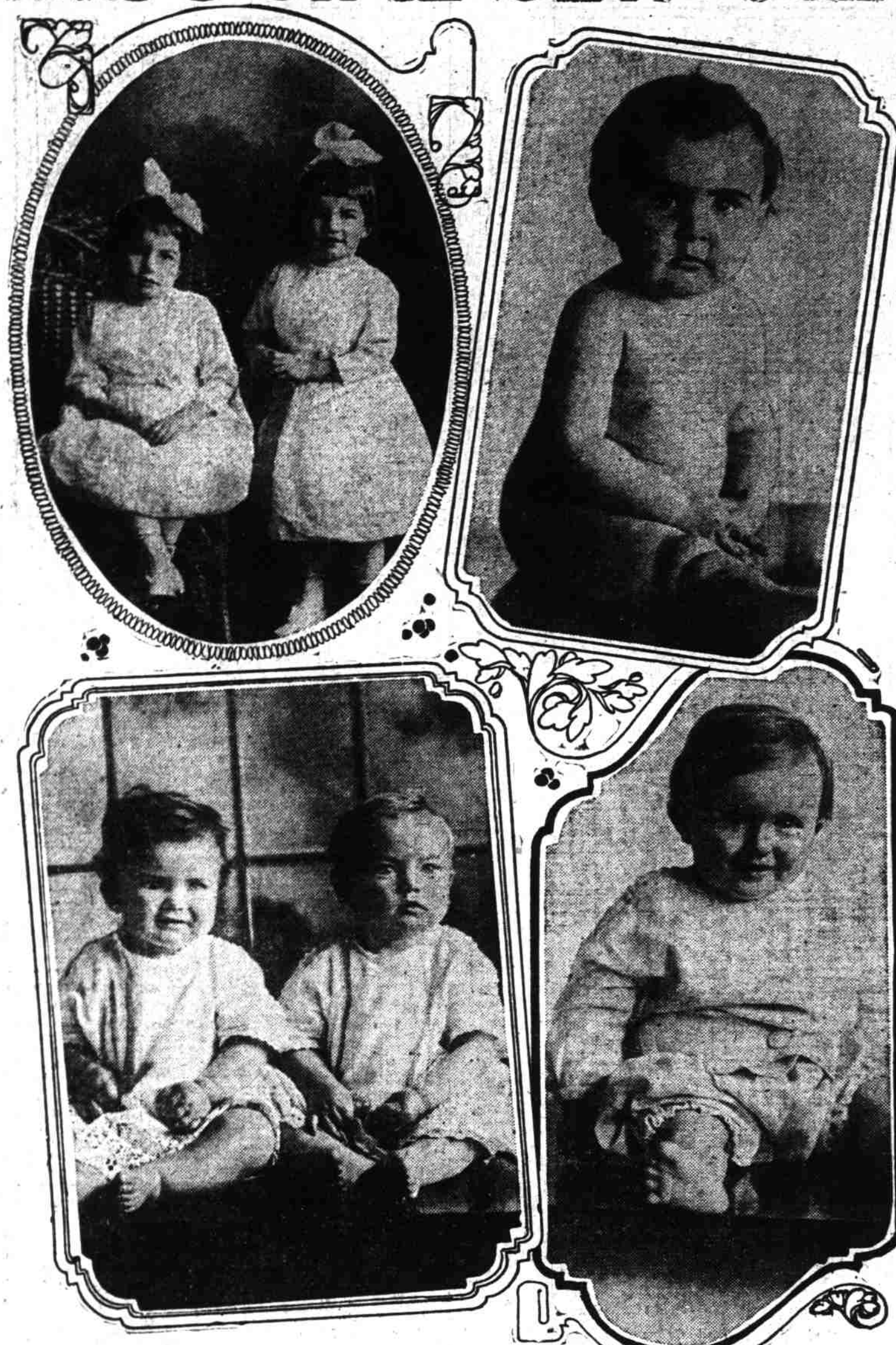

He is a graduate of the state normal school of North Dakota and holds a B. S. degree from Whitworth college of Washington. Before coming to Portland he held the positions of superintendent of schools in North Dakota, assistant instructor in the North Dakota normal school and principal in the Pullman, Wash., high school. Mr. Wolf began his work on Monday.

The new principal of the college preparatory department is Charles Reynolds, a University of Oregon graduate who corrected papers in the correspondence department of mathematics his senior year. He was in business a year before coming to the association. L. A. Lovgren, a University of Washington finance and commerce man, takes the place of L. R. Edwards, who is now in the educational office, replacing L. L. Hartley, who is in the east on a year's leave of absence.

Nathan Blair is an important addition in the electrical department. He came from the Electrical Institute of Rochester, N. Y. J. W. Shaver, an '14 graduate of the University of Oregon, has entered the college preparatory as an instructor in mathematics. Leland Beveridge, for a number of years principal of a Medford grammar school, is the new principal of the boys' grammar school.

During the past week the school of electricity, the college preparatory school, commercial department and boys elementary school were organized with good registration. The automobile school has opened its fall term with Frank McDaniel as superintendent and instructor in machine work. C. B. Palmerton is the instructor in driving. A. W. Paethold is in charge of the machine shop work and J. R. Johnson is the head of the tool room.

A class in salesmanship with sessions on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evening has been organized with N. F. Sturges as instructor. Two courses are given, each meeting two evenings a week. Already the enrollment has reached 40. Mr. Sturges conducted a similar class of 125 in Spokane last year.

