

GERMAN TRANSPORT SHIP LOST IN RAID ON GREAT YARMOUTH

British Warship Said to Have Sent Vessel Crowded With Men to the Bottom.

SECRECY IS MAINTAINED

Extra Troops Have Been Married to Coast Since Attack Took Place—Midland Protected.

(United Press Special Wire.) London, Dec. 21.—(By Mail to New York.)—Behind the recent raid on Great Yarmouth was the first actual attempted invasion of England, a visitor from the east coast today informed the United Press.

"The Germans lost a great transport ship, crowded with hundreds of troops, but the remainder of the expedition escaped."

The east coast resident declared he received the information from a naval man who actually took part in the fighting. According to him, a British warship sent the transport to the bottom, but he declared he was sworn to secrecy as to details and declined to say whether all were drowned or any efforts were made to pick up survivors.

When doubt was cast on the story, the speaker retorted: "Folks also refused to believe the report of the Audacious disaster because the authorities did not issue the news, but now you know it is true."

In support of his story he pointed to the fact that since the raid occurred, extra troops have been hurried to the east coast; all the main railroads to London and the midlands have been protected by additional trenches and wire entanglements; local residents had been organized into companies of mounted and foot special constabulary with full instructions to deal with the population and prevent panic, and a complete list of food-stuffs, horses, vehicles, arms and ammunition had been compiled for use in emergencies.

All the east coast, he declared, is in daily expectation of a second visit from the Kaiser's legions, and preparations are complete for the emergency of a successful German landing.

It may be noted by the date of this story that it was written before the raid last Wednesday on Scarborough, Hartlepool and Whitby by German cruisers. For obvious reasons, it could not be called. There is no confirmation of the story told by the east coast of the loss of a German transport, and it has not been hinted before that the German raid upon Yarmouth was of such a serious nature. The German raiders escaped in this instance, as they did Wednesday.

MANY PEOPLES OF MANY MINDS MAKE UP BALKAN STATES

Peninsula Has as Many Tongues as Broke Out at the Tower of Babel.

Washington, Dec. 21.—Some of the leading characteristics of the Balkan region, that part of the world which a confusion of races, languages, customs, nations, religions, and traditions has caused to be the centuries-long theatre of seething, incessant religious and racial struggles are described in a statement by the National Geographic society. It says:

"Many peoples of many minds meet on the fringe between the east and the west, the Balkan peninsula, and each of these peoples clings tenaciously to its language, its traditions, its religion, and to the manners and ways of its kind. Several families of the Slavonic people, each with its own tongue and patriotism, are there. The Turks, the Greeks, and a sprinkling of Germans, together with many fragmentary types of peoples— from west and east, survivors of nations and tribes of yesterday's history, add to the kaleidoscopic bewildering. The Balkan lands are a Babel through which no ordinary 'master of tongues' may hope to go without the aid of an occasional interpreter and much use of sign language.

Patriotic to the Core.

"In the hearts of most of these peoples, no matter how small their land or how little the world may know of them, there is kept alive a fiery consciousness of their nationality. The Montenegrin is as devoted a native of his small bowl of a country among the

by the wiles of a trapper to whom pellets are pelted.

Development Is Retarded.

"All the energy, destruction and clamor which the friction between its many contrary types of people and the ruggedness of the terrain has retarded the development of the Balkan peninsula so that it is some generations behind the achievements of the west; and the traveler in the byways of this country has had to put up with those same inconveniences which he would encounter in undeveloped Asia. The roads in the Balkans are bad, in most cases mere cattle and footpaths. The villages are equally ill-kept, without improvements, without comforts, without conveniences.

Oregon City, Or., Dec. 21.—This morning was the coldest of any during the present cold snap. At 9 o'clock the thermometer stood at 16 degrees above zero. The Willamette river is full of floating ice and is almost frozen across above the falls. The Clackamas river and Abernathy creek are completely covered with thin ice. All the lakes in the vicinity are frozen and have been the mecca for skaters for almost a week.

Zero at Pendleton.

Pendleton, Or., Dec. 21.—Pendleton experienced its first zero weather last night, since January 7, 1912. The official thermometer registered even zero. At 10 this morning the mercury was 10 above.

Idaho Town in Darkness Because Ice Clogs Flume of Electric Light Plant.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 21.—With both feet frozen so badly that amputation may be necessary, John McDermott, farm laborer of Silver Hill, Wash., limped into the emergency hospital from the O-W-R. & N. yards here last night. He had attempted to sleep in a box car. This was the first serious case from cold so far, although there is considerable suffering among the unemployed.

O-W-R. & N. boat traffic on Lake Coeur d'Alene was suspended Sunday because of heavy ice. Most of the smaller lakes are frozen over.

Grangeville, Idaho, is in darkness, ice clogging the flume to power plant.

Tillamook Pipes Freeze.

Nehalem, Or., Dec. 21.—The entire Tillamook county is experiencing the coldest weather for more than 20 years. For more than a week the thermometer has been below freezing point. In the cities water pipes have frozen, and in some cases people have been without direct water service for several days at a time.
