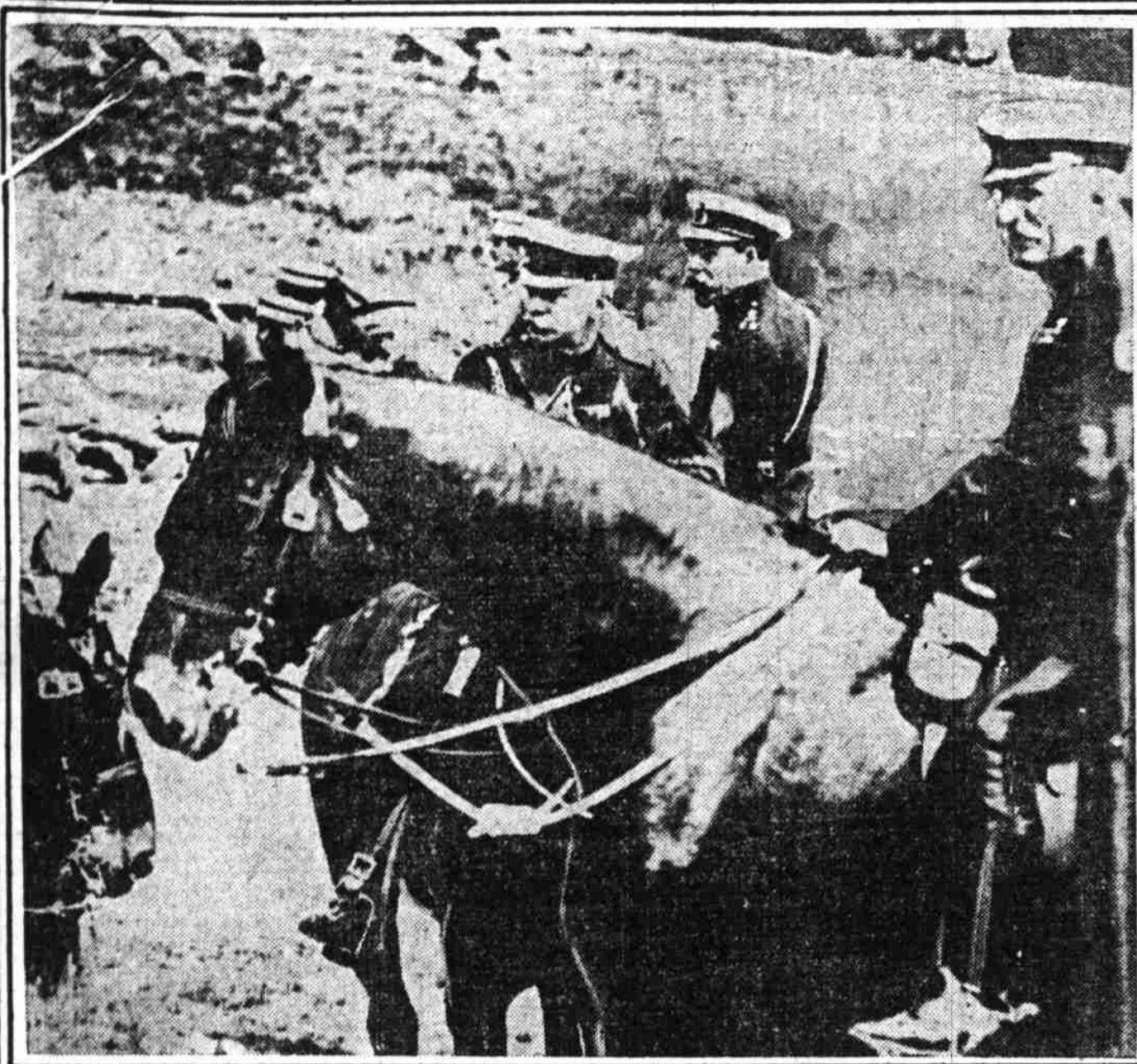
Section of trenches lost near Hollebeke. Germans establish new line near Ypres. French capture trenches in Lens region.

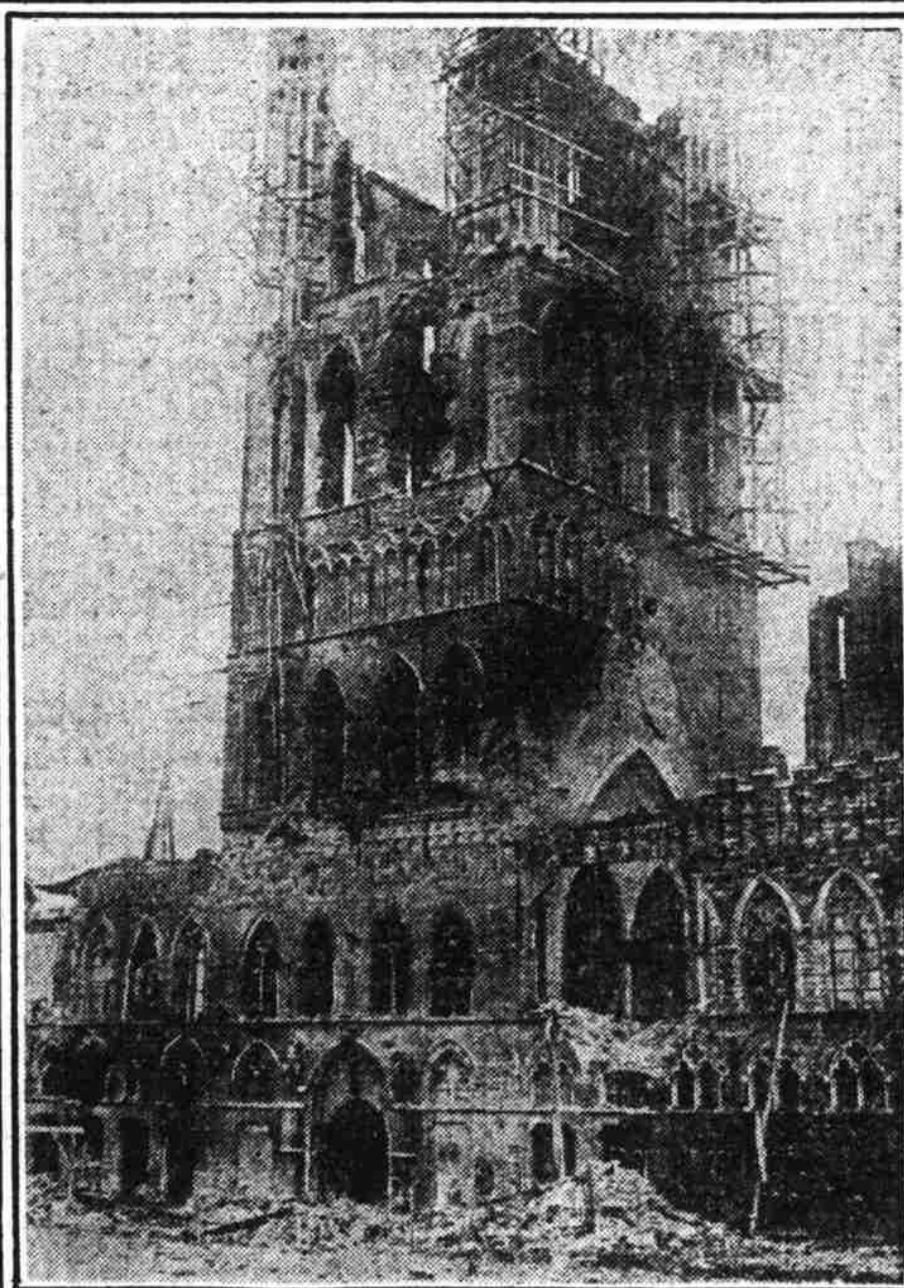

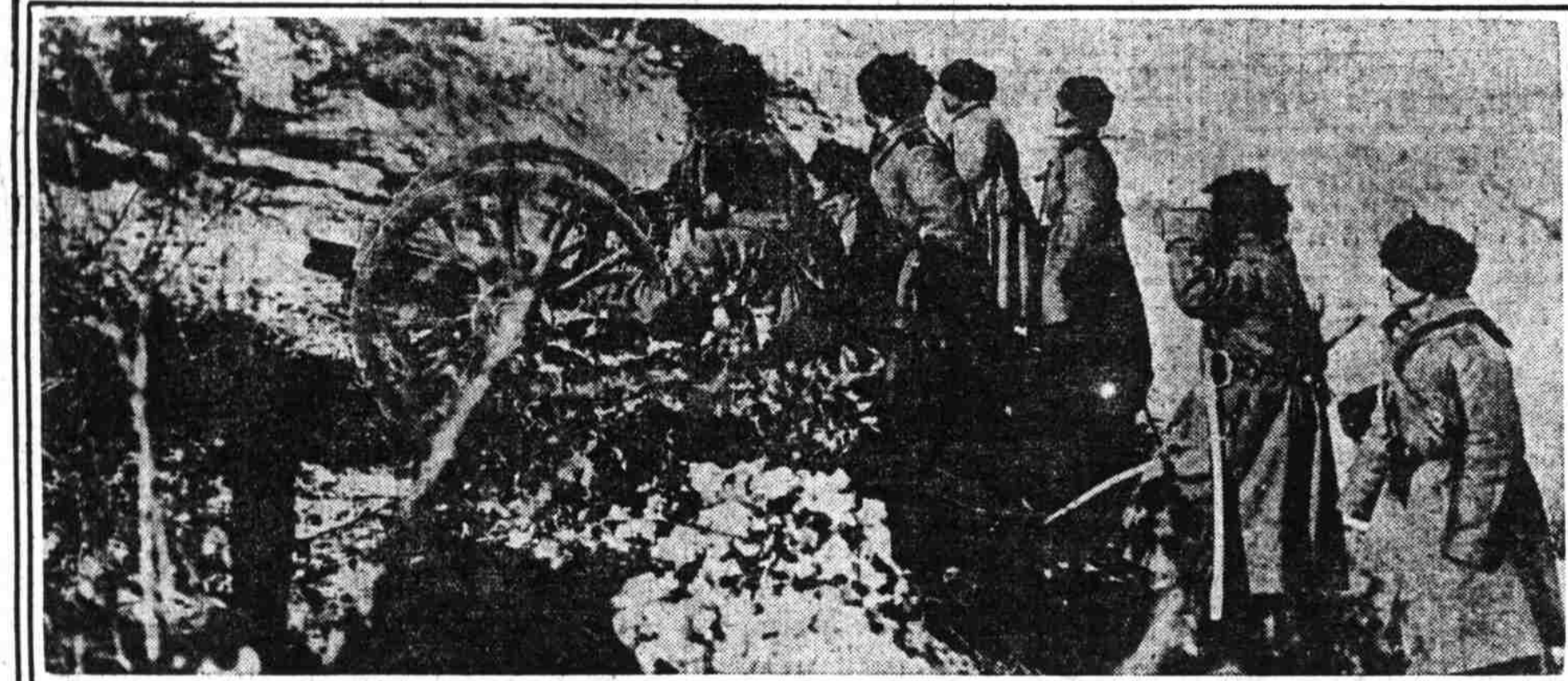
GREAT BRITAIN'S RULER TAKES KEEN INTEREST IN GREAT VOLUNTEER ARMY