A new prospectus of the association school of pharmacy has been issued with a list of the faculty, an analysis of the course of study, rates of tuition and the text books used. The school is one of the most prosperous of the association and at present over 60 of its graduates are employed in Portland and neighboring cities.

Health and Welfare Exhibit.

Beginning tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock a Public Health and Welfare exhibit will be held for the week in the first floor of the Yeon building at Fifth and Alder streets. The exhibit will be open from 9 o'clock to 5 o'clock daily and a large number of organizations have planned to take advantage of the opportunity and arrange displays of their work.

The space has been donated by John R. Yeon and the booths and fittings are being installed by Meier & Frank. Exhibits will be displayed by the Day Nursery, Reed college, Associated Charities, Visiting Nurse association,

Dental Educational association, Board of Health, Dairy and Food commission, Woman's club, People's Institute, Neighborhood House, Oregon Congress of Mothers, Parent-Teacher association and Milk Inspection.

The Oregon Congress of Mothers will have charge of the baby tests every week, has 200 unexamined babies on its registered list, many of whom have been waiting their turn for months. All of these children as well as a considerable additional number will be tested during the week. The entire balcony

has been given over to the congress and the tests will be conducted with the same degree of privacy that marks them at headquarters. The tests will begin Tuesday and will be conducted between the hours of 9 and 12.

Playground Attendance Report. Although a number of the city playgrounds are still open, with but one instructor in charge, the majority of them closed the first of the week after a season that extended from the middle of May until the closing time. The total attendance at the 16 parks was 400,529. Of that number 207,763 were boys and 192,766 were girls.

The swimming tanks at Sellwood and Peninsula parks came in for a large share of patronage. The attendance at the former tank was 28,762 and the latter 33,665 during June, July and August. Girls predominated at the kindergarten where their record is 37,382 as against 6947 boys.

July forged much ahead in the matter of attendance by months. The park playgrounds that still remain open are North Park, Kennelworth, Washington, Felling school and Peninsula, which will remain open the year round; Columbia, Lakeview, Lincoln and Laurelhurst. The closing of these parks depends to a large extent on weather conditions.

State Meeting of Mothers' Congress.

Library hall has been chosen as the place for the state meeting of the Oregon Congress of Mothers to be held October 28, 29, 30. The dates are the same as for the Land and Products show and the low rates prevailing over the state will make it possible for the congress to have a representative state meeting for the first time. The program so far is tentative but it is announced definitely that the will be a speaker from the Medford and Ashland territory as well as one from Corvallis and another from Eugene. Hood River and Pendleton have been asked to send representatives but have not yet given their reply. The executive board will hold its meeting tomorrow at the home of Mrs. A. King Wilson, who is entertaining a luncheon.

Y. W. C. A. Activities.

The Y. W. C. A. board held its first meeting since vacation on Tuesday when three new workers, who have recently come to the association, were introduced. One of these, Miss George C. Wicker, who is the new secretary of the religious work, led the devotionals. The other new workers were Miss Blackwell, who is to serve as assistant physical director, and Miss Donaldson, who will have charge of the domestic work at Corvallis, who has just returned from the European war zone, has been a guest of the association for the past few days.

Industrial Commission Conferences.

Miss Bertha Moore, Amedee Smith and Father O'Hara, members of the Industrial Commission, have called two conferences to be held in the immediate future. The first one will be a conference on the fruit and vegetable packing industry and the second will pertain to piece workers' wages in the factories of the state.

The meeting which was postponed by the board of directors of the Portland Women's Union will be held tomorrow at the Planders street house. It is urgently requested that all members be present.

Mons Neighborhood Devastated by War

German Sald to Have Suffered Great Losses in Changes Necessary to Conquer French City.

London, Sept. 12.—The Ostend correspondent of the Express says Mons suffered severely in the recent fight and its whole neighborhood has been devastated. The same correspondent quotes Leon Hilard, Senator of Hainault, as testifying "that the Germans killed their own severely wounded on the battlefield, only tending those who would soon recover."

There are many signs, according to the dispatch, that the Germans suffered heavily at Mons. Returning remnants of those who were in the fight spoke of British courage. One force of 250 British, it is stated, must have accounted for thousands of Germans. All along their line of retreat they had prepared a defense made by bags full of potatoes, found in a neighboring factory. Through these were placed machine guns and large numbers of them. The first time the Germans came up to this seemingly friendly line the Maxim guns spoke and soon no Germans were left.

Miss Edith studied painting in Berlin under Franz Schuchman, one of Berlin's most famous artists, and after his death, with Muller-Schoenfeld, and landscape with Karl Wendel. Miss Edith also studied in Paris at the Colarossi academy. Her specialty is portrait painting.

The Misses Gregory are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. William M. Gregory.

Musical activity has been renewed at the Sunnyside M. E. church, East Thirty-fifth and Yamhill streets. Jasper Dean MacFall will again be the director of this, being his fourth year with the choir, and Mrs. Samuel P. Groves has returned to the city and resumed her duties as organist.

Elaborate plans are being made for the season's work. The monthly sabbath concert will commence next month. The large chorus choir has been augmented by a number of new and excellent voices.

The auxiliary vested choir, composed of some 50 young girls, have begun their duties. The combined choir will be heard today in ensemble work.
