Our canton had belonged to the Habsburgs up to 1707, when it was taken by Prussia and became a Prussian province. In 1831 a revolution occurred to secure complete independence from Prussia, which still claimed to he our overlord. Most of those who rose were captured and put to death. In 1848, at Chanx-les-Fonds, an insurrection occurred and the Prussian eagle was hauled down and replaced by the Swiss flag. For the next few years there was much plotting by the royalists to regain Neuchatel for the Hohenzollerns, in 1852 the royalists made an unsuccessful attempt to restore it to Prussian rule. In 1856 the rayalists took the chateau of Neuchatel and captured the state council. The republicans recaptured the chateau, taking over 600 royalist prisoners, all of whom were released but less than 30. Prussia made ready to invade Neuchatel. All Switzerland prepared for war with Prussia. Swiss in other countries returned to fight for their country. Soon we had 20,000 men guarding our frontier, while our women were at home taking care of the crops and making linen bandages to dress the wounded.


