Columbia Highway May Be Advertised. County Commissioners Refer Two Propositions to Budget Committee Relative to Exploitation at 1915 Fair. Two propositions for advertising the Columbia river highway at the San Francisco exposition were referred by the county commissioners Wednesday to the budget committee for consideration when the 1915 budget is prepared. The Weister company offered to show hand colored transparencies of views along the highway containing 60 square feet in the Oregon building for \$1152. Many other counties and municipalities are already subscribers to the proposition and the Oregon commission to the fair recommended it to the board. The commission also suggested that \$300 be appropriated to pay for a model of the great highway as a part of the model to be shown of the Columbia river from its mouth to the Celilo rapids. The other part of the model is to cost about \$1000.
