**STEAM LOCOMOTIVES
MAY BE REPLACED BY
NEW STYLE OF POWER**

Astoria Division to Have Gas-Electric Car in Near Future.

EXPERIMENT IS PLANNED

Car Will Be 72 Feet Long and Will Have Capacity for Hauling Four Coaches.

Soon after January 1, the North Bank road will have in operation on its Astoria division between Portland and Rainier a new style of motive power—an electrically-driven, gas-powered car that will have sufficient traction to haul three or four passenger coaches. The General Electric company is now assembling material for the construction of this car, which is modeled after designs prepared by General Master Mechanic Dixon.

The car will be 72 feet long and will have a capacity for 48 persons, besides an unusually large baggage compartment for the handling of the milk traffic. The engine in the front of the car will be of sufficient power to generate current to haul a whole train.

The car will be of all-steel construction and the interior will be finished in dark mahogany. Electric lights supplied with energy from the main dynamo, will illuminate the car. For the present only one car is to be built because gas-electric operation is still in the experimental stage. Later, however, others may be added as the need arises or as experience shows the efficacy of this form of propulsion.

Although the car was authorized several weeks ago, the contract only recently has been closed and it is probable that several months will elapse before the car will be finished.

THREE WASHINGTON BANKS FAIL TO OPEN TODAY FOR BUSINESS

Officers of the United States National bank assert that they will turn over all of their private property, and that depositors will be paid in full.

The other two banks were prepared to stand the run this morning, but there was little demand for money on deposit at either institution.

George Dymart, stockholder of the United States National, attributes the failure to the European war, dullness of the lumber market, and the fact that other banks called in paper held on the local institution.

The United States National bank was organized in 1907 by taking over the old State Bank of Centralia. The old bank was organized in 1895, with deposits of \$30,000, and in 1907 they had grown to \$400,000.

The Union Loan & Trust company was organized in 1908. It is believed that this institution is not so heavily involved.

City Was Depositor.

Officers of the United States National are Charles Gilchrist, president; C. S. Gilchrist, vice president and manager; J. W. Daubney, cashier, and R. W. Daubney, assistant cashier. The holders are the two Gilchrist, F. B. Hubbard, F. T. McNitt, George Dymart, F. R. Stahl, J. W. Daubney, D. F. Davies, Herman Young and Dan Salzer. The heaviest depositor in the banks was the city of Centralia, which had \$90,000 on deposit. The closing of the institution leaves the municipality with but \$10,000 cash on hand from its spring tax receipts.

Raymond Bank Firm.
Raymond, Wash., Sept. 21.—The closing of the two Centralia banks this morning in no way affected the two banks of this city. Charles Gilchrist, president of United States National, Centralia, was until three months ago president of the Willapa Harbor State bank of this city, but disposed of his entire interest in the local bank so that he is not now connected with it in any capacity. There has been no strike over the Centralia failures and no withdrawals of deposits have been made or are expected.

the prison report for the 1911-12 biennial period. No statement has ever been made by me to the contrary, notwithstanding the Oregonian charges.

The Oregonian, when it is not following its policy of deliberately lying, usually suppresses facts which would show the truth. It failed to disclose the fact that the said brick were offered by sales and gifts as follows:

Sold O. A. C., 774,100 at \$5, \$3770.50; sold inmate asylum, 58,200 at \$5, \$2910; free to penitentiary, 114,270; free to tuberculosis sanitarium, 100,438; free to feeble minded institution, 19,020; free to mute school, 58,284; free to blind school, 100. Total, 1,200,000, \$4435.50.

The Oregonian suppressed the fact that after purchasing a valuable tract of land out of the brickyard fund, installing a number of needed industries to absorb the labor of the institution and making a large number of needed improvements, over \$4600 was turned into the state treasury.

Other Facts Suppressed.
The Oregonian suppressed the fact that the institutions have been run without deficiencies as in the past, and it suppressed the fact that nearly \$28,000 of our appropriations will be turned back into the general fund unused.

The Oregonian also suppressed the fact that the penitentiary will carry over January 1, in the revolving fund, about \$14,000 in cash and stock.

It also suppressed the fact that labor had been furnished public institutions which if figured at only \$1.50 per day would amount to over \$78,000 or nearly double what the old stove foundry contract would produce.
