More than 100 women were present.

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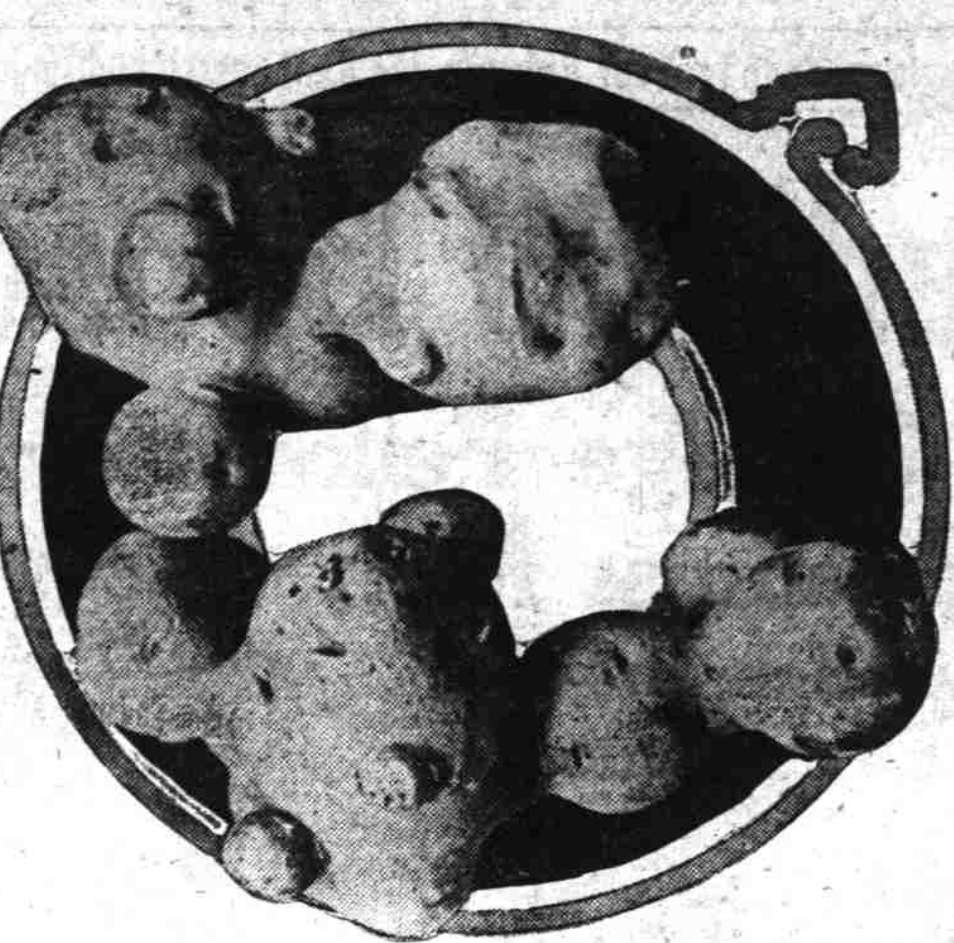
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POTATOES WONDERS IN FACT AS IN NAME

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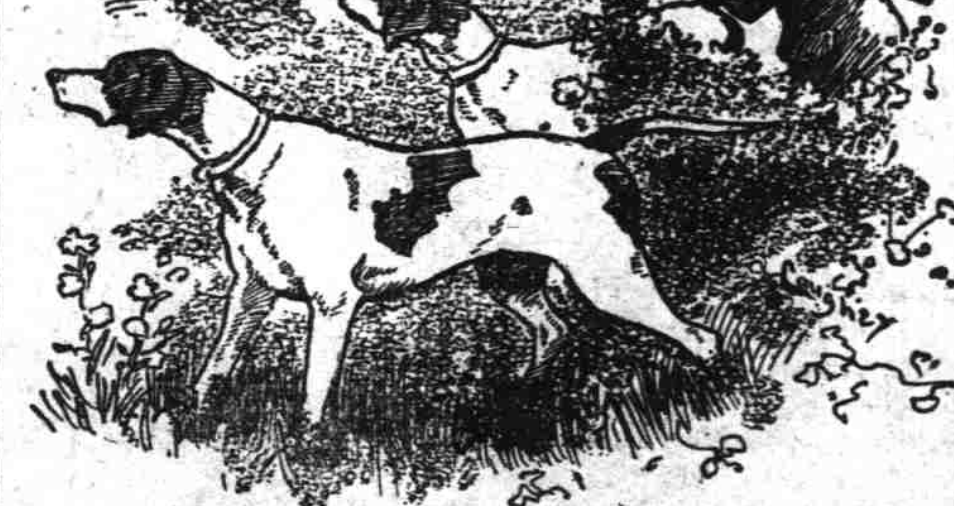
