WOMEN'S CLUBS Council of Women Voters. At a joint session of the advisory board and bureau of social equity, called to order by the president, Mrs. Viola May Cook, the problem of handling the present population now frequenting saloons was discussed and the following resolution passed:

WOMEN'S CLUBS (Continued) "Realizing the need of social centers to supply the demand of those who are lacking in home or club life, we urgently request the committee of one hundred and other influential citizens to work out plans by which some of the saloons may be maintained in the same locations as at present, but with the purpose of providing a place for the social games, music, rest and the sale of hot coffee and other legitimate drinks and food. We suggest that if change is effected, a special committee of citizens be appointed to investigate regularly and report on conditions."

WOMEN'S CLUBS (Continued) Mrs. A. C. Newell, chairman of the committee to encourage elimination of the clause inquiring age (other than legal age) when registration is made, reported the committee had been encouraged and would make further report later. A report was made by Helen Miller Senn, chairman of the committee to draft outlines of law to be presented to the legislature and making women eligible as jurors and requiring women to be placed on a jury where women and children are involved.

WOMEN'S CLUBS (Continued) Mrs. Buland, Mrs. Senn, Mrs. Hidden, Mrs. Carroll, Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Newell are the members of the bureau to consider this and other laws. Mrs. J.
