

MEETING CALLED TO DISCUSS BY-PRODUCTS OF FRUIT, VEGETABLES

Need of Method of Utilizing Portion Now Wasted Is Set Forth.

DATA HAS BEEN GATHERED

Committee Believes Conditions Will Become Worse Unless Better System Is Provided.

A call has been sent broadcast through the northwest for a conference of all interested in fruit and vegetable by-products, to be held in Portland, September 10.

The call is issued by the by-products committee appointed by the fruit producers' congress at Spokane last November.

While there was need of utilizing part of the fruit in the form of by-products before, now that we are facing a European war, this need is going to be more strongly realized by the fruitgrowers of the northwest," writes J. F. Batheider, secretary treasurer of the committee, from Hood River.

"If a proper, concerted effort is put out at this time, on the part of the fruitgrowers of the northwest, it will result in the greatest development of the market for the northwest fruits, and more especially of the northwest apples, that this section has ever experienced."

A statement of the purposes of the conference and a definition of its importance have been included in the following:

Recognizing the importance of conserving the great amount of our fresh fruits and vegetables now going to waste in the northwest, and feeling the need of changing perishable products into marketable goods which can be marketed to advantage over a longer period of time, a committee with its members from the various states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, was appointed by the president of the National Apple show, held at Spokane last November, to devise ways and means of promoting the fruit and vegetable by-products industries of the northwest.

This committee has held several meetings and collected valuable data. From this data it is seen that the by-products industry of the northwest is facing problems which, as the years go by, will become more serious; one of the most important of these problems being the marketing of the finished products. For this reason the committee favors a central selling organization for the expert supervision, selling and distribution of the fruit and vegetable by-products grown and packed in the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

The object of such an organization would be, primarily, to in as far as possible establish and maintain a uniform system of grading and packing, and to obtain for the manufactured products which it is the object of the product a reasonable amount of profit.

To bring about this condition it would be necessary to:

1. Affiliate as many of the by-products plants as possible in movement in order to avoid ruinous competition, and by handling a large consignment to be able to reduce cost of handling.

2. Buy supplies, such as cans, boxes, spray material, oil, sugar, etc., in large quantities and effect a saving thereby.

3. In so far as possible, establish a uniform system for grading and packing the fruit, vegetables and other by-products marketed through this organization, and to exercise such supervision thereof as shall ensure to the purchaser that all by-products sold through this organization shall be of the class and quality represented and marked on the packages.

4. Advertise northwest by-products more widely and efficiently.

5. Distribute more widely the manufactured products. The Panama canal will be of as much assistance to the by-products trade as to the fresh fruit.

6. Marketing direct through paid representatives as much as possible, and cut out as many of the middle-men as possible. To further this end aid in every legitimate way towards the formation of consumers clubs and associations about the country.

7. Have an agent to settle claims for losses incurred in transit.

8. Have a committee of experts that may be called upon to give advice to communities contemplating starting by-products plants, and to give organization, amount of produce needed, type of building, kind of machinery needed, management, saving of waste, water supply, etc. The expense of this committee to be borne by community employing it.

9. Have an employment agency to look up records of processors, managers and bookkeepers and for recommending same to communities needing their services.

10. Urge our technical colleges to establish courses of instruction with the object of fitting students to become processors, managers and bookkeepers of by-products plants, growers' associations, etc.

11. Advance money as fast as the business may warrant to enable growers to handle their crops before returns are received from the manufacturers.

Paris, Aug. 22.—The first officer to be decorated for gallantry in the war is Second Lieutenant H. J. Bryant of the Fifteenth dragons.

General Joffre, the French commander in chief, in conferring the cross of the Legion of Honor on Lieutenant Bryant, said the officer with seven of his men had charged 30 Uhlans and that Bryant had killed the officer of the Uhlans with his own hands. The German band was routed.

Stamp on Receipts for Taxes Merely to Protect County

Penalties Will Be Collected When Payments Delinquent if Decision Is Reversed.

Large Sum Uncollected

About \$1,500,000 Still Outstands—As Only Seven Days Remain to Settle Big Bash Is Expected.

Stamped on receipts for first payments of taxes are the words, "Collection of penalties due not waived by issuance of this receipt," and according to Attorney Roger B. Sinnott, who led the fight for remission of penalties on deferred second half payments, this statement has caused considerable trouble. He said that many feared that penalties would be collected on the second half payments.

County Tax Collector Lewis has stated that no attempt will be made to collect penalties on taxes where half payments were made prior to

March 31, if the second payments are made before the office closes August 31. The statement was stamped on the receipts to protect the county in case the decision of Circuit Judge Cleiton setting aside a portion of the tax law penalizing all payments not made before March 31, should be appealed and reversed. As the case has not been appealed, the decision will be followed.

All who have made no payments will be charged interest at the rate of 1 per cent for each month and partial month since March 31, if they pay their taxes before closing time August 31. All taxes and half payments not made before that time will be penalized 10 per cent, and on the morning of September 1, will commence drawing interest at the rate of 12 per cent a year. On September 1, the 1 per cent a month penalty will be superseded by the heavier penalty, and will be discarded entirely.

Approximately \$1,500,000 remains to be collected. Included in that amount are last half payments by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. of approximately \$250,000; of the O. W. R. & N. Co. of about \$70,000; of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, about \$50,000; of the Weirhead estate, about \$33,000; of the Oregon Electric railway, about \$50,000, and of the United Railways, about \$80,000. The remainder is represented largely by small amounts.

As but seven business days remain in which last half payments can be made without penalty, it is expected that the tax office will be crowded, especially during the last few days. Much time will be saved taxpayers if they will take the receipts for first half payments with them when making second half payments.

Logging Congress Program Is Ready

Large Attendance Is Expected at Bellingham at Sixth Annual Meeting Which Convenes Next Thursday.

With what promises to be the largest attendance in the history of the Pacific Logging Congress, the sixth annual meeting of the body will convene at Bellingham, Wash., Thursday morning for a three day session. Delegates will be present from Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia.

A program of direct interest not only to loggers and lumbermen but also to industrial welfare workers and sanitation advocates will be presented. While subjects embracing the practical and technical phases of the logging industry will be given chief consideration, camp sanitation, welfare work and the human interest side of life in the woods will receive considerable attention.

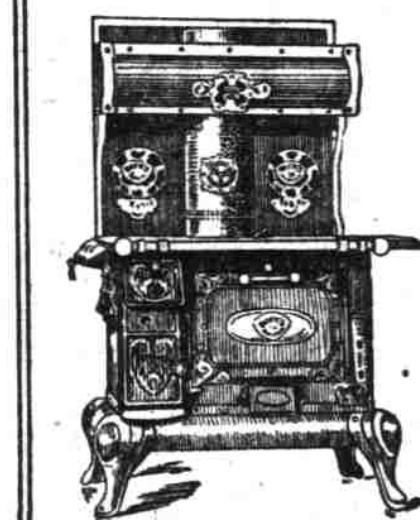
