The grade of knight commander of the court of honor and the thirty-third degree are conferred by action of the supreme council only, consisting of 33 active thirty-third degree Masons. There are about 1500 members of the Scottish Rite bodies in Oregon. George F. Moore, a distinguished jurist of Alabama, is sovereign grand commander of the southern jurisdiction. Philip S. Malcolm is sovereign grand inspector general for Oregon.

The lower flaring edge of the coat is also fur bordered. The skirt shows a double line of shirring at the top where it is joined to the girle or basque, as the case may be, and is quite plain except for the fur border on the hem. Smart, close fitting chapeaux are the correct thing for such costume, and this one is in black velour with a fur banding edging the top of the brim.
