

## CHET CHADBOURNE TO BE BEAVER NEXT YEAR ADMITTED BY WALTER

Portland Manager Says He Had Talk With Federal Leaguer Over Returning.

### ALL DEPENDS UPON PEACE

If Outlaw League Comes Under Protection Transfer May Be Made Back to the Blackmen.

With the announcement of peace between organized baseball and the Federal league, look for Chet Chadbourne occupying his old place in center field for the Beavers next year.

Word has filtered through from Los Angeles, where Chad is wintering, conveying a desire to play with Portland again next year. The fleet-footed Kansas City outfielder has told friends that he would rather play in the Pacific Coast league than with the Federal on account of the climate in the east. It is intimated that he would even stand a cut in salary in order to be back with his old manager, Walter McCredie.

Chadbourne was one of the stars of the Federal league last year and was regarded as one of the best leadoff men in the circuit, hitting around .250 in spite of the fact that he was the first to face the pitcher.

When Chadbourne went to the Federal last year, he was probably the most unique player in the league in that he went with the best wishes of the manager from whom he jumped. McCredie stated then that he hoped Chadbourne would make good in the Federal league, did not put him on the blacklist and asserted that whenever he wanted to come back to the Portland club he could do so.

Over the telephone this morning, McCredie admitted that he had had a talk with Chadbourne and had been in correspondence with him.

"Yes, I saw Chad in Los Angeles on our last trip south," said McCredie in answer to a question fired point blank at him, "and we talked over the possibility of his coming back to the Portland club. He intimated that he would like to play with us next year and I told him his old job was open for him. If peace is declared I don't see any barrier that would keep him from coming back to us. I would be mighty glad to have Chadbourne, for he was a ball player exactly of my type."

"Furthermore, I will admit that I have been figuring on him for the outfield for next year, and don't be a bit surprised if you see him reporting for practice next spring in California."

