Nearly Every Day for Month Devoted to Solemn Ceremonies.

Jewish people everywhere are planning to usher in the Hebrew New Year, the Rosh Hashanah, denominated as the year 5675. The Jewish month of Tishri begins September 21 and lasts until October 20, and nearly every day will be devoted to the solemn ceremonles of the New Year observance.

All Jewish holidays and every day, according to the Jewish code, starts at sunset of the day before, in compliance with the Biblical words, "and the evening and the morning were one day." The holidays, therefore, start the evening of September 20. The New Year observance proper lasts from that time until the evening of September 22.

Beginning with the evening of that day is the fast of Gedaliah. September 28, the day of atonement, starts and ends the evening of October 3. The following evening the feast of tabernacles starts and is concluded the evening of October 13. Time for Repentance.

The Jewish holidays do not constitute a period of rejoicing and merrymaking. Rather they are days of repentance and recounting of all activities, good and evil, of the year that has just ended. Prayers for the granting of peace and prosperity for all nations and people are important features of the religious supplications, The prayers are classified as morn-

ing and additional prayers. The different prayers are divided by the sounding of the ram's horn trumpet or Shofor. This is a symbolic calling of all Jews to unite in prayer for the welfare of the human family.

The New Year is based upon the Biblical injunctions of Exodus, 23:16 and 34:22. The first day is known as offertory will be sung by Mrs. Jessie Yom Kazikkaron, or the day of remembrance. The prophet Ezra calls in the day holy to the Lord. After the New Year day is the fast

The Day of Atonement is a period of fasting, a Mosaic institution ordered in Leviticus 23-32. Gresham of Grace Pro-Cathedral, San Francisco.
