

# ANNUAL BABY SHOW OF COUNTY FAIR IS HELD AT GRESHAM

Names of Prize Winners Are Announced; Racing Results Are Also Given.

## FAIR CLOSED YESTERDAY

Complete Official List of Premiums and Awards Is Made Known By Secretary Thorpe.

Despite a week of bad weather the Multnomah county fair at Gresham closed yesterday a decided success. The fair was scheduled to end Saturday, but was extended through Sunday at the last moment. Nearly 1000 persons took advantage of the additional opportunity given to see the county's blooded stock and land products.

The annual baby show was held in the pavilion annex yesterday afternoon with Mrs. Charles Cleveland, president of the Gresham Council of Women Voters, in charge. Mrs. Richard Prince of Portland acted as judge. There were 25 entries.

**New Plan Suggested.**  
A different plan for the grange exhibits at the fair than the present method of having each grange exhibit in a separate booth has been suggested. It is to group each product, such as canned fruits, in one grand display, crediting each section to the grange exhibiting it. President H. A. Lewis of the fair association, declared Saturday that this scheme is impracticable, would do away with competition and cause loss of interest.

The country band concert at noon Saturday was declared a tie between Beyer's Pleasant Home band and the Pacific Coast band of Portland, composed of 16 women players, and each band was awarded \$250. A large crowd attended the contest. The judges were Charles L. Brown, H. C. Marque and F. A. Seltering, all of Portland.

The third anniversary of the founding of the Church of the Madeline, East Twenty-third and Slakivou streets, was celebrated at yesterday morning's services in the church. Rev. Father Thompson, pastor, assisted by Father Maurus, O. S. B., of Mount Angel, celebrated solemn high mass. Rev. George J. Campbell, assistant pastor, who was recently ordained at Rome, delivered an address based on the life and repentance of Mary Magdalene.
