## QUALITY OF SERVICE IS SAID TO DEPEND COMPETITION

## Rule as Affecting Public Utilities Discussed by Special Assistant C. J. Smyth.

## ARE CITED INSTANCES

Federal Expert Has Had Wide Experience in Conducting Investiga. tions in the Land.

C. J. Smyth special assistant to the attorney general of the United States, believes that the quality of service received by the public from public utilities depends upon the degree of competition between them. Mr. Smyth has conducted an investigation into competition which has taken him across the nation and into many states. He has been in Portland some time, first in connection with the government's action in the Bell Tele-phone case, and now in connection with the Oregon & California land

case. Whenever competition becomes unnecessary in power and fight or telephone service it is time for public ownership to step in, he said during a

conversation last week. "Competition is an absolute necessity. Nothing can take its place. It is a force, an ever present urge, stim-ulating the business affected, the manager in charge, the employes connected with it, to do everything in their power to give the best service at least cost.

"Competition intensifies the striv-ing for business, makes the utility do everything possible to please its customers

"Regulation of public utilities can not accomplish what competition can, for take its place. Regulation is something guite remote from the conduct of those affected. If two companies are engaged in competition they will display an energy in giving service that no amount of regulation will bring about.

"Regulation, in the minds of the managers, is something away off, something which they may escape. something that is slow to move. Per-haps it may be six months after complaint is made before action will be had, and that is a long time to wait for relief. Regulation is never so prompt and efficient as competition. "This is true whether the service spoken of is electric light, power or telephones. "Whenever there is no need for competition, the business ought to be

owned by the public. Private monop-oly is intolerable and indefensible.

They organize the best plants, they employ the most efficient man-agers, they demand the very best of service, and the number of telephone users has been multiplied into the millions.
