

### CAUSE OF DEATH BY ELECTRIC SHOCK 'IS NOT AS YET SOLVED

Albert Nachtigall Killed in Bath Tub by Normal Current, Is General View.

### MATTER IS INVESTIGATED

Fatal Accident Result of Grounding of Circuit When Man Grasped Bulb, Says Claim Agent Boynton.

Although 10 days have elapsed since Albert Nachtigall was killed by electricity as he lay in the bathtub in his home, 568 Lexington avenue, Thanksgiving morning, no final and definite explanation has been reached as to the reason for the fatal accident. The consensus of opinion is that the young streetcar conductor's death resulted merely from the normal electric current flowing through the wires in the regular way—the danger and death coming because he was lying in a tin bathtub filled with water.
