It is expected that the membership of the society will reach 100 women within the next week. Meetings will be held each Tuesday afternoon. Baroness von Lohneysen has been the moving spirit in the work and has been chosen president of the society. Baroness von Gleserwald has been elected vice president and Mrs. Cecil Schmitz, secretary-treasurer. The women will knit warm woolen socks, wristlets and protectors for the soldiers fighting on the snow swept European battlefields.

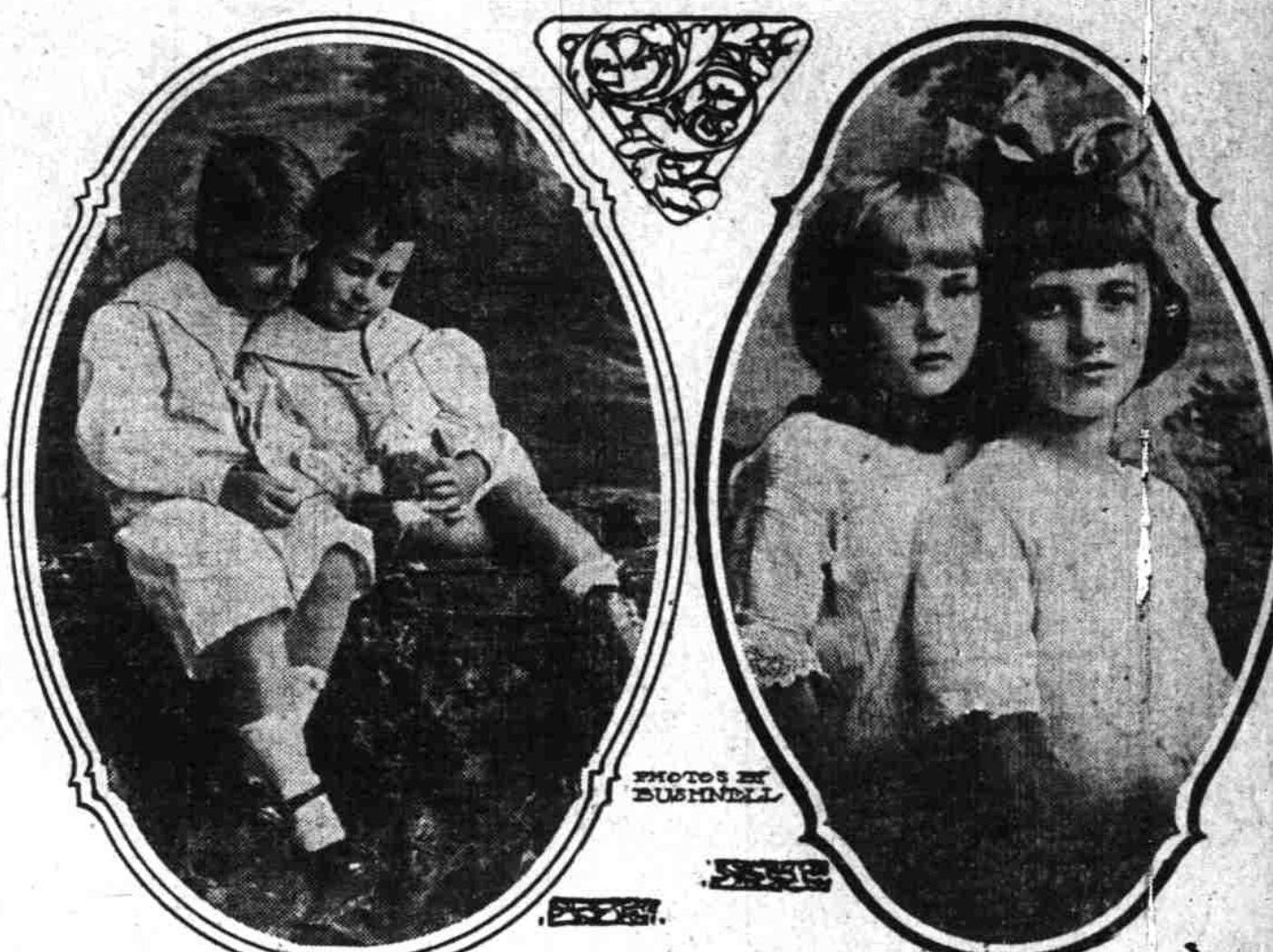
