

ROADMASTER YEON MAKES HIS ANNUAL REPORT TO BOARD

Total Money Spent Excepting on Columbia Highway, Amounts to \$279,882.

RECOMMENDATIONS MADE

Paving of Sandy, Bass Line, Powell Valley, Foster, Canyon, Columbia and Linton Roads Favored.

The total amount of money spent by Multnomah county for the year just closed on bridges and highways, exclusive of the Columbia highway, was \$279,882. The most of this was for the maintenance of the system, there being scarcely any new construction.

According to the annual report of Roadmaster John B. Yeon to the board of county commissioners, the expenditures were as follows:

District No. 1, \$188,102.69; district No. 2, \$31,259.52.

The cost of oiling roads was \$19,292.42.

Other items were: Hard surfacing Riverside drive, construction and surveying, \$12,959.56; surveying various roads, \$2,166.92; painting and various expenses, Sandy river bridge, \$13,088.73; roadmaster's office, general overhead expense, \$15,132.80; motorcycle, \$11.23.

The total cost of auto trucks operation was \$7,905.03 against which is charged \$7,206.25 for hauling rock and distributing oil, leaving a balance of \$698.78.

The cost of road rollers operation was \$1,179.96 less a charge against the roads for rolling of \$811.46.

Roadmaster's Recommendations.

The cost of operation of the Kellogg Butte quarry was \$21,858.93 less a charge against the roads of \$17,482.54 for rock.

The cost of Linton quarry was \$9,774.15 less a charge against the roads of \$5,948.09 for rock.

The cost of the Taylor Ferry quarry was \$10,174.47 less a charge against the roads of \$5,948.09 for rock.

In his report, Roadmaster Yeon shows in detail the expenditure made on each road with the cost of labor, material, superintendence and depreciation.

He recommends that there be no more macadam construction on the main arterial roads of the county which should be handled as soon as possible so as to reduce the cost of upkeep. To provide money for hard surfacing he suggests a bond issue by the county instead of the district assessment plan, which he regards as inequitable and unjust to the abutting property owner.

He further recommends that the width of the main arterial roads and roads should be not less than 18 feet.

Total Mileage 65 1/2.

His recommendation as to the roads to be paved is possible in the following: Sandy road from city limits to Sandy river; Columbia highway from Sandy river to county line; line road from city limits to Troutdale; cross country road from city limits to Greaham; Foster road from city limits to county line; Canyon road from city limits to the line; Linton road from city limits to Linton.

The total mileage would be 65 1/2 miles.

Canadian Speakers Coming to Portland

Norman E. Rankin of Calgary, secretary of the Western Irrigation Association, also will be present and tell of the success of late development projects.

The Canadian government is keenly interested in the work being done along reclamation lines in the states is indicated by the fact that, these same distinguished authorities north of the line, the Honorable Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture for the province of Alberta, will be one of the speakers here.

Possibly the largest attendance of delegates from any one locality will be central Oregon's contingent, which will arrive early Wednesday morning in a special Oregon train.

More than 100 people from Crook, Jefferson and Malheur counties will be on the special.

Husband Helpless While Wife Dies

Centralia, Wash., Jan. 2.—Mrs. Alvina Wagner, an old resident of Centralia, died in her home in the north end of the city Thursday while her husband, almost a helpless invalid, sat alone in another part of the house. The discovery was made by O. A. Flinders, a neighbor, who does the chores for the aged couple once a day. Wagner, who had the remains of a breakfast before him, asked Flinders to call his wife, who he said had not been in to see him for several hours. It was then that the woman's body was discovered. She had died as she was sitting at table. Mrs. Wagner was 65 years of age and a native of Germany.

It is believed the husband will not survive the shock of his wife's death.

WOULD READJUST FEES

Lumber Company Plant Taken Over

Operation of Sawmill Will Soon Begin at Cherry Grove, Or.; to Build Big Mill Later.

