

CANADIAN PACIFIC EMPLOYEES INVITED TO SWELL WAR FUND

Railway Suggests That Men
on Payroll Give One Day's
Pay.

LARGE SUM IS POSSIBLE

J. V. Murphy, General Agent Here, Re-
ceives Official Announcement of
Company's British Aid Plan.

Evidence of Canada's loyalty to Great Britain in the present crisis have been shown in a number of instances, but none is more striking than the proposition of the Canadian Pacific railway that each of its employees donate a day's pay to the war fund.

Announcement of the plan was received in Portland this morning by J. V. Murphy, general agent for the company in this city.

As the C. P. R. has 80,000 employees, the donation of a day's pay from each would make a considerable sum.

It is entirely optional with the employee whether he sacrifices his day's wage or not, but it is expected that they will respond to a man.

The Canadian Pacific as a company has already donated one of its fleet as a hospital ship and given \$100,000 in cash. The salary proposition is tendered so that every employee may add his mite.

Still another instance of the C. P. R.'s loyalty is to be found in its offer to all employees who enlist to continue their salaries during their absence at the front.

Mr. Murphy stated this morning reports of discontinuance of service on the C. P. R. were entirely erroneous and that the passenger conditions between Atlantic and Pacific seaboard are entirely normal.

were so much heavier than the allies' as to insure ultimately a cessation of their advance movement, when the allies could resume the aggressive. The delay, of course, gave the Russians time to make their operations so severely felt as to compel a German about-face to meet the czar's forces.

The British, said Lord Kitchener, had not been engaged since Thursday, but the French, acting vigorously on the right and left, have for the time being brought the German cavalry to a standstill.

British Loss Thousands.

His lordship placed the number of British casualties at 5000 to 8000.

As an example of the losses the Germans have suffered through their close formation method, he cited an instance at Landrecies, where a German infantry brigade advanced in close order into a narrow street, which they completely filled. Our machine guns were brought to bear on this target from the end of the town. The head of the column was swept away. A frightful panic ensued, and it is estimated that 400 or 500 dead or wounded Germans were left in this street alone.

Commenting on the war minister's statement, Premier Asquith, speaking in the house of commons, denounced publication of stories of British routs at Mons and Saint Quentin, and of regiments which had been so badly cut up that only bits of regiments were left.

All these, he said, Lord Kitchener's statement had contradicted, adding: "Referring to this sort of news, it may be necessary for the government to enact special legislation to prevent its circulation in the future."

This remark was construed by many as a threat to suppress newspapers which failed to preserve a strict moderation in their accounts of war developments.

Losses in Naval Battle.

In last week's naval fight off Heligoland, the admiralty stated, 29 Britons were killed and 38 wounded.

Among the killed were Commander Bertolotti and Lieutenant Westmacott, respectively of the destroyer Liberty and the light cruiser Arethusa. Lieutenant Robinson, of the Arethusa, was one of the wounded.

The casualties were all on board the Arethusa, the Liberty and the destroyer Laurel.

The number of Germans who lost their lives, not exactly known, was placed at about 670.

Blankets Falling on
Stove Cause Fire

Man Had Packed Up Household Goods
Ready to Move When Neighbors Discovered Flames.

J. H. Moore, 442 Jefferson street, packed his household goods yesterday evening to be ready early this morning for the moving van. At 1:30 o'clock he was awakened by neighbors crying "Fire!"

Mr. Moore, 13 years old, living in the adjoining house, was the first to discover the blaze and informed his parents.

Packing his goods, Moore had placed several blankets and pieces of bedding near the kitchen stove. During the night the pile of goods toppled over and fell on the stove, which still contained fire.

The blaze was confined to the kitchen, but the damage extends to practically all the household goods, as considerable water was thrown about the rooms to save the building.

Two buildings at East Forty-second and Holgate streets were damaged by fire last evening. The owner is Dr. C. H. Messner of Oregon City. One building is a residence and the other a candy store. The damage is estimated at about \$400.

Exports of Islands
May Be Forbidden

Washington, Aug. 31.—A plan to place a ban on all exports from the Philippine islands, except to the United States, while the European war continues, was under consideration today by government officials here.

It was said here that should shipments from the Philippines to Germany or Austria be captured by the Japanese, an embarrassing situation might arise. The same might be true should exports to Japan be seized by Germany.

Government officials realize, however, that if commerce is stopped, some provision must be made to compensate for losses that will follow.
