

REAL STORIES OF AUDACIOUS' END STILL MYSTERY

British Admiralty Is Guarding Secret of Sea Tragedy Closely; Doubt as to Fate of Canopus Is Intimated.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Nov. 16.—Replying to questions asked today in the house of commons concerning reports of the loss of the British battleship Canopus, First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill said: "We have every reason to believe that the Canopus is safe."

The first statement contained the first intimation that there was any question concerning the Canopus' safety. Instead of allaying alarm, it gives rise to the belief that the admiral was fearful that the vessel had met disaster.

The Canopus was the battleship dispatched to reinforce Admiral Sir Christopher Cradock's squadron on the Chilean coast, but which supposedly had not joined Cradock at the time the latter met Admiral von Spee's German naval force, with the loss of the British cruisers Monmouth and Good Hope.

Prince Louis of Battenberg resigned as first sea lord on October 29, two days after the Canopus' disappearance. It was declared at the time that he resigned because of criticism resulting from his being of Austrian birth. It is now believed that the Audacious disaster was responsible for his resignation.

LONDON DISPATCH IS VAGUE, SAYS REPAIRS MADE TO AUDACIOUS

New York, Nov. 16.—Whether the dreadnaught Audacious is now lying a helpless, injured mass of steel at the bottom of the North sea or is undergoing repairs was not definitely known here today.

Randolph Beames and Hubert Griffiths, passengers on the steamship New York, which arrived here yesterday, declared they saw the sinking of the Audacious and watched the steamship Olympic, from 10 o'clock in the morning until 6 o'clock in the evening, saving the battleship's crew. Griffiths was bandmaster of the Olympic and Beames was a cornetist.

C. & E. WINS OLD SUIT AGAINST THE STATE; ISLANDS RETAINED

United States Supreme Court Holds It Has No Jurisdiction in the Matter.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Nov. 16.—The Corvallis & Eastern railroad was finally victorious today in the suit brought against it by the state of Oregon. The highest court in the land refused to review the decision handed down by the Oregon supreme court in favor of the railroad.

Angered at Admiralty.

London, Nov. 16.—Although the admiralty had still failed today to admit the loss, the public felt no doubt that the dreadnaught Audacious really was destroyed, as reported, by a German mine in the North sea.

Acceptance of the disaster as a fact caused anger, rather than gloom, and the feeling was plainly expressed against the British naval administration. The sentiment has been growing since the early days of the war that King George's fleet has not been giving satisfactory account of itself, and every succeeding loss which it suffers, with no corresponding damage to the Germans, evidently adds to this feeling.

No Developments.

Berlin, via The Hague, Nov. 16.—Unfavorable weather is interfering with fighting in northern France and Belgium. It was officially stated today. Several hundred British and French were said to have been taken prisoners but no important developments were reported. The campaign in the east was declared to have reached no decisive stage as yet.

WAR SUMMARY BY J. W. T. MASON

New York, Nov. 16.—The reported sinking of the British dreadnaught Audacious is the latest mystery of the European war thus far. This is not because of the London admiralty's attempt to conceal the disaster—it is because the catastrophe occurred, off the Chilean coast, 700 miles from the British naval center in the North sea.

Eye witnesses who tell of the vessel's destruction assert that a large fleet of warships was in the immediate vicinity, the suggestion being made that the squadron included four superdreadnaughts and five dreadnaught cruisers.

It is upon such craft that the British must rely for victory if the Germans should risk a sea battle. It would require 24 hours of fast steaming, however, to take the vessel from the northern Irish coast to the Dogger bank in the event of a sudden clash in the latter area, where presumably the two fleets would engage one another. And the battle unquestionably would be won in less than a day.

Admiralty Divided Fleet.

The idea that the Germans would ever be able to catch the British with their fleet is a thing of the past. The news leaked out of the fate of the Audacious, been deemed too fanciful for practical consideration. Yet this very unfavorable thing appears to have been ordered by the British admiralty—for tactical practice.

Had the Germans seized the opportunity, they might have attacked the British fleet off the coast of the Dogger bank, where the British fleet was concentrated, and the result would have been a victory.

Explains Suppression of Facts.

This inexplicable order for target practice off the Irish coast probably accounts for the admiralty's anxiety to conceal the fact that the Audacious met disaster. The Audacious, too, it would have constituted an admission that superdreadnaughts were being detached from the North sea base at the most critical times there to Great Britain's history.

Certainly nothing could create greater uneasiness on the British public's part than the knowledge that such a disaster had been authorized.

On the Surface, the Incident Suggests a Contemptuous Disregard by the Admiralty of the Possibility of a German Attack.

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EIGHT CHINESE SUSPECTS IN STREET BATTLE ARE DETAINED

Quarantine Applies ONLY TO CATTLE FROM INFECTED DISTRICTS

Common Carriers Requested to Insist on Disinfection of Cars and Yards.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Nov. 16.—Governor Wells' proclamation, upon recommendation of the State Livestock Sanitary board, declaring a quarantine against the entrance of all cattle, sheep, other ruminants and swine, coming from the states of Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Virginia and Wisconsin, and all other states where the maulady known as foot and mouth disease is now or may hereafter become prevalent, and the transportation of such animals between points in this state, unless inspection has first been made and permission given by the proper state or federal authorities, provides that the quarantine shall apply to shipments of livestock from clean counties or units in said states, when such shipments are made in disinfected cars, unloaded on routes in disinfected yards, and are accompanied by a health certificate issued by a federal inspector.