W. L. Haskell, of Montreal, Canada, and John M. Carpenter, of Los Angeles, both former Pennsylvania lumber men, and L. B. Menefee of this city have taken over the property of the Lovgren Lumber company at Cherry Grove, Or., and will soon begin operating the sawmill with a view of in the near future building a large mill and planed by A. Lovgren, who started the project a few years ago.

Messrs. Haskell and Carpenter left here a few days ago after closing the deal for the property, on which it is understood Mr. Menefee held an option and will return soon from their respective homes to locate at Cherry Grove, as both will be actively connected with the operation of the property.

Included in the transaction is the mill, mill pond and a large tract of timber, the railroad from Cherry Grove to the Southern Pacific line, and a part of the townsite, which was established by Mr. Lovgren.

It is said that the first important work to be done will be to construct a logging railroad about four miles in length that will lead from the timber to the mill.

The amount involved in the transaction is placed at about \$400,000, although the parties directly involved have not given out the figures or the terms of purchase. The mill has been idle more than a year.

Invitations have been issued by the club and the Rotary club, and the following named organizations are expected to attend: Portland Commercial club, Portland Chamber of Commerce, Portland Principles association, East Side Business Men's club, Portland Realty board, Transportation club, and other organizations.

It is expected that the meeting will result in the exchange of ideas that will work out successfully for the general good of the city and state. More union in the work in hand will be the chief aim. Since the omission and commission of the past will be pointed out and remedies suggested. It will be a big get-together meeting, a sort of stock taking occasion.

Ring of Smugglers Believed Broken Up

Two Chinese, One Picked Up Here, and One in Seattle, Believed to Be Members of Gang.

Government officials believe they broke up an opium smuggling gang, whose operations were extensive, when they arrested Chin Chung here last Monday and Sing Lee, another Chin, Monday, at Seattle. According to Chief Customs Inspector McGrath, who made the arrest of Chin Chung here, the Chinese had been smuggling opium through the United States via the Mexican border line.

Sing Lee was arrested at Seattle as he was about to step onto the train bound for British Columbia. He had several cans of opium. Chin Chung was taken at 66 Second street. He also had several cans and jars in his possession. Sing Lee's headquarters while in Portland were 66 Second street also.

These two men are believed to be linked with a ring of smugglers who were operating from the California line north to British Columbia. Further arrests are expected in the same case.

Big Rabbit Drive Is Being Organized

Large Crowd of Sportsmen Plan to Leave Here for Central Oregon on January 17.

Planning the biggest rabbit drive of the winter, a party of Portland hunters is outlining a trip to Madras for January 17. It is expected that at least 300 sportsmen from the city and elsewhere will form the "circle" which will close in on the thousands of jackrabbits that infest the central Oregon plains.

Employees of the North Bank traffic department started the project and are interesting members of the Portland Rod and Gun club, as well as the Madras club. Hunters from the county and a delegation from Astoria and Hillsboro will attend.

Withycombe Favors The Lesser Bond

Salem, Or., Jan. 2.—Governor West today received a telegram from Dr. Withycombe stating that he thought a bond of \$250,000 filed by the state treasurer would be sufficient for the protection of the state's interests. Governor West had suggested a bond of \$500,000, but was in proportion to the amount of money in the treasurer's hands, and was willing that the governor-elect should decide the question.

CARRANZAS ONLY SIX MILES FROM THE CITY OF MEXICO

General Jesus Carranza Is Captured at Salina Cruz by Zapata's Troops.

PEACE MEET POSTPONED

Severe Fighting Taking Place South-east of Puebla Between Carranzas and Carranza's Forces.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, Jan. 2.—Wireless dispatches received at the Mexican constitutional assembly here today said the large force of Carranzas marching on Mexico City had reached Apam, 60 miles from the capital. The dispatch added that large numbers of Villistas were resisting General Obregon.

