

### PROMINENT MEN ARE ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF SWEARING FALSELY

George Kelly, John Burgard, C. A. Burkhardt and Gay Lombard Ones Accused.

### JUDGES MAY BE INVOLVED

Grand Jury Will Be Asked to Investigate Whether Voter in Precinct 41 Was Legally Sworn In.

George Kelly, formerly of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company; John Burgard, prominent insurance man; Charles A. Burkhardt, canneryman, and Gay Lombard were arrested yesterday afternoon by order of Sheriff Ward on a charge of illegally swearing in a voter in precinct 41, the polling place being 57 Fifth street. They will be taken before the grand jury tomorrow afternoon.

The three judges of election in that precinct, Charles E. Lockwood, D. A. Tufts and George L. Smith, will also be taken before the grand jury to answer to the charge of allowing an illegal vote to be cast when they were apprised of the situation.

Sheriff Ward stated today that hundreds of votes were sworn in yesterday by persons working for Booth, Hurlbert and the "wets," and that he is going to investigate every one of them. He said he knew of one man, who is not a property owner as required by law, who signed 40 affidavits for voters being sworn in.

Sheriff's Suspicions Aroused. "I'm going right down the line," said the sheriff, "and investigate every man of this kind. I look to see like there was a lot of illegal voting yesterday and if this be true the persons responsible for it are going to get caught if I can get them."

The deputy sheriffs carried their protests to the judges of election, who expressed the opinion that the men could not legally swear, as the affidavit requires that they know the voters and his place of residence. The men said the word of Mr. Wright was sufficient for them and they signed the affidavit and the election judges accepted the vote.

Glynn."

Whitman said: "The result of the election speaks for itself. That is all I care to say at present."  
Ex-Governor William Sulzer said: "I elected Whitman. More than 350,000 votes were cast for me in the state and it was these votes which assured Whitman's plurality."

**Canoeists Lose All In Tip at Celilo**  
(Special to The Journal.)  
Cascade Locks, Or., Nov. 4.—Dick Adams and Jack Perkins who left Boise, Idaho, September 28 for Astoria, Or., in a canoe, tipped over at Celilo Falls and lost all provisions, guns and cooking utensils. They hung to the boat for three miles and then J. Z. Westerlund picked them up just as Perkins was going down for the last time. The boat is now on Bradford's island, four miles west of Cascade Locks. The men are being continued their journey by railroad, considering it safer than canoeing.

### PHELAN IS ELECTED U. S. SENATOR WITH HENRY A POOR THIRD

California Gives Democrat a Big Vote for Senate; Johnson Re-elected Governor.

### ENORMOUS VOTE IS CAST

Democratic Candidates for Congressmen Are Running Far Ahead of Their Republican Opponents.

(United Press Special Wire.)  
San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Francis J. Heney's enormous vote in Los Angeles county is probably the biggest cause for the victory of James D. Phelan.

This was the statement issued today from Phelan headquarters here, which also declared that their candidate will win by 20,000 votes.  
They declare that he has carried four fifths of the counties of the state.

Phelan for United States senator will carry San Francisco by 20,000," said Registrar Zamansky today. "Every indication is that Knowland will be second and Heney third in this city."

**Johnson Re-elected.**  
Returns to office by a vote that had the proportions of a landslide, Hiram W. Johnson, Progressive candidate to succeed himself as governor of California, defeated Captain John D. Fredericks of Los Angeles, Republican, his nearest competitor, by a plurality which Progressive leaders claimed today would reach close to 100,000.

State Senator John B. Curtin of Tuolumne county, the Democratic gubernatorial candidate, made a sorry showing, running thousands of votes behind James D. Phelan of San Francisco, the Democratic candidate for United States senator.

**Fredericks Loses to Country.**  
Captain Fredericks and his campaign managers refused to concede his defeat. He authorized a statement declaring that although the big centers of population were returning results unfavorable to his candidacy, the country districts, which were largely to be heard from, would give him a lead sufficient to overcome the Johnson lead in San Francisco, Oakland, Los Angeles, Stockton and Sacramento.

