

COST OF ROADS AND HIGHWAYS SHOWN IN NINE MONTH REPORT

Four Counties Also Announce Expenditures for Diking District Work in That Time

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Jan. 1.—The cost of roads and highways in the state of Oregon from a year ago today to September 30, totalled \$3,369,788.78, and of bridges, \$259,617.80, with only Curry county not reported, according to figures given out by Insurance Commissioner Ferguson today. The figures were secured through the state accountancy department. In addition to the cost of roads, highways and bridges, the following counties have disbursed funds for diking districts: Umatilla, \$22,160.27; Malheur, \$18,796.59; Clatsop, \$2010.94; Klamath, \$1430.75.

Dexter Rice, New Douglas Senator

Governor West Appoints County Judge to Place Made Vacant by Resignation of George Neuner.

Salem, Or., Jan. 1.—Governor West today appointed Dexter Rice of Roseburg, state senator from Douglas county, to succeed George Neuner, who resigned to take an appointment as district attorney of Douglas county. Rice is a Democrat. He has been county judge of Douglas county.

There is an apparent clash between the constitution and state law as to whether the governor shall appoint or call a special election to choose a successor to a senator. The constitution has the following in regard to the question:

"When during a recess of the legislative assembly a vacancy shall happen in any office, the appointment to which is vested in the legislative assembly, or when at any time a vacancy shall have occurred in any other state office or in the office of judge of superior court, the governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment, which shall expire when a successor shall have been elected and qualified."

The state law says the governor shall call an election to fill a vacancy in the legislative assembly.

No Money But Business Goes On

State Appropriations Expired Last Night, and, According to Law, No Expense May Be Incurred.

Salem, Or., Jan. 1.—Although the law specifically provides that it shall be unlawful for any of the state officials or trustees, managers, directors, superintendents or boards, of commissioners of the state of Oregon to create a deficiency, incur liability, or to expend a greater sum than is appropriated by the legislative assembly for the use of any institution or department, it was the consensus of opinion at the capital today that business of the state will be carried on as usual until the legislature meets and provides an appropriation.

The appropriations for the biennial period of 1913-1914 expired last night. No payments of any kind can be made until new appropriations are made. The situation is just the same as in previous years, with the exception that it is now unlawful to incur indebtedness.

In the past employees of the various departments have not been paid until new appropriations were made, and there will be no change this year. State officials expressed the opinion that no hardship would be worked by the new law which will necessarily have to be ignored.

WELLESLEY \$2,000,000 FUND IS RAISED

Boston, Jan. 1.—Guarantees of the restoration of Wellesley college, pledges amounting to \$1,250,000 for recently damaged by fire, were as-

sured last night, according to announcement, so that the re-endowment fund will receive \$750,000 promised by the Rockefeller foundation. Bishop Lawrence, president of the college trustees, said the fund of \$2,000,000 would be available as soon as all pledges were realized upon.

Officials of the Rockefeller foundation made December 31 the limit for the raising of this fund upon which the Rockefeller contribution depended. Alumnae of the college all over the country began a campaign to raise the amount both by individual contributions and the holding of bazaars, balls and almost every other method of raising money.

Portland's Wellesley club, of which Mrs. Vincent Cook is president and Mrs. Lewis A. McArthur vice president, is composed of about 16 members. These contributed personally to the fund for the re-endowment of their alma mater and several hundred dollars was secured in this way. No effort was made here to secure funds from general sources, though in other places, where there are more alumnae, financial campaigns were resorted to.

Ellen Fitz Pendleton, president of Wellesley, visited Portland about a year ago and was extensively entertained while here.

Salem, Or., Jan. 1.—Governor West yesterday made it plain to the Tacoma News that he had no intention of taking a "joyous journey" or "lovely vacation at public expense" as had been intimated by the News, following the publication of notice that the governor had been invited by the Belgian

The committee based its request on the ground that it would probably secure more liberal contributions if it should be known that the governor would personally see that the goods were delivered into the right hands. In reply to the News' article, West sent the following last evening:
