TOTAL OF NINETY-TWO

Woodworking Industries Occasion Majority of Accidents, With Bailroads a Close Second.

Salem, Or., Oct. 24.—A total of 92 accidents were reported to Labor Commissioner Hoff during the week and there was one fatality. The fatal accident was reported from near Marshfield, where James Tracy was killed while engaged in logging.
