

REVOLT IN SOUTHERN CHINA IS IMMINENT, NATIVE SOURCES SAY

Anti-Government Agitators Increase Activities as Result of Yuan's Move.

RESENT LONG-TERM PLAN

Japanese Operations Against Kiao Chau Prevented an Earlier Outbreak Against Government.

(United Press Linked Wire.) Shanghai, Jan. 1.—Signs were multiplying here today that anti-government agitators are preparing for a speedy uprising against President Yuan.

This movement was near culmination at the outbreak of the European war. Then came Japan's operations against Kiao Chau. A large element in China believed this would lead to a clash between the Japanese and Chinese.

The effect was to weld the Chinese factions together for a time. Of late, however, Yuan's opponents have begun to make fresh progress with their propaganda. Probably it would have taken them a good many months to do over again the work which was undone by Japan's attack on the Kiao Chau German, but for President Yuan's action empowering the senate, which he has completely under his thumb, to continue his term indefinitely.

Yuan undoubtedly foresees that this step would crystallize the revolutionists' determination to get rid of him, but presumably he thought he could take it more safely before they had gone so far with their campaign that they would be able to strike at him immediately, in answer to his proclamation.

Clues from well informed native sources suggest that they will not delay long, however.

Yuan, it was thought here, might be strong enough to control the situation in the northern provinces, but it was believed he would shortly face a very serious revolt in southern China.

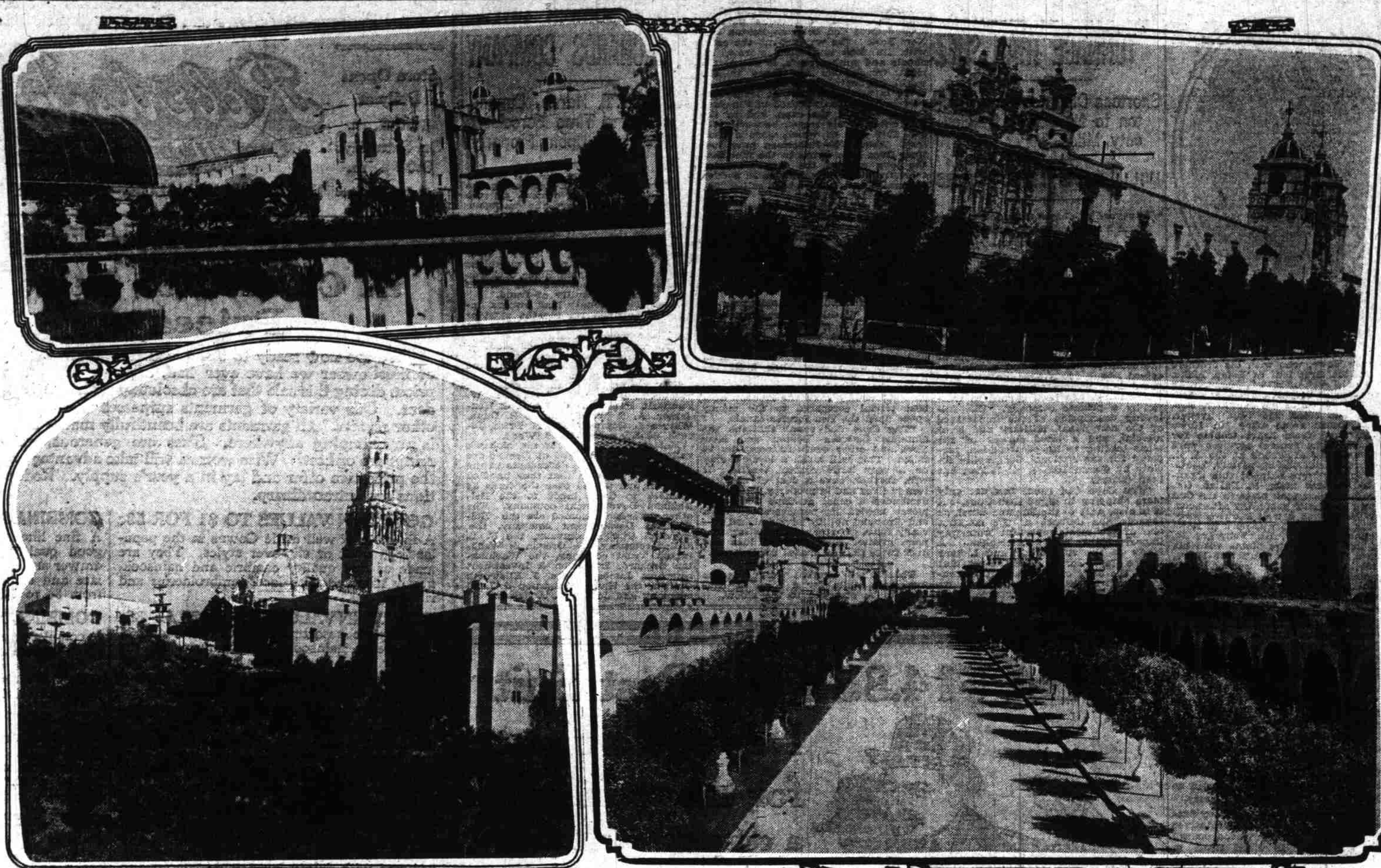

SAN DIEGO FAIR IS OPENED WITH BLAZE OF LIGHT

Magnificent music pavilion and pipe organ and the buildings of the states of California, Washington, Utah, Montana, Nevada, Kansas and New Mexico, and those of the various groups of counties of California were thrown open.