Louis Quong, president of the Chinese Peace society of San Francisco, as soon as he heard of the trouble here, dispatched two peace emissaries to the Chinese district here, and if they are said to have arrived this morning.

Until these peace negotiations are concluded, no definite charges will be made of anything will be done toward securing the indictment of the Chinese involved by the district attorney's office.

Chicago Yards Open.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 16.—The Union stockyards here were reopened today, after being closed for a week because of the foot and mouth disease having expired. Cattle receipts were 7000 head, only one third of the normal Monday run, but conditions were expected to pick up to the usual standard in a few days.

The price of cattle was only 10 cents higher than on November 6, when the stockyards were closed. Hogs were from 40 to 50 cents higher.

Quarantine Is Extended.

Washington, Nov. 16.—On account of the continued spread of the foot and mouth disease, the government today extended the quarantine to Connecticut and Montana. Sixty states are now affected by the federal quarantine order.

Mexican Crisis Reviewed.

"The republic Mexico," said General Gutierrez in his letter, "has during the last few years undergone a terrible crisis in which democratic ideas of government and the yearning of the people for justice and economic improvement finally have been vindicated. Civil strife finally has ended with the overthrow of the Huerta dictatorship."

The letter recited the history of the peace convention, saying that a majority of the military chiefs had selected Gutierrez as provisional president. "The republic," he added, "exists in our republic unless it represents the will of the Mexican people. The day of the dictator has passed forever. The reforms to which the constitutionalists are pledged will be carried out."

Posse Lands Men; Confess to Robbery

Drain, Or., Nov. 16.—Four men who robbed the hardware store of W. W. Kent at this place last Friday night were brought here Saturday from the headquarters of Smith river, about 20 miles northwest of Drain, by E. Walker and Addison Burns, who had been deputized for the purpose.

Word was brought in by the mail carrier, who carries mail between here and Gunter postoffice, that men were seen in that vicinity carrying new Winchester rifles and were wearing new shoes which goods answered the description of those taken from Mr. Kent's store.

A posse of men, headed by Burns and Walker, immediately started out and the robbers were taken into custody without offering resistance. Mr. Kent, having kept the numbers of the rifles, identification was positive and the men promptly confessed to the crime. The deputies arrived in town with their prisoners in time to catch the afternoon train for Roseburg, whither they were taken.

QUARANTINE APPLIES ONLY TO CATTLE FROM INFECTED DISTRICTS

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The quarantine is also made to apply to the entrance and use of all such material and other biologicals which are of animal origin, unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the state veterinarian that there is nothing in the evidence to show that the material or persons who came from the territory where the same is manufactured.

In order that the governor's office may avoid the necessity of ordering a quarantine which would in any manner interfere with local livestock shipments, all common carriers engaged in the transportation of such shipments are earnestly requested to see that all stock cars and yards are thoroughly disinfected, and that all livestock promulgated by the Oregon state livestock sanitary board for the purpose of preventing the spread of the disease are accompanied by a health certificate issued by a federal inspector.

May Ask Amendment.

As the result of the discovery of the alleged fraudulent signatures, it is probable that a movement will be made to have the legislature amend the recall provisions of the charter to provide for the placing of recall petitions in the hands of the city auditor, county clerk or secretary of state, according to the jurisdiction.

The plan is to have recall petitions placed in the hands of these officials, according to the rank of the person at whom the recall is directed. The Portland Commercial club today received final advices indicating that every special train that brings delegates from the east will terminate in Portland rather than break up at Seattle. This means that somewhere near 100,000 people will visit the Rose City in 1915, besides the army of tourists not attracted by conventions.

CITY AUDITOR SAYS THERE IS NO DOUBT OF RECALL FORGERIES

Guilt of Some of Circulators of Petition Seems to Be Evident, Asserts La Roche

SIGNATURES FRAUDULENT

Plan to Amend Recall Provision of Charter May Be Started as Result of Discovery.

That there is no question as to the guilt of some of those who circulated the recall petitions, and that they can be prosecuted under the general forgery laws, is the statement of City Attorney La Roche this morning.

"This off the following the discovery by the city council that a number of names were fraudulent," said Mr. La Roche, "immediately started an investigation. Detectives were employed to discover those names which had been forged, and the result of their work, together with other information collected, was turned over to District Attorney Evans."

Recall Matter First to Be Given to the Grand Jury and Let Them Proceed on the Evidence, Instead of Learning from members of the recall committee whether there is anything in the evidence to show that the signatures had been forged.

"In one case we discovered that the address given by one of the circulators of the petition was in the center of the city and that the person whose name was found on the petitions never signed them. There is no question that these signatures are fraudulent, and those guilty can be prosecuted under the general forgery laws."

"It seems strange to me that even before the matter is placed before the grand jury the statement should be made that there is nothing in the evidence to show that the members of the recall committee knew of the forgeries."

It would be rather remarkable that those in charge of the recall movement should not have known that there were a number of forgeries, when a glance through the petitions would have shown that a number of signatures undoubtedly written by the same person.
