hudson Bay company; a work basket, which Mrs. Funk had used constantly for 40 years, and a Spanish chair brought from the Philippines to Vancouver, when this place was but a fort.

Little, a driver for the Tip Top Bakery in Portland, was arrested yesterday after he had arrived in the city with a wagonload of bread, which he had intended to dispose of to local merchants. The charge placed against him was that of violating the peddler's ordinance, and his case was continued until Saturday. Little said that he had intended to secure a license, and that he had not much more than gotten off the ferry than he was arrested, not having had time to take out his license.

Oakland, Cal., Aug. 12.—An unidentified young woman, registering at the Hotel Menlo here as "Mrs. John Dunlap, Salem, Or.," sought death time and again late yesterday in the maze of Oakland's street traffic and then despairing of killing herself by that means, retired to her room in the hotel, drank iodine and is now dying.

For more than three hours yesterday "Mrs. Dunlap" played with death before street cars and automobiles, walking directly in their path time and again.

The woman is a handsome blonde, about 33 years old.

FIGHTING IS SEVERE AND LOSSES HEAVY IN GERMAN REPULSE

Attack Is Renewed on Liege Forts, Big Guns Pounding Them Hard.

Brussels, Aug. 12.—Announcement that a German general advance through Belgium had been repulsed was accompanied by the statement from the war office here tonight that the fighting was severe and the losses heavy.

The Germans, it was added, had renewed their attack on the Liege forts and were pounding them hard.

The Belgian fire was declared to be hampering the Germans greatly in their efforts to cross the River Meuse. The Germans were said to be using a horde of peasants in attempts to open the roads from Liege toward Luxembourg.

The war office conjectured that the attack on the Belgian center was through Luxembourg into France.

An earlier unconfirmed report that they were operating near Givet strengthened this belief.
