

PUGET SOUND TUG BOAT COMPANY HERE SEEKING BUSINESS Tugs Pioneer and Tatoosh to Join Goliath Off Mouth of River.

COMPETITION PROMISED George E. Plummer, General Manager, Arrives from Seattle With Details of Plans.

The Puget Sound Tug Boat company's tug Goliath has been off the mouth of the river since Thursday morning, George E. Plummer, general manager of the company is here and the tugs Pioneer and Tatoosh will be down early in the week.

Announcement that the Goliath was off the river seeking tows caused surprise on the waterfront. The presence of competition, will result, it is believed, in the port being given the best service it has ever had.

Plummer's announcement this morning was very much to the point. His company has no tariff, he says. It will take ships at what it can get them for, but it does not expect to have a tariff.

In this way we can get the greatest efficiency for the lowest possible cost," said Mr. Plummer to a group in the neighborhood of 50 sailing vessels, the greatest amount of sailing tonnage in the harbor.

Misfortune, which attended the Isthmian from the time she steamed from San Pedro, reached a climax when the richly laden tug was impaled on a submerged rock about 50 yards from the northern end of San Benito Island.

The entire cargo probably will be discharged and the tug sent to San Francisco to be repaired.
