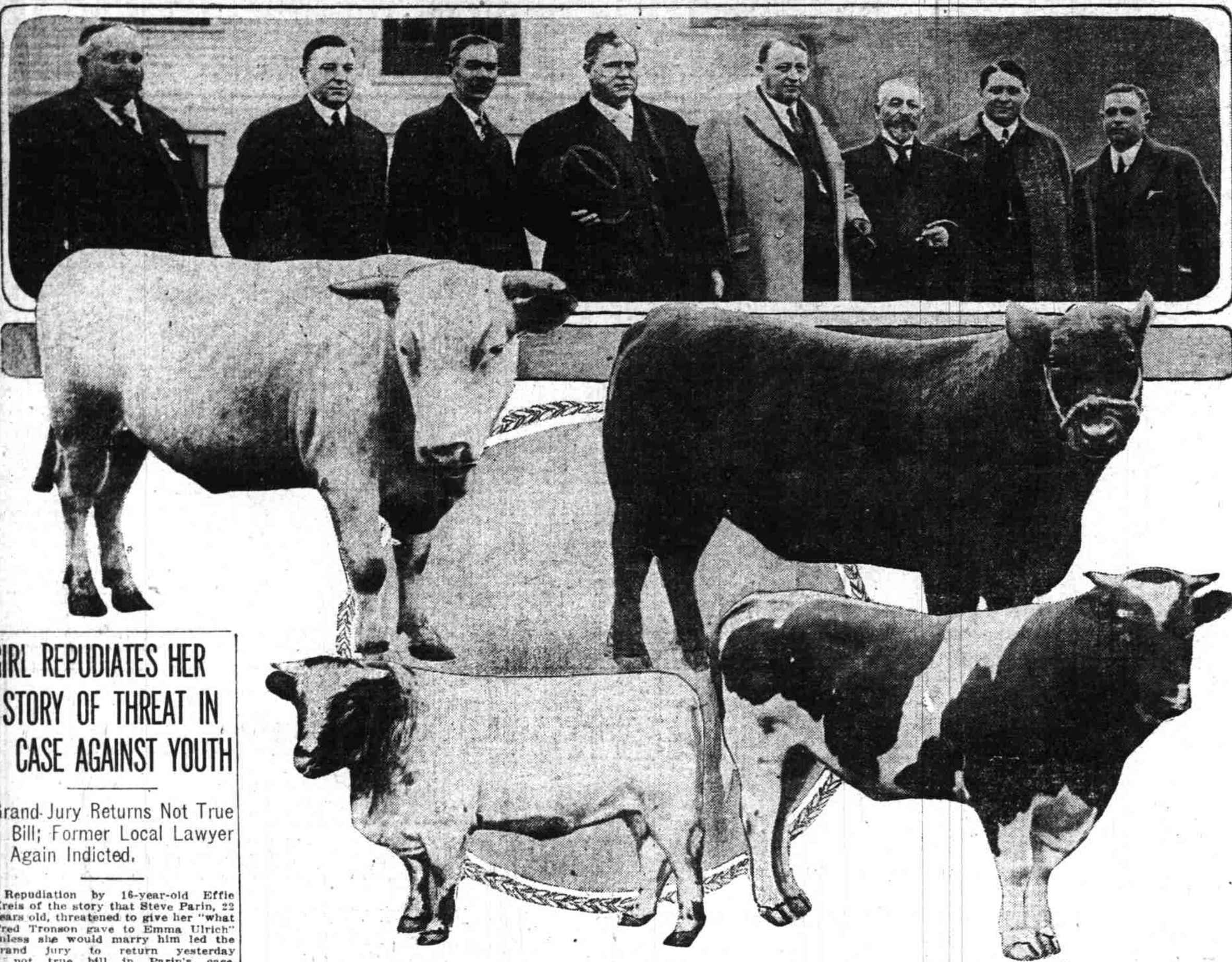


STOCK SHOW COMES TO SUCCESSFUL CONCLUSION LAST NIGHT

The Fourth International Pacific Livestock exposition which was held in the Union stockyards throughout the week, came to a successful conclusion last night and hundreds of stockmen and buyers who attended the show are already en route to their homes in various parts of the west, or are preparing to depart immediately.

At the close of the exposition last night General Manager O. M. Plummer announced that the fifth annual show will be held next year in Portland from December 6 to 11 inclusive, and that efforts will be made to make it a bigger and better show than ever yet held.

The presence of the foot and mouth disease in the east was responsible for the absence of breed stock at this year's show. Officials had arranged to exhibit the animals and had posted several thousands of dollars as prizes, and then called off this division for the reason that they desired to take no chances in view of epidemic conditions in the middle west. The disease has not yet appeared on the Pacific coast, and the precautions taken are only in keeping with the general vigilance being maintained by all western cattlemen at the present time to prevent it.

