AN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—The Oregon Society of California has issued 600 invitations to Oregonians and members of all other state societies here to a unique Halloween dance, which will be given in the Oregon building in the exposition grounds next Saturday night. This will be the first formal function given in any state building and typifies the "Oregon first" spirit to the letter. The Oregon committee and exhibition officials are cooperating with the society and President Moore has been invited to lead the grand march, while Mayor Rolph is expected to participate and be one of the receiving line.

This affair promises to be distinctly different from any social event ever given in connection with exposition affairs, and the committee on entertainment has some unusual features in store for the entertainment of guests during the dancing program. George Hutchin is chairman of this committee and is exercising his well known talent in this direction, while the orchestra are in charge of W. E. Lenon, who holds the championship of the northwest for such work. There are 48 mammoth log columns surrounding the building, and during this "house warming" it is proposed that each society christen the column representing its particular state.

Hood River and Medford are sending specimen Oregon apples, which, with Oregon cider and pumpkin pies, will furnish the dancing program appropriate for Halloween, but reminiscent of Oregon.
