The money to cover the mortgage has been paid in from rents and contributions of the members of the four camps, Webfoot, Portland, Prospect and George Washington, on the west side of the river. The building is located at 123 Eleventh street, between Washington and Alder, and represents a \$30,000 investment. Preparations for a big celebration and a burning of the mortgage in the near future are being made.

The modern dance is a safety valve for one's spirits, whether old or young. It has been evolved in reply to the demands of our latter-day civilization.

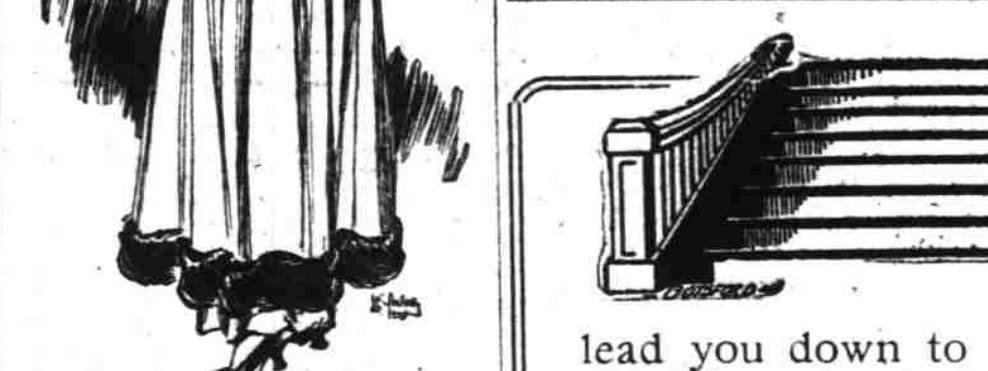
Popular Singer Is Dead.
