

STATE FAIR MAGNET FOR THOUSANDS WHO MARVEL AT WONDERS

Clackamas Takes Honors in County Exhibit Class and Polk Is Close Second.

RACES ARE BIG FEATURE

Special Trains on Steam and Electric Lines Here by the Salem Cherriana.

Salem, Or., Oct. 1.—Special trains over all roads leading to Salem brought great crowds to the State Fair today, and the attendance promised to equal that of yesterday, when the total was 17,000.

Today's arrivals included the Harriman special from Portland, carrying 1,000 people and a special train carrying 1,200, both from Portland, over the Southern Pacific, as well as the regular passenger trains, all loaded to the guards.

Two Extra Sections. The Oregonian has two extra sections from Portland and the regular trains carried about twice the usual number of coaches.

The trains over the Southern Pacific were met by committees of the Cherriana at Wilsonville and supplied with tickets, so that there would be no delay or confusion when the trains stopped directly at the grounds. The Cherriana acted as guides and helped to entertain all the visitors from out of town.

A stock parade in front of the grandstand is a feature of this afternoon. The race card includes a hippodrome race, Stock Breeders Meet.

The Oregon Purebred Livestock Breeders' association held an important meeting last night and elected officers and transacting other business, passed a resolution that a committee be named to take up with the railroad companies the matter of shipping livestock to the San Francisco fair.

Addresses by judges of livestock at the fair and prominent breeders were heard and about 150 were in attendance.

That the outlook in Oregon for the breeding of a better grade of livestock is very satisfactory was the consensus of opinion. Among those who spoke were Professor Carlisle of Idaho, former dean of the Agricultural college at Moscow, in that state, who judged horses this year; John Kane of Utah, judge of beef cattle; J. H. Hingman, Colorado, judge of dairy cattle; Howard H. Keim, Bachelors Island in the Columbia river, judge of sheep; Thomas W. Brunk, Spokane, judge of goats; John L. Smith, Eugene, proprietor of the Hazelwood farm, and C. M. McAllister of the Union Stock yards, Portland.

One of the statements made was that the livestock raised in Oregon would compare very favorably with that of eastern United States and even with Europe.

New Officers Elected.

The following officers were elected: President, C. L. Hawley, McCoy; first vice president, George Chandler, Baker; second vice president, Frank Brown, Carlton; secretary, N. C. Maria, Portland; treasurer, Charles Cleveland, Gresham; members of executive committee, F. A. Koser, Hickreal; Harry West, Scappoose; George Sander, Baker; H. D. Looney, Jefferson, and P. A. Frakes, Scappoose.

C. D. Minton, Portland; E. E. Linn, Portland, and T. W. Brunk were appointed a committee on resolutions, to report at the banquet tonight.

That the state Panama-Pacific fair commission had promised \$10,000 in special prizes for the exhibit from this state at the San Francisco fair was the report on a special committee named to confer with the commission. The appointment of a committee to meet with the heads of the railroad companies and see what arrangements can be made for a mutual interchange of rates for the accommodation of shipping stock on the fair circuits was authorized.

Clackamas Is Winner.

Clackamas county carried off the honors for the best county exhibit at the state fair at Salem, with a close second. Multnomah was separated from Polk county by an extremely close margin and was given third honor. Washington, which gave fourth place and Yamhill fifth. Benton drew from competition because that county's products were not on hand, as had been planned.

The exhibits of the counties were all so good that the task of judging was a difficult one.

Clackamas county's exhibit was carried out exactly according to the rules of the premium list and there was an abundance of splendidly arranged products. Polk county's exhibit was so nearly perfect that it was hard to decide between the two. Yamhill had a very fine exhibit but lacked a sufficient quantity of garden and field products.

E. M. Lowe of Ashland was awarded first prize for the best horticultural and agricultural exhibit. F. M. Sherman, the Lebanon "green goods man," received second, and C. E. Donaldson of Tillamook was awarded third prize.

