Chamber Favors Free Bridge.—The chamber of commerce yesterday reported to the county commissioners that its members favored a free bridge over the upper deck of the railroad bridge rather than a toll bridge, as suggested in a petition by the O-W-R. N. company for the county board to fix tolls to be charged. The board requested opinion from the chamber and from the commercial club, desiring some guidance before the question was settled. The bridge question will be determined finally January 5.

Lot Owner Accepts Offer.—Condemnation proceedings by the Portland school district against Mary Ellen Fawkes were brought to a close yesterday when Mrs. Fawkes accepted the offer of \$2100 made by the board in its complaint for the lot in Malone Heights wanted as part of the site for a new school. The board had purchased the remainder of a block from Mrs. Fawkes, but could not agree with her on the amount to be allowed for the lot in question. She asked for a much higher allowance.
