

CHINESE FEAR JAPAN WILL NEVER LET GO OF KIAO CHAU TERRITORY

While Chinese Are Not Pro-German, They Consider the Jap Menace More Pressing

BOYCOTT TALK REVIVED

Last Boycott of Japanese Goods by China Resulted Many Great Commercial Houses.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Peking, Oct. 8.—China is far from easy over the Kiao Chau situation. The Chinese are not pro-German but they fear Germany less than they fear Japan. The German occupation of Kiao Chau has annoyed them, but they have never considered it likely that so distant a country would want much Chinese territory. Japan, they feel, is liable at any time to take a whole province and Mongolia are regarded as hopelessly lost already. They are fearful that a Japanese foothold at Kiao Chau would mean the ultimate absorption of the Shantung peninsula, too.

Japan's promise to return the German leased territory to China after it has been wrested from the Kaiser is looked at with much doubt. The general view is that, after he has the possession in his hands, the mikado will be more strongly tempted to keep it than he perhaps realizes in advance.

Chinese Resent Invasion.
Aside from what may or may not happen in the future, the Japanese are actually operating in Chinese territory at the present time and the masses of the people, seeing simply the fact and neither understanding nor caring for reasons, resent their presence.

Many of them blame the Peking government for permitting it and the government, none too secure in its power at best, cannot afford to shoulder much additional blame.

There has been a great deal of talk of a Chinese boycott of the Japanese as a means of manifesting the popular feeling. These boycotts have been tried before and proved extraordinarily effective. Japan was so boycotted a few years ago and its consequent trade losses were enormous. Many big concerns were ruined.

Boycott Is Discouraged.
Tokio hinted strongly at forcible retaliatory measures and probably would have resorted to them if it had not been that they would have done no good. The Chinese government had nothing to do with the boycott—the people simply could not buy Japanese goods, and while a few of them might have been coerced, it was hopeless to attempt to coerce them in millions, not as a mass but individually.

The result was that the boycott won. The government is discouraging one now, however. It wants the present ticklish situation stirred up as little as possible.

Alleged Arson Case Nears End

Arguments Being Made This Afternoon and Case Will Go to Jury Tomorrow Morning.

After failing to make good its charge of yesterday that the district attorney's office of the case of its witnesses the "third degree," the defense in the case of Max Albert, alleged firebug, rested today.

The state put several witnesses on the stand in rebuttal, and this afternoon arguments are being made to the jury. The case will go to the jury tomorrow morning.

STATE CAPITAL NEWS

Salem, Or., Oct. 8.—According to announcement of Secretary Frank Meredith, the attendance at the recent state fair totaled 57,529, a falling off of about 12,000 from last year. The heavy rainfall two days of the week was responsible for the difference. However, it is quite certain that the receipts will more than pay the expenses of the show.

Arrangements have been made to finance the office of county agriculturist of Marion county. A total of \$4100 has been raised or promised, of which \$1200 comes from the county court, \$200 from the Commercial club and \$200 from public spirited citizens. The state will duplicate these sums, making \$3600 and, in addition, there will be \$500 from the government. Under the new arrangement, Luther J. Chapin is made county fire inspector, as well as county agriculturist, and C. O. Constable is to be deputy fruit inspector.
