Men's Styles Give Natural Appearance. Smartly Correct Coat Has Somewhat Higher Waist Line, Fitting Snugly at Upper Part of Back. Styles in men's clothes this fall are so made as to give the figure a more natural appearance of greater strength, according to Ludwig Stein of the House of Kuppenheimer.

The smartly correct coat has a somewhat higher waist line fitting snugly about the upper part of the back and draping away gracefully from the circumference line of the body, just beneath the lower rib. This, with the more naturally shaped and narrower sleeve and with the shoulder just a little wider, tends to accentuate the most powerful muscles of the body, namely, those of the arm and upper back, for it is in these muscles of the body that the strength and endurance qualities of the trained athlete lie.

The waist of the coat is not so tightly fitting as last season, and drapes more fully over the hips. It is still smart to wear the lapel rolled to the second button, but both lapel and chest lie flat against the body without the noticeable chest bulge.

Mazamas Climb Larch Mountain

Party Disappointed in Failure to Get Good View on Account of Heavy Fog and Rain. For the week end outing yesterday the Mazamas climbed Larch mountain, 4045 feet high, located about 10 miles southeast of Bridal Veil. Although 44

were in the party, six did not make the climb. A splendid view of Mount Hood and the upper Bull Run water reserve is obtained from Larch mountain, but the fog and rain, which was incessant throughout the morning, obscured everything.

The largest number of the party went out to Bridal Veil Saturday afternoon, tramped four miles to Palmer, and spent the night camped under one of the sheds of the Bridal Veil Lumbering company's sawmill. Another party left Portland about 1 o'clock Sunday morning. After an early breakfast, the Mazamas rode on a logging train seven miles to the base of the mountain, and from there made the ascent in less than an hour after registering and awaiting vainly for over an hour for the fog to lift, the descent was made, lunch was eaten at the logging camp, and the return to Bridal Veil was made. Some came by Angels Rest and Devil's Rest, rock promontories in the cliff back of Bridal Veil.
