WATSON IS PLEASED WITH FIRST YEAR OF THE 'BLUE SKY' LAW

Commissioner Says Statute Has Fully Justified Itself by Protection of Investors.

CHANGES ARE SUGGESTED

Those Who Opposed Measure Are Now Among Its Most Firm Supporters.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Nov. 12.-The corporation department turned \$286,116.30 into the general fund during the year ending June 30 last, according to the first annual report of Commissioner Watson, which has just been printed. During the period ending June 30, the department drove from the market a doubtful or unproven securities, the

Watson expresses gratification over the cooperation of legitimate business staunch friends, he says, "No one who knows half the truth

will be heard to say that the department has not justified Itself, or that the law has not proven itself in its first year, just closed," declares the commissioner. "If every man and woman who catey an honest heart could see the men and women, the ignorant, the unsuspecting and the unsophisticated who go to comprise the army of the defrauded in this state, or could hear the stories of deception that have come into this department since its inception, there would not be a sound of protest against the Blue Sky law, whether it be constitutional unconstitutional, burdensome or

Watson says he is convinced that the blue sky law should be amended, asserting that it is ambigious and cumbersome. He would have the law provide a standard for fraud and suggests the following as the fundamentals of a simple, effective and model blue sky

First. The plain requirement that all men in the promotion, incorporation and financing of corporations or other companies, should deal openly, fairly, honestly, without conceament, reservation or deceit with the investing

"Second. The promise, equally plain and unequivocal, that he who offended against the requirement, or evaded it, would suffer the penalties that the

Watson believes that the addition the prospectus feature of the Engsh Companies Act, linked with the fraud section of the federal law, would work wonders in curbing unscrupulous

With these two fundamental ideas as a groundwork, and a very few amendments to the general statutes, as they now exist, and the Oregon prporation law will be a model for other states to copy, so far as the protection of investors is concerned," says Watson.

He deciares that "promotion stock" has been the curse of Oregon, from the viewpoint of corporate abuses. Capitalization should be controlled, he insists, to the end that it will be no longer possible to capitalize a hope for million dollars.