Attendance 35,000 to 40,000. According to officials of the show between 35,000 and 40,000 people visited the show during the week, which was a remarkable showing when the distance of the yards from the city and the fact that breed cattle were not exhibited are taken into consideration. A heavy attendance of outside breeders and feeders was noted. Yesterday afternoon was school children's day at the exposition and a huge crowd of youngsters swooped down on the yards and put in hours getting acquainted with the yards and the hogs, sheep and cattle therein.

The children were under the guidance of the "Mutt" members, who were present in sufficient numbers to see that the boys and girls did not get lost or expose themselves to harm. Children's day at the show is considered one of importance, not from the dollar view, but distinctly so from the standpoint of "sense." Every effort is made to instruct them in the various breeds of animals on show, and to explain the high points of the stock raising and packing business.

"We were very much pleased at the deep interest shown in the exposition this year," said Mr. Plummer. "Next year we will make it a much better and bigger show. Hundreds of stockmen and buyers came long distances to attend the exposition, see the stock and buy with a view of improving their herds. Virtually every point in the northwest was represented, and much good will came from the show in every line."

Educational Value Seen. "The educational value of such an exposition is immense among cattle men. No matter how experienced a breeder or feeder is, he always can learn something new, and the shows are naturally the place for interchange of ideas, as well as breeding stock."

"The idea of pure bred stock is rapidly taking hold on the Pacific coast. Pure bred stuff is the only kind that a man should handle. Shows go far to prove the value of blooded stock."

The sales this year were well attended and the prices paid were very good, all things considered. The sale included 50 pure bred Shorthorns; more than 200 Holsteins, several carloads of hogs, and some sheep. The Holstein sale ended yesterday afternoon.

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Gerard Saves Girl From German Jail

United States Ambassador and Consul Advance \$100,000 to Creditors of Daughter of a British Peer.

London, Dec. 12.—How the daughter of a British peer was saved from a German prison through the efforts of American Ambassador Gerard at Berlin and T. St. John Gaffney, consul general in Munich, has been revealed here through the return of the Honorable Mary Isabel Portman to the residence of her father, Viscount Portman.

The Honorable Mary only escaped incarceration for her inability to pay contractors who built a \$100,000 villa for her near Munich because at first Mr. Gaffney and then Mr. Gerard deposited with the Bavarian authorities \$50,000, which came from their own pockets.

Mr. Gaffney, who is also in England now, will obtain from Lord Portman security to carry back to Mr. Gerard for the \$50,000 deposit which Viscount Portman cannot pay to an enemy alien until the war is over.

The builders got a warrant out for Miss Portman's arrest for nonpayment of their bills. She appealed to Mr. Gaffney, who accompanied her

to the police station, where both remained five hours until Mr. Gaffney was able to get \$50,000 in cash to deposit as bail for her.

Finally Mr. Gaffney, following another heated demand from the contractors for payment in full, volunteered to advance the additional \$50,000 to Miss Portman.

Canada Has More Men for England

Second Newfoundland Contingent Is Nearly Ready and Is Expected to Sail Before End of Month.

St. John's, N. F., Dec. 12.—The second Newfoundland contingent for the British army is being raised and is expected to sail for England with another Canadian contingent the end of the present month. The earlier contingent comprised 540 men, and it is planned to have the new contingent of about the same number.

Recruiting for the naval reserve also is proceeding rapidly. Five hundred and sixty men of the naval reserve already have been sent to England, 200 more are on the training ship Calypso ready to go, and the present recruiting is expected to raise 1000 men.

Pickpockets Find Many Pockets Bare

Impossible to "Lift" More Than \$15 a Week in War Times. Thieves Tell Police Officials.

New York Dec. 12.—More than 100 pickpockets, unable to make a living by following their vocation, have turned temporarily honest within the last two months, and have sought work, according to records made public today by the department of correction.

"Old time pickpockets tell us," said Deputy Commissioner Lewis, "that by rifling 50 or 60 pockets a day they can make only \$15 or so a week. They used to be able to retire for a month after picking half a dozen pockets. People haven't been carrying money in their clothes recently."

"Some of the pickpockets have turned gunmen. This day account in part for the so-called crime wave. If the situation continues all the pickpockets in the city probably will go out of business."

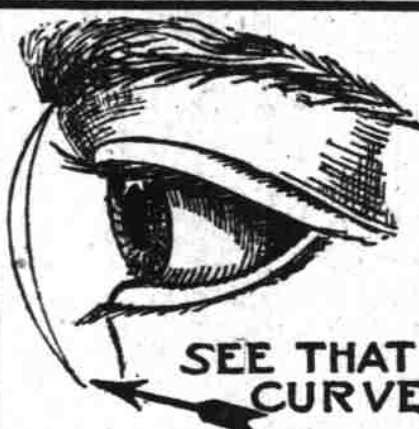
