

VOLCANIC ERUPTION SENDS AD CLUBMEN SCURRYING TO COVER

Bend Boosters Perpetrate One Stunt After Another on Innocents From Abroad.

PORTLAND MEN ON THE GO

Hospitality of Central Oregon City Knows No Bounds—Series of Luncheons.

Bend, Or., Sept. 7.—When the Portland Ad club excursionists arrived here yesterday morning they were bundled into automobiles and hurried to the Emblem club for breakfast. They have been on the go without a moment's let-up ever since.

Stunts and surprises of every conceivable description are being sprung on the visitors, and the busy Bend boosters are leading them a furious pace. The ad clubbers are keeping up, however, and doing full justice to the spreads that are put before them. The hospitality of Bend and Sisters and Camp Six have been without bounds.

Following the breakfast the excursionists took their seats in automobiles ostensibly to visit the town of Sisters and Camp Six, on the Tumalo irrigation project. As the cars rounded the corner of Bend's Wall street, formidably badged policemen arrested them, took them for trial before a serious justice of the peace, James A. Eastes, with prosecution by Vernon A. Forbes. Not only the drivers, but the occupants of each car, were invariably found guilty of exceeding the eight-mile speed limit of the Central Oregon metropolis, and Chief of Police Roberts and Deputies Smith, Manheimer, Bartlett, McKay and Manion sentenced them to two days in jail.

Furnished Yellow Convicts' Suits.

At the jail it was explained that the town lockup could not contain such a bunch, and they were put into convict suits of lurid yellow and blue and thus taken on their way through gray dust just a little deeper than it has been before for five years, only to emerge suddenly into a pine grove of cooling shade by a clear mountain brook, where a chicken picnic dinner was hospitably served by the entire neighborhood of Sisters. Here the speakers were George E. Aitken of Sisters, J. E. Werlein, William Hanley, Judge William Colvig, C. C. Chapman, C. H. Mayer of Portland, H. H. Leonard of Bend and Mrs. E. J. Waldron of Cloverdale.

The afternoon drive led first through arid lands producing only sagebrush and occasional pines, then to cultivated fields and homes with dooryards and flowers. The purpose was to show the marvellous power of water to transform, when diverted from the streams that flow from the mountains into irrigation ditches. Consequently the travelers were ready to believe enthusiastically in the utility of the Tumalo project, where a flow from the mountains completed next spring flooding 1000 acres of land that nearly 23,000 acres may be reclaimed.

This project is unique in two respects. It is the only exclusively state-financed project in the country. It is being built with striking efficiency, and in work and results the state of Oregon is doing a dollar's worth for every dollar spent.

Entertained on Tumalo Project.

Elaborate hospitality was offered at Camp Six. O. Laugaard, project engineer, and G. R. Rydell, chief clerk, had brought Ernest Valdez, camp cook from Camp Seven, to have charge of the menu. Lester Rutkins had baked a mountainous cake of pounds in weight, flanked by little roasts and fruits and nuts in ornamental designs. The office force had been told off to catch trout, and William Schaller, Ronert E. Simpson, Thomas C. Veve, Chris Kemmel, P. W. Beasley and Oakes Wallace, a boy, had each caught 20 to 40 that were deliciously prepared and served. Big welcoming signs made by the camp draughtsman, P. B. Beasley, were conspicuously placed. Speakers at the camp dinner were O. Laugaard, Vernon A. Forbes, William Hanley and others.

Today's program included luncheon at Benham Falls and a visit to the camp of Know Jones. Prominent Bend men were invited in the Order of Muts and the "degree of equality" was conferred by the Ad club upon the Emblem club.

A banquet tonight will end the visit. For it a hall seating 200 was especially built, and W. D. Cheney of Seattle, who is called the "father of the Emblem club," contributed all the dishes and silver. Two publications kept the excursionists and their hosts of the Bend Emblem and Commercial clubs fully informed about everything.

News Paper Men Have Busy Day.

The "Portland Buzzer" was published on the trip. The entire staff of the Bend Bulletin contributed their services all day Sunday, getting out a full newspaper size issue of the "Black Rabbit," which had as editorial staff W. P. Strandberg, Rex Lampman, George Palmer Putnam, R. W. Sawyer, Samuel M. Evans and Marshall N. Dana. There was said to be the most elaborate picnic ever issued in connection with any excursion out of Portland, and represented two weeks of preparation.

The excursionists were thrown into consternation early today when flames leaped from lava rocks in the vicinity of Lava Butte and fierce explosions shook the earth and sent bonkers high in the air. Subterranean communication with erupting Mount Lassen in California was suggested, but this did not lessen the apprehension nor stay the hurried retreat to a safer neighborhood.

Eruption Was Only "Bluff."

There was considerable confusion, however, when it inadvertently leaked out that the excursionists had been made the victims of a moving picture eruption, in which they were the unconscious actors. The stunt was invented by George Palmer Putnam of Bend, as one feature of two days' exciting entertainment, and was executed by four men. T. H. Foley, R. B. Gould, S. E. Roberts and C. M. McKay. Red fire had been laid among the rocks, nearly 1000 pounds of dynamite had been placed in the crater of Lava butte. It was an ideal site for the huge practical joke.

Hofer and Wilson Again.

Huntington, Or., Sept. 7.—Arrangements have been perfected for a public discussion of the prohibition question on the night of September 16, between Colonel Hofer, of Salem, for the wet interests, and Dr. Clarence T. Wilson, spokesman for the dry forces. From here Dr. Wilson will go to speak at the Methodist conference which meets at Payette September 17.
