

TODAY'S NOTES AND NEWS FROM PORTLAND'S SUBURBAN TOWNS

COMMERCIAL CLUB
TAKES UP PROBLEM
OF TRANSPORTATIONDesire Is to Have Crowds Ex-
pected Next Week Handled
in Satisfactory Manner.

(Special to The Journal.)
Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 1.—Transportation facilities to accommodate the crowds of people who are expected to come from Portland and vicinity to the Columbia river interstate fair and pioneer days celebration, which is to be held in Vancouver next week, was one of the principal matters taken up for discussion at the special meeting of the Commercial club last evening. It was stated that the officials of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. had given their assurance that the company would do all it could to accommodate the crowds by securing an additional ferry boat, if possible.

That the street railway company will have no trouble in handling the crowds which will come on their cars was practically acknowledged, and the main matter for consideration was providing accommodations for the large number of automobiles which will also come to the fair. It was suggested that as much as possible would be done to secure another ferry boat to relieve the congestion which is sure to result from the following resolution was submitted and adopted unanimously:

"Whereas, The Columbia river interstate fair to be held in this city during the week September 15-19, will attract large numbers of people, many of whom will come from Portland and vicinity; and,
Whereas, The transportation facilities for crossing the Columbia river by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co.'s ferry boat are deemed entirely insufficient for the occasion and inadequate for the accommodation of the people of Multnomah county who have signified their intention of visiting the fair, now, therefore, be it resolved, That the Vancouver Commercial club petition the officials of Multnomah county and the city of Portland that they urge upon the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. the necessity of providing adequate relief from the congestion of traffic that must necessarily occur during the period above referred to."

The matter of transportation to and from the fair grounds by means of the street car system here, was also discussed, the matter, however, being left in the hands of a committee, which will confer with the officials of the local system, consisting of J. H. Ewell, E. E. Beard, J. P. Wineberg, Thomas P. Clarke and Floyd A. Swan, was appointed to confer with the officials of the various steam roads entering the city relative to running special trains between Portland and Vancouver during fair week. The committee in charge of hotels and other accommodations was instructed to make whatever arrangements were necessary for the occasion, and to establish a centrally located information bureau. They were also instructed to make arrangements for securing a large number of ribbons to be worn by residents of the city, in order that visitors may know whom to approach when seeking information. The slogan, "I live here, ask me," has been suggested, and will probably be adopted.

James J. Padden, M. S. Cohen and B. A. DeLynn were named as a committee on decorations, and a special committee, consisting of E. S. Bieseker, P. J. Flynn and B. L. Dorman, was named to map out a route for automobiles to and from the fair. The intention is that machines traveling to the fair grounds will travel over an entirely different route on their return trip, thereby avoiding congestion and confusion incurred when a large number of machines travel the same road in both directions. Signs bearing the words, "This way to the fair only," will be placed at frequent intervals on the way out, and signs marking the return route will also be placed along the road designated for use in returning to town. It was reported that 32 rooms in private families, with accommodations for about 160 people, had already been listed with the committee on accommodations. A personal canvass will be made by members of the club as being another hard proposition to meet, and nothing will be left undone to secure accommodations for as many people as possible. A maximum charge of \$1 per night has been fixed for that week.

Miller Released
After Investigation

Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 1.—Robert R. Miller, who was arrested Saturday night and held as being responsible for the death of Private Ernest S. White of Company E, was released yesterday by the coroner's jury, which heard the evidence submitted for its consideration. That White met his death by a fall to the floor in the Washington bar after he had had words with Miller, and not as a result of the blow he received from Miller, was the verdict which the jury returned.

Witnesses testified that White was the aggressor throughout, having picked a quarrel with Miller as soon as he entered the barroom. White struck the first blow, Miller stepping and falling to the floor. Upon regaining his feet Miller struck White on the side of his face, causing White to fall to the floor. He was picked up and taken to the washroom, where his face was washed, and brought back to a table where he was seated. Dr. Herbert C. Lissner was summoned and upon his arrival he found White dead.

An autopsy, which was performed Sunday by Dr. Gleaser and Dr. Flagg, with Lieutenant Hagood, who represented the government medical corps, revealed a blood clot at the base of the brain, caused, the physicians testified, by the fall White received and not by the blow which was said to have been struck with the open hand.

Miller testified that he did not know White, and was not familiar with the subject of their quarrel, which, according to witnesses, was some telephone message.

The jury was composed of Henry Deringer, J. F. Fisher, J. H. Coffin, John P. Higgins, W. W. Wilson and Gordon W. Limb, with Lieutenant Hagood as the prosecuting attorney. Burnett represented the local authorities and Lieutenant Weaga, Captain Hagbee and Lieutenant Hagood represented the military authorities.

Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 1.—Fred Lovejoy, who pleaded guilty last week to a charge of attempting to pass a worthless check on one Majestic bar, was sentenced yesterday by Judge Back of the superior court to serve 30 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$50. Lovejoy, shortly after his arrival in the city, got somewhat under the influence of liquor and after securing a blank check, which he filled in for \$10.50 and made payable to himself, signing his own name, attempted to cash the same at the Majestic bar. Investigation showed that he had no funds in the bank on which it was drawn, and his arrest followed.

BY GRESHAM CANNERY
FOR CANNERY PLANTDirectors to Meet Tonight to
Arrange for Beginning of
Construction Work.

Gresham, Or., Sept. 1.—Karl A. Miller, secretary of the Gresham Fruit-growers association, Saturday sent a communication to the Portland Railway, Light & Power company accepting a site for the cooperative cannery on an acre of land in Mildred addition about 600 feet east of the Mt. 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HOSPITAL BUILDING
NEARS COMPLETION

Sellwood Institution Soon Open First of Three New Units to Be Added to Present Structure.

Sellwood, Or., Sept. 1.—Finishing touches are now being put upon the \$15,000 brick building of the Sellwood general hospital on Harney avenue near East Thirteenth street, and it will be occupied within two weeks. This is the first unit of three to be erected between the present hospital building and East Thirteenth street. The unit will be connected with the present hospital building, and the present eastern wing will be remodeled.

The new unit is a two-story brick, 38 by 80 feet, containing 14 private rooms and a ward of 16 beds, increasing the hospital to 100 beds. Max Lorenz was the builder.

Features of the building are its heating system, refracted electric lights with a gas emergency system, an electric laundry in the basement, two diet kitchens, surgical supply room, chart room and a lecture room. Hardwood and tile floors are used throughout. The walls are fire plaster.

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
