

REAL CHINESE BABY SHOW WILL FORM A FEATURE TONIGHT

Muts to Be in Charge of Oriental Infants at Land Products Exposition.

PRIZES TO BE AWARDED

Hood River District Out 200 Strong
Last Night—Woodmen of World
Join in Special Program.

A real Chinese baby show, the first ever held in the northwest, and the fact that the exhibitors will give away more than 200 prizes, is expected to attract a big crowd to the Manufacturers' and Land Products show at the Armory tonight. The prizes will be in charge of the exhibition of infant orientals and announce that they have no less than 40 entrants already, including a pair of pretty almond eyed twins. Preceding the opening of the show at 8 o'clock there will be a parade through the downtown streets in which the small tots and their mothers, garbed in the finery of Cathay, will ride in automobiles whose motors will keep time to the music of the Chinese band.

Will Give Four Prizes.
Four prizes will be awarded, one for the prettiest baby, one for the tallest, one for the youngest and one for the one best dressed in Chinese costume. The prizes offered by the exhibitors tonight will be the same plan as obtained Monday evening. Each person will be given a numbered ticket at the door and the winning numbers will be displayed in the exhibitors' booths. The value of the prizes range from 25 cents to \$30.

This afternoon the sweepstakes of the old fashioned baby show, held last week, is holding the center of interest at the Armory for the women, while a lecture on dry farming by D. M. Lowe and a meeting of woolgrowers occupied the men.
Last night Hood River day was celebrated by a delegation from the famous district, which numbered 200. They arrived in Portland in the forenoon, enjoyed a banquet at the Benson early in the afternoon and last night shared the honors of the exposition with the Woodmen of the World. Each stage a separate program. The Woodmen paraded from their temple to the Armory and continued the parade through the exposition buildings. Five drill teams went through fancy drills and a short program followed.

Show Closes Saturday.
The Hood River delegation made the Benson hotel headquarters. At 12:30 they held a big banquet in the main dining hall, at which they entertained as guests S. Benson, O. M. Clark and George H. Land, and the Oregon fair commission; Louis Buckley of the land show, and City Commissioner Robert Dieck, a former Hood River resident.

W. L. Clark, vice president of the Hood River Commercial club, presided as toastmaster. Last night Mr. Buckley entertained the Hood River singers who appeared on the program at a dinner and various members of the delegation were honored by local organizations by social gatherings.

Tonight, tomorrow afternoon and tomorrow night are the last opportunities to see the big exposition, as its doors will close Saturday at 11 p. m. and the work of removing the \$100,000 worth of exhibits of Oregon grown and manufactured products will begin. For Saturday night a big time is planned and it is believed that the attendance will be the largest on record for the three weeks.

Passengers on Car Badly Frightened

Telephone Pole Blown Down by High Wind Last Night Strikes Rear End of Streetcar.

Twenty passengers in a Depot and Morrison street car were frightened when a telephone pole was blown upon the car at Nineteenth and Couch streets, in last night's wind storm. Live electric wires added to the confusion. Women began screaming, children cried, while the men in the car were kept busy trying to restore order. The pole struck the rear part of the streetcar as the latter passed, glanced and fell to the pavement, carrying a tangled mass of wires. Emergency wagons soon responded and opened traffic.

An automobile owned by R. E. Case, 54 Rodney avenue, skidded and was blown against a streetcar on the steel bridge when the wind was at its height. A Richmond streetcar hit the wagon of E. V. Stafonson, a rancher living near Boring. The wind turned the wagon near the car as it passed at Twelfth and Caruthers streets. A rear wheel was torn off the wagon.

Limbs from shade trees and ornamental shrubbery were damaged by the wind. Police reports show that the west side suffered the most. In the downtown districts, electric signs were overturned and many blown down. One unusual feature is the small number of glass windows broken. Only a few such reports were made, and these of small windows, the large plate glass ones escaping entirely.
