

Foundry Work Figures.

Salem, Or., Oct. 30 .- The foundries, machine and repair shops of Oregon play an important part in furnishing payrolls for the people of the state, according to Labor Commissioner Hoff, who has secured figures showing that employment is furnished 4228 persons and that the total amount paid out during the last fiscal year for wages was \$4,067,334, skilled workmen receiving \$2,503,968, unskilled \$1,215,477, office males \$343,-471, and office females \$4418. The value of the product was \$15,269,336. There are 140 plants in the state. Skilled workmen averaged \$3.62 a day and unskiled workmen \$2.33.