Fredericks looks to country. He said he was confident that he would carry the state with the exception of San Diego county. Phelan, the Democratic candidate for senator, was leading Joseph R. Knowland, the Republican nominee, but he was running closely pressed. Francis J. Heney, the Progressive candidate, was running third.

In the prohibition contest, the wets apparently had beaten the Prohibitionists by about 700 votes to one.  
**Eight Hour Law Beaten.**  
The eight hour law was overwhelmingly defeated: Up to 5 o'clock this morning not a precinct in the state had returned a majority in its favor and it appeared to be snowed under by about four votes to one.

Returns from the congressional districts were meager. It was practically certain, however, that William Kettner, the Democratic candidate in the Eleventh district, had defeated James C. Needham, the Republican nominee. Representative William Kent also was leading in the First congressional district and his reelection appeared certain. Denver S. Church, the Democratic candidate in the Seventh congressional district, also was leading in that district.

**Johnson Makes Statement.**  
Governor Johnson early today issued the following statement: "My election apparently is assured. The response of California to four years of good government has been given in no uncertain terms. "The victory is in no sense personal. It is all that I desire for the rule of humanitarian legislation and the regulation by the state of great corporations."

At the headquarters of James D. Phelan the following statement was issued by Secretary Bedford: "Every indication points to the election of Mr. Phelan by at least 10,000 votes. We expect to obtain a plurality of 8,000 in San Francisco if the present ratio of votes keeps up."

**HENEY HAS A SLIGHT LEAD IN LOS ANGELES WITH PHELAN SECOND**  
Los Angeles, Nov. 4.—Twenty-five thousand majority over Captain Fredericks and Senator Curtin was the measure of Governor Johnson's success in Los Angeles county, according to estimates based upon the latest returns early today. Indications were, furthermore, that this total would be increased by every county in southern California except San Diego. Up to an early hour today, however, Fredericks had refused to admit defeat.

Though he fell far below the governor, Francis J. Heney maintained a slight lead in the senatorial count, and Progressive headquarters here claimed that he would carry the county by 2000 plurality. At that hour Phelan and Knowland were a very close second and third.

The Progressives appeared to have been successful in the ninth and tenth congressional districts. William D. Stephens was returned in the tenth, although he was slightly less than Charles H. Randall, Democrat, in the ninth.

from about 30 precincts that San Diego county will give Kettner a plurality of nearly 15,000. Reports from San Bernardino and Riverside counties are favorable to Kettner.

**Election Clerks Quit Jobs.**  
San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Election officials here faced a serious problem today. Worn out from the staggering task of tabulating the results on the extremely long ballots, hundreds of election clerks forfeited their salaries and quit their jobs.

**Randall in Lead.**  
Pasadena, Cal., Nov. 4.—With little more than half the vote counted in the Ninth congressional district, Bell, Progressive, and Randall, Prohibition-Democrat, both claim election. Roberts, Republican, apparently is third. Bell has a strong lead in Pasadena and Long Beach but Randall supporters claim that Los Angeles city precincts give their candidate an estimated plurality of 6000. If this estimate, based on incomplete returns, proves correct, Randall will carry the district.

**California Voting Was Heavy.**  
Pomona, Cal., Nov. 4.—Indications are that L. L. Lottister, Republican, will succeed W. A. Johnstone as assemblyman from the sixty-eighth district.

Pomona voted better than two to one for the dry amendment and gave Fredericks a strong plurality. Roberts and Stephens are running close in the count for congress, with Bell following.

**Defeat Is Admitted.**  
San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Local Republican headquarters here acknowledged today that Captain John D. Fredericks, Republican candidate for governor, has been decisively defeated.

**Prizefighting in Danger.**  
San Francisco, Nov. 4.—That prize fighting will have a close call, if it is not beaten, was indicated today in the legislature.