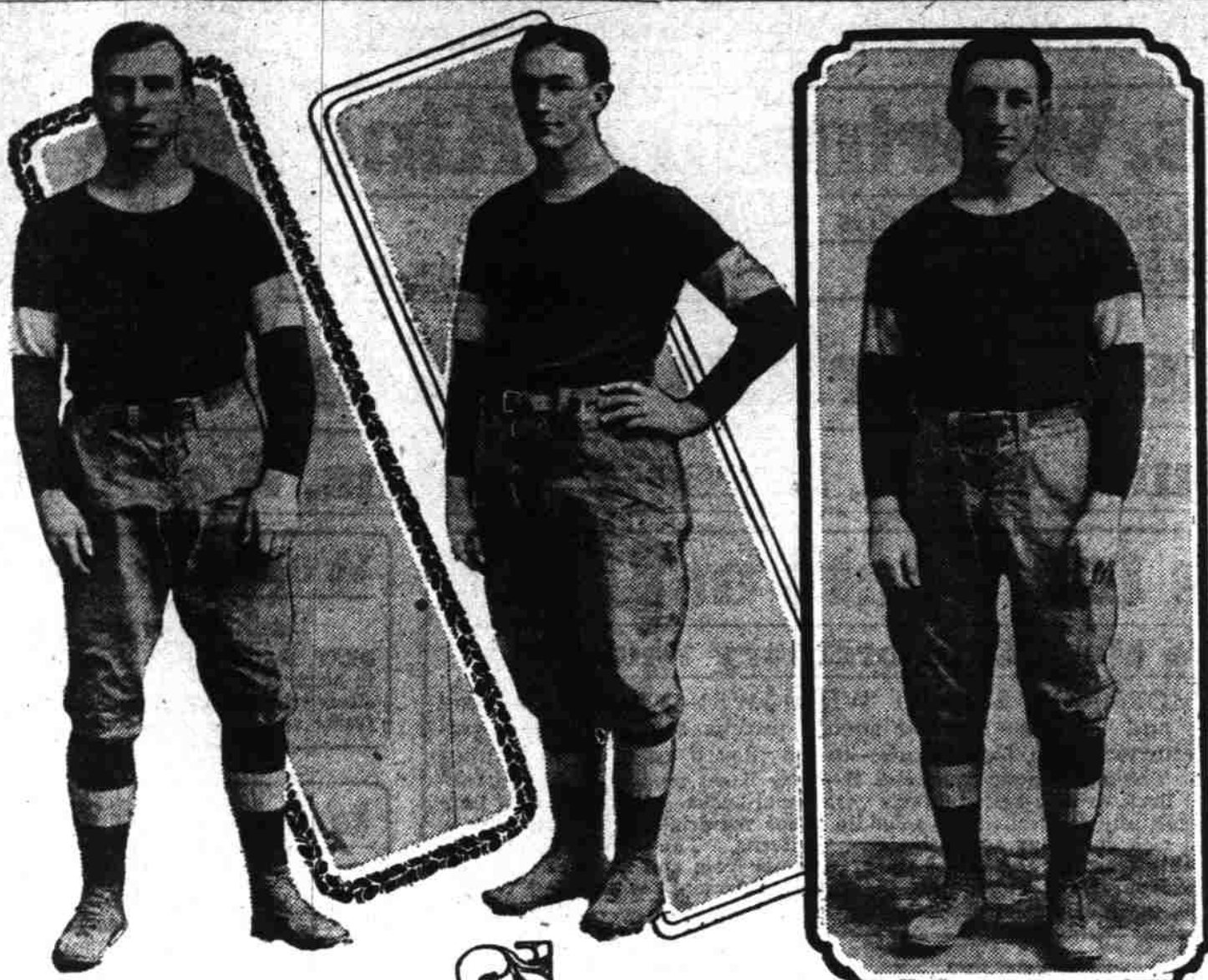

## WATSON CAN'T RAISE COIN AND BATTLE IS OFF

Ritchie Asks Coffroth to Get Him Match With Freddie Welsh.

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—The proposed Thanksgiving day 20-round bout between Willie Ritchie and Red Watson was declared off today and negotiations were on for a Ritchie-Freddie Welsh match instead. Jack Kearns, Watson's manager, was unable to raise his \$5000 guarantee for Ritchie and the former champion announced the cancellation of the match. Immediately after Kearns announced he was unable to post a forfeit, Ritchie called on Promoter James W. Coffroth relative to a match with Welsh. The proposal appealed to Coffroth and the latter immediately wired Harry Pollock, Welsh's manager, concerning it. He expected to hear something definite before night. "All I want you to do is to go ahead and get Welsh," Ritchie told Coffroth. "We will talk terms later. All I want is to get him in the ring again. I am willing to gamble with you on my end of the gate receipts, and I will make the same weight for the bout that I did for the match in London with Welsh."

## U. OF C. RAIDERS PAINT STATUES OF STANFORDS

Palo Alto Students Threaten to Wreck Berkeley Field Next Saturday.

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 13.—A clash between students of the University of California and Stanford university is feared when the rival Rugby squads of the two institutions meet on California's gridiron tomorrow afternoon. At the bottom of the threatened trouble is a raid University of California sophomores made on Stanford Monday night and this action has added new fuel to the long-standing feud between the two universities. When Stanford awoke Tuesday morning the student body found University of California invaders had painted blue and gold petticoat on the statue of Mrs. Leland Stanford and a big yellow "C" on the bronze front of Leland Stanford Jr. More blue and gold paint was splashed upon the memorial arch and other prized possessions.

Students of Stanford say they are determined upon revenge and it is claimed they are planning an invasion to wreck vengeance. They openly assert they intend to demolish the new bleachers on California field, splash red paint on the statues and gates of the university and lastly to dynamite Sather Gate and the big "C."

### Details Completed Tonight.

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 13.—A meeting tonight between Referee Byrns of Vancouver, B. C. and the two coaches and two captains will mark the completion of every detail for the big University of California-Stanford Rugby contest tomorrow afternoon. Scores of workmen have been busy all day putting the finishing touches on the scene of battle. Double sets of incense burners are erected. New driveways have been arranged to facilitate handling the crowds. Everything possible was being done today to protect the playing field from a drizzling rain which fell throughout the forenoon. Rain was predicted for tomorrow and the big game probably will be played on a sloppy field. The game, which will be in two 40 minute halves, with 10 minutes' intermission, will start at 2:30 p. m. Stanford was a slight favorite in the betting.

## JAYNE QUILTS OREGON TRACK TEAM AND BILL HAYWARD LOSES STAR

Athena Long Distance Runner Supposed to Have Been Suffering From Tonsillitis.

### OUT THROUGH NOVEMBER

Youngster Was Sure Point Winner in Distance Events; Departed Because of Finances.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Nov. 13.—When Floyd Payne, the sophomore long distance runner on Hayward's string, failed to run for Oregon in the intercollegiate cross country race at Corvallis last Saturday the students here accepted the excuse that Payne was sick in bed with tonsillitis. Today it was discovered that Payne left school a week ago Thursday, two days before the race.

"Finances," said Bill Hayward, when asked today why Payne left school. "He's a queer boy. I think he'll be back next semester. I don't know where he is."

"Mose left school because of finances and also to meet his father, who has been traveling the past two years, and who has not seen his son in that time. He's in Portland or Athena," said a fraternity brother of Payne's last night.

The registrar's office said yesterday that Payne had not attended classes in November, but he had not taken out the regular "blue," the withdrawal card.

Payne came to Oregon last fall as a freshman and Hayward sent him south to San Francisco immediately to be the sole representative of the University of Oregon in the athletic contests held in the southern city last fall. Payne stayed in school all last year and did yeoman service for Oregon in the spring on the track team, running second to Hobgood of O. A. C. only. He worked his way nearly entirely through last year and was working this year. Payne was always sure of steady employment, as he was a licensed barber and worked in different shops here.

Without Payne, Hayward's track team will miss a sure point winner in the one and two mile events this spring.
