

MANY REPUBLICANS EXPECTED TO OPPOSE HAND PICKED TICKET

Notable Resentment Seen
Against Evident Scheme to
Control Next Legislature.

MULTINOMAH CANDIDATES

Twelve State Representatives and One
State Senator To Be Picked in
Multnomah County.

Twelve state representatives and one
state senator are to be elected in Multi-
nomah county November 3. Forty-six
candidates are after the places.

This county will also participate in
the election of a joint state senator
and a joint representative. Seven
candidates are after these two places.
The joint senatorial district includes
Clackamas, Clatsop and Multnomah
counties. The candidates are Richard
W. Montague, Democrat; George M.
McBride, Republican; David L. Povey,
Progressive; B. C. Altman, Prohibitionist;
and C. W. Barrow, Socialist. All
live in Multnomah county.

The joint representative district in-
cludes Clackamas and Multnomah
counties. The candidates are Roscoe
P. Hurst, Democrat and Prohibitionist,
and C. M. Hurlburt, Republican, who
has been repudiated by his own party
because of his unsavory personal re-
cord. It appears there can be no doubt
of Mr. Hurst's election, as he is an
able lawyer with a clean record.

Ticket Hand-Picked.
For the 12 representatives to be
elected from Multnomah county, the
Republican party, whose ticket was
hand-picked by the Oregonian, has
the only complete list, although the
Prohibition party has chosen 12 can-
didates by nominating seven and in-
dorsing five on other tickets.

All of the political parties, except
the Republican, recognized the newly
enfranchised women voters by nom-
inating one or more of them for leg-
islative positions.

Aside from candidates of other par-
ties that were nominated, the Repub-
licans have six candidates for rep-
resentative in Multnomah, the Pro-
hibitionists have nine candidates, the
Socialists have eight.

Indications are that there will be a
great deal of scratching of tickets
when the voters go to the polls Nov-
ember 3 to elect their lawmakers.

Resentment Is Seen.
There is a noticeable resentment
among a great many Republican
voters against the hand-picked Repub-
lican ticket and the known scheme of
the part of the Oregonian, and such
leaders in the senate as Gus Moser
and W. Lair Thompson of swamp land
ill-fame, to get absolute control of
the next legislature through the as-
sistance of the specially selected Multi-
nomah delegation. This means the
Republican ticket will be generously
scratched.

The Republican candidates for the
house are S. B. Cobb, John Gill, who
was also nominated by the Democrats
and Progressives; Oscar W. Jorne, S.
B. Huston, Louis Kuehn, D. C. Lewis
also nominated by Democrats; E. V.
Littlefield, Andrew C. Smith, Plowden
Stott, Lloyd J. Weston and Conrad
W. Olson and Ben Selling, both also
nominated by the Democrats.

Other Candidates Named.
The Democratic candidates are T. O.
Hague, A. K. Higgs, E. R. Lundberg,
Mrs. M. McDonald, Fred E. Brown,
Cora C. Talbot, Hague, Higgs and
McDonald were also nominated by the
Prohibitionists.

Prohibition candidates are J. M. W.
Boyle, Emmett Callahan, J. A. Clem-
enson, Mrs. L. Gee, Wilbur Hender-
son, Maria L. T. Hadden, Lora C.
Little, J. G. Hanson and J. B. Zieg-
ler. Mrs. Hadden and Mr. Ziegler were
also nominated by the Prohibition party.

Prohibition candidates are August Aht,
Bodie Althaus, Fred E. Brander, G.
H. Brown, D. J. Langdon, A. F. Medo,
Math Schlager and Peter Streiff Jr.

For state senator from Multnomah
the candidates are W. L. Page, Dem-
ocrat; Arthur Langguth, Republican;
J. B. Holbrook, Progressive, and C.
C. Poling, Prohibitionist.

Polk "Prohibs" Active.
Dallas, Or., Oct. 1.—The "Prohibs"
of Polk county are going to put the
county in the dry list irrespective of
which way the election on state wide
prohibition goes at the November elec-
tion, if it is possible to do so. Peti-
tions have been filed with the county
court asking that special elections be
called on the question of local option be
held in the cities of Dallas and Independence
on November 3. The Dallas petition
contained 180 names and that for In-
dependence 41 signatures. The coun-
ty court will canvass the petitions at
its meeting next Wednesday and if
the signatures are found sufficient
will call the election.

Liquor Cases at Cornelius.
Cornelius, Or., Oct. 1.—William
Bellinger of Forest Grove, recently ar-
rested for violation of the local op-
tion law, was found guilty in the ju-
stice court and fined \$200. Notice of
appeal was given.

In the case of H. Kohnke Jr., re-
cently convicted of violation of the
local option law in which a writ of
review was granted by the circuit court
and council, the circuit court has de-
cided against the city and ordered the
refund of the \$25 fine paid, and also
of the value of the liquor destroyed at
time of arrest.

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No Good From Land Board Action—West

Executive Explains Matter of Re-
payments to Contract Holders on
Tumalo Project.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Oct. 1.—While I was
not present at the meeting of the
desert land board Tuesday and am not
therefore fully advised as to Engineer
Laurgaard's action in sending out no-
tices to certain old contract holders
of the Tumalo project in reference to
repayments, no good can come from
the action of the board and it can only
result in embarrassing Laurgaard in
his work," said Governor West today
in reference to the statement that the

"In addition to the construction
work, certain old contract holders
would be repaid the amount of their
repayments should they so elect. The
lands covered by these surrendered
contracts could be resold at once and
the project received would thus offset
that repaid.

"As an example of how this works,
say the cost of completing the Tumalo
project is \$450,000 and the repayments
\$50,000. The total outlay on the part
of the state would be \$500,000, all of
which will have to be covered by sales
of the lands.

"As I understand it, Laurgaard
simply informed some of the old con-
tract holders that repayments upon
old contracts surrendered in the future
would be made out of the proceeds of
the sales of lands. If this is not a
correct statement of the case, I would
like to be enlightened. Surely the
legislature would not go out of its
way to make unnecessary appropri-
ations in this direction. We have
ample funds to complete the project
and the sales of lands will not only
meet every contingency, but return to
the taxpayers with interest the full
amount appropriated to construct the
project.

"Funds will soon be accumulating
from sales of lands and all that is
needed is legislative authority to make
these repayments out of the funds
thus accumulated."