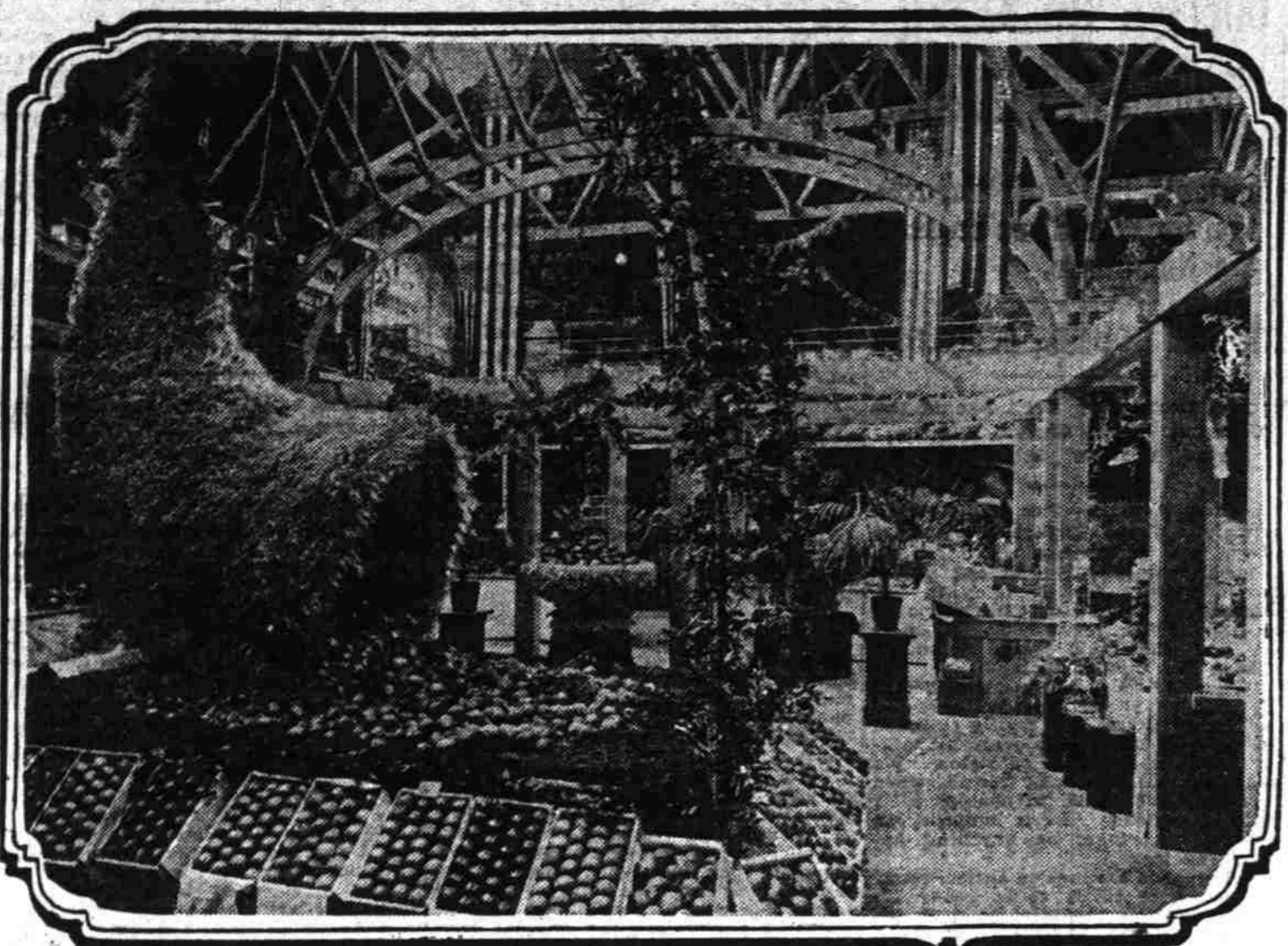
