GREAT BATTLE BUT 100 MILES FROM LONDON

Germans Hurl Themselves Upon Allies' Lines From Amertiers to Ypres and the Sea, in Belgian Territory.

FRENCH SAY GERMAN'S ATTACKS UNAVAILING

Evidently the Germans Broke Through at One Point But Were Driven Back.

Paris, Oct. 17.—A gigantic battle of startling magnitude and great importance is being waged with desperate energy in a field of vast proportions along irregular lines just across the border in Belgium. The Germans have hurled an enormous force against the allies' French, British and Belgian troops who are massed on a front from Amertiers past Lille, to Ypres and then to the sea. It is the blow which has been threatened since the German menace of a new drive on Paris by way of the seacoast became an ever present bogey to Parisians. The battle is being fought within 100 miles of London as the crow flies.

Both armies have driven forward their advance columns until at several points they interlap. Generally speaking, the fighting of the most desperate character is confined to the limits of the quadrangle described by Ypres, Menin, Ostend and a point on the seacoast between Nieuport and the Belgian border.

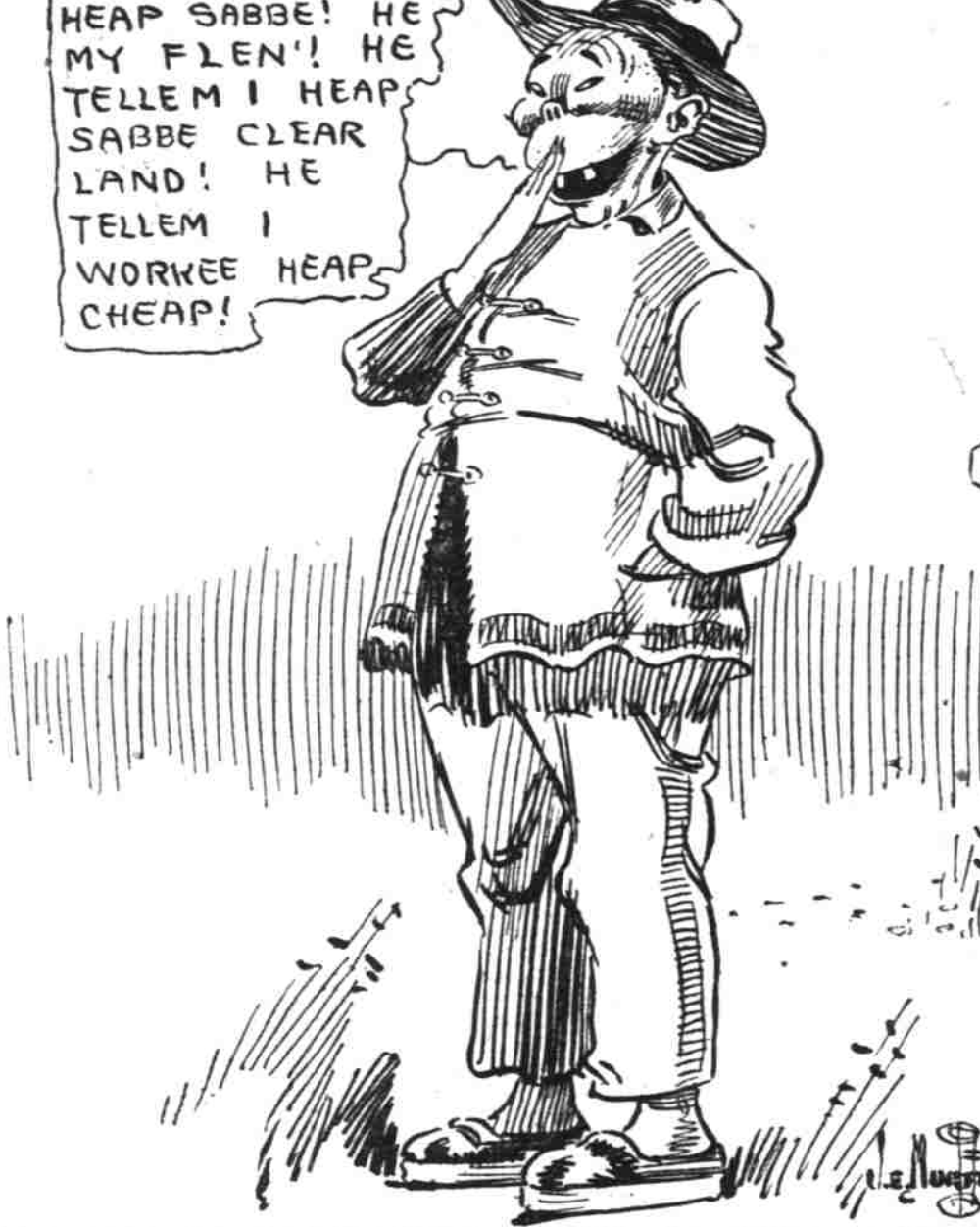
Official statements issued this afternoon and at midnight tonight give a hint of the terrific nature of the fighting in this theater.

The afternoon's communique from Bordeaux declared the German line had not been able to advance west of the line extending from Ostend to Menin through Thourout and Roulers. It is known that engagements of a sanguinary nature have been fought in this region and the statement is interpreted as meaning the allies have held them to this position.

The midnight official statement reported that the French marines had driven the Germans back after an attack on French positions along the canal running in an irregular course from Ypres northward to the sea. From this report it is apparent that the Germans have driven through at some point and have advanced in one section of their line a distance of from 15 to 20 miles, only to be hurled back.

No attempt was made to reconcile these claims by General Gallieni, the commander in chief, to whom the French war office transmitted the bulletin for publication.

LIGHT CRUISER DESTROYS FOUR GERMAN CRAFT

Patrol Boat Sunk of the British Navy Sinks German Torpedo Boat Destroyers Off the Dutch Coast.

FIVE BRITISH WOUNDED, NONE KILLED IN BATTLE

Most of the Crews of the Destroyers, Numbering About 400, Drown.

London, Oct. 17.—England today answered the activities of the German navy. The light protected cruiser Undaunted, accompanied by the destroyers Legion, Loyal, Lennox and Lance, of the L class, sent four German destroyers to the bottom of the North sea off the Dutch coast.

The British navy lost none killed and only one officer and four men wounded in the action. The crews of the German craft, numbering probably 400, all perished with the exception of 31, who are now being sent to a British port as prisoners of war.

This was officially announced by the war press bureau in a statement issued shortly after midnight. It was stated that the British destroyers were slightly damaged by the fire of their German antagonists.

Undaunted is New Vessel.
Whiled up to the present time the identity of the destroyed warcraft of the Kaiser is withheld, it is understood here that they were comparatively old vessels which have been operating from a base in the estuary of the Rhine. They were outclassed by the Undaunted, a brand new cruiser of the light type, which, while of only 3600 tons displacement, has speed of better than 30 knots an hour and only went into commission this year.
