

FREDDIE WELSH FAST GROWING UNPOPULAR AS A RING CHAMPION

Briton Flatly Refuses to Jeopardize Title With More Than 10 Round Go.

IS SIDE-STEPPING RITCHIE

Doubtful If Champion Will Ever Consent to Meet Man From Whom He Took Title in London.

By Hal Sheridan. New York, Oct. 21.—Freddie Welsh, world's lightweight champion, is rapidly becoming the most unpopular scrapper now seeking public favor.

In the first place he stipulated that Ritchie must guarantee a purse for him alone of \$25,000. Then he insists, or says he does, that Willie must beat him \$25,000. Welsh would just as soon tackle the Belgian army as Ritchie in a finish fight.

In the closing rounds of that clash Ritchie chased Welsh all over the ring, the Welshman unable to do more than clinch, sidestep and parry.

It is doubtful if Welsh will ever consent to meet Ritchie again. He says he will, but talk is cheap.

Promoter Crofford of San Francisco offered Welsh \$50,000 for three 20 round bouts. It was more money by at least \$10,000 than Welsh was ever offered before for a similar number of contests in his life.

“Declaration of Principles” Signed by Nearly 60,000 People of Oregon

We, the undersigned, are OPPOSED TO STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION, for the following reasons: There is already in existence a law which permits ANY COMMUNITY to decide this question for ITSELF, known as the LOCAL OPTION LAW. STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION deprives communities of HOME RULE AND LOCAL OPTION. CONTINUED AGITATION of the liquor question and its injection into active politics is HARMFUL, not only to the cause of TRUE TEMPERANCE, but also to the BUSINESS INTERESTS and INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT OF OREGON. Placing Oregon among the “dry” states would RETARD ITS DEVELOPMENT and give COMPETING STATES TO THE NORTH AND SOUTH—Washington and California—AN ADVANTAGE IMPOSSIBLE TO OVERCOME. STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION would throw TEN THOUSAND MEN OUT OF EMPLOYMENT in Oregon. STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION would CONFISCATE much valuable property and DEPRECIATE THE VALUE OF ALL PROPERTY. STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION would DECREASE CITY REVENUES and thereby MATERIALLY INCREASE GENERAL TAXATION. STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION would TURN AWAY FROM THE STATE MANY DESIRABLE SETTLERS, who are SO MUCH NEEDED to improve our WASTE LANDS. STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION would cause the VACANCY IN PORTLAND ALONE of not less than FIVE HUNDRED STORES AND FIFTEEN HUNDRED DWELLINGS, which, at a moderate estimate, are now paying yearly rentals aggregating ONE AND ONE-HALF MILLION DOLLARS and in ALL OTHER CITIES would result in a PROPORTIONATE AMOUNT of vacant stores and dwellings and LOSS OF RENTALS. We favor the STRICT REGULATION of the liquor traffic WHEREVER LICENSED and STRICT ENFORCEMENT of the law in ALL COMMUNITIES, but are OPPOSED TO CONTINUED AGITATION of a measure like STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION, that can accomplish NO USEFUL PURPOSE.