Grounds Opened Last Night. Ceremonies incident to the opening of the exposition were started at 8:30 o'clock last night, the gates having been opened to the public at 7 o'clock. A dinner to press representatives was held at this hour, and all of the great spectacles and amusement features along the isthmus were thrown open to visitors.

Lights were turned on over the magnificent grounds that form the setting in Balboa park for the beautiful Spanish colonial buildings of the exposition, lighting wide vistas that were marveled with the bloom of hundreds of acres of tropical vegetation.

Dedication services of the exposition were begun at 11 o'clock today. Honorable Lyman J. Gage, former secretary of the treasury of the United States, presided and introduced William G. McAdoo, present secretary of the treasury, who spoke for 30 minutes as the representative of President Wilson.

He was followed by Count del Valle de Salazar, representing the king of Spain, and John Barrett, director general of the Pan-American union, representing the governments of South and Central America. These were followed by the governors of the states having part in the San Diego exposition and the mayors of many western cities.

Dedication of the women's building took place at noon, under the auspices of the women's board of the exposition. The banquet of President of the Exposition G. A. Davidson, to distinguished guests, will be served tonight, coincident with the banquet of the women's board.

A procession of decorated automobiles will be a feature this afternoon. At 1 o'clock tomorrow a great military and naval parade will open the day, and at night occurs the official reception of women and the grand carnival on the isthmus, to fittingly end, in joyous revelry, the three days' celebration.

A banquet will be served in honor of the Rosarians and Royal Oaks at the Maryland this evening, and it will be followed by the Rose tournament ball, later in the evening. San Diego and the Panama-California exposition will be visited tomorrow.

Dance Old Year Out. J. R. Patterson was chairman of the Rosarian committee at Pasadena. Down in Southern California, Portlanders and Oaklanders who had joined the Royal Rosarian special met the New Year while the train traveled nearly 60 miles an hour. They danced in the dining car, which had been cleared of its tables.

The Rosarian band serenaded all California from Oakland to Bakersfield. There was a tune for every stop. At Fresno everyone left the train and caked walked on the station platform. Brandishing brilliant electric sparklers, of which some hundreds were burned by the excursionists in their announced determination of lighting up the departure of the old year.

Oregon apples were lavishly distributed among the crowd and a Fresno committee, returning the compliment, quietly left a box of raisins in every seat.

Tea Served at Midnight. A midnight tea was served, Mrs. J. E. Werlein and Mrs. E. E. Coovort poured, Mrs. R. A. Thompson and Mrs. Robert Krohn served, Mrs. J. W. Tift, Mrs. O. M. Clark, Mrs. W. H. ASHLAND'S '400' DOES NEW YEAR'S FOX TROT BY LIGHT OF CANDLES

Fire Destroys California-Oregon Power Sub-Station, But Joy Is Unconfined.

ENGINE WHISTLES SHRIEK

Municipal Hydro-Electric Plant Will Carry Load Temporarily, at Least.

Ashland, Or., Jan. 1.—The California-Oregon Power company's substation, a mile from Ashland, across Bear creek, burned to the ground between 10 o'clock and midnight last night, the cement walls crumbling in the fierce heat.

Ashland's chemical engine was powerless to subdue the flames, and the location of the plant rendered city water pressure useless. The fire was electrical in its origin, and the danger of live wires made fighting it extremely hazardous. The direct cause of the fire is as yet undetermined. The building was of reinforced concrete, and supposed to be indestructible. Quantities of oil added to the fierceness of the fire.

The station was built two years ago, and was equipped with the most modern and costly apparatus, so the company sustained a big loss. Various business places were left in darkness. The Western Union Telegraph office entered the new year with candles on its desks. The vining theatre was entertaining a big audience with pictures of a lady in a den of lions. She was left to fight them in the dark, with the audience in full retreat. At the Elks' hall, the annual New Year's ball was in progress. Four hundred of the elite of Ashland finished the affair with candles set in tomato cans.

Ashland's municipal hydro-electric plant is still doing business at the old stand lighting most of the homes and business houses of the city. It has all the load it can carry, but will probably have to arrange to serve new patrons, as the California-Oregon company cannot serve its patrons until a new station is rushed up and equipped. Pandemonium broke loose here at midnight, every engine in the Southern Pacific roundhouse being under a full head of steam to welcome the New Year. Church bells added to the din, while fire crackers and horns and other noise making apparatus helped to create bedlam. Five hundred Ashland citizens went to Medford to take part in the celebration there.