Reports of the progress of Carranzas troops were brought to Vera Cruz by Captain Miles, a Carranzas aviator. The dispatches received here also said that the Carranzas movement on Puebla was scheduled to begin at daybreak today. It was also declared that General Robelo, a Carranzas commander, occupied San Luis Potosi yesterday.

The capture at Salina Cruz of General Jesus Carranza, brother of Venustiano Carranza, was reported in dispatches received at the state department this afternoon. Severe fighting was said to be in progress south-east of Puebla, between Carranzas and Carranza's forces.

Wireless reports from the west coast of Mexico said that Carranzas had been driven from Tepic City and Apacotepec.

American Consul General Stillman wired that an attempt was made yesterday in Mexico City by the "peace convention" faction to hold a convention there. It was impossible for all the delegates to attend, many of them being detained in the Pacific, but the convention was postponed until Monday, when the credentials and proxies of the delegates will be examined.

Change in Grade Of Street Sought

Owner of Property Declares Proposed Holgate Street Viaduct Would Injure Factory Site.

Contending that the building of the Holgate street viaduct from East Eighteenth to East Twenty-first streets would make his property practically useless as a factory site, Michael Reuter, of the Portland Metal Works, appeared before the city council Thursday asking that provision be made for a change in grade of the proposed structure.

Mr. Reuter stated that his company had purchased property on Holgate street for the purpose of building a factory, but that construction work was being delayed by the outcome of the proposed viaduct plans. The city council took his objections under advisement.

Patience of Wilson With Great Britain Was Severely Tried

It Is Said President's Forbearance Was at an End When Note Was Sent.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, Jan. 2.—"Exhausted patience" with England precipitated America's shipping protest. It was learned from a reliable source today that President Wilson's forbearance had reached the breaking point and that he reluctantly felt compelled to protest.

The formal note was the culmination of a series of informal protests. The British foreign office either temporarily or entirely disregarded the informal complaints and the only alternative for the United States then, it was said, was to protest vigorously.

A state department official said today that a score of complaints had been received from the British government in London. In some cases expressions of regret for the situation were received, but they came informally and through Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador. So far as the London foreign office was concerned, it was said that most of America's complaints were ignored completely.

Solicitor Johnson of the state department said this afternoon that he hoped soon to complete and publish the list of American ships which had been molested by the Japanese. He said the stand taken by the administration, citing legal precedents.

The Japanese embassy was not informed whether any American ships had been detained in the Pacific, but diplomatic authorities say there has been no necessity for Japan to detain American merchantmen. It was also declared that Austria and Germany could not ship supplies from the Pacific coast because of the great distance to German and Austrian ports and the necessity of passing through the Russian army were enlisting in the Japanese embassy here. It was said that if stories that Russia was obtaining Japanese guns were true, it was a commercial question entirely. It also was maintained that reports that Japan did not intend to surrender Kiaochow to China after the war should not be taken seriously.

Barton Postoffice Again Burglarized

Oregon City, Or., Jan. 2.—For the second time in two weeks the little general merchandise store and postoffice at Barton, Ore., was burglarized. The money till in the postoffice was forced open and a few dollars in small change and stamps taken from it. As in the previous burglary, not an article which could be used to identify the robbers was taken. Sheriff Mass was notified at an early hour and relayed the information to the postoffice authorities in Portland. The circumstances surrounding both the "jobs" might indicate they were done by persons familiar with the locality.

Books Are Being Exploited.

John B. Coffey, county clerk, has been appointed temporary secretary of the Loyal Order of Moose in this city pending expiring of the books of R. S. Beatty, who has occupied that position since last March. Officers of the Loyal Order have been to the best of their ability and the shortage indicated amounts to several hundred dollars. The friends of Mr. Beatty are of the opinion that the shortage will prove to be about \$100, and be due to the ex-secretary's kindly nature in loaning small sums to members of the order, extending relief to others in distress.

Keystone Case Co. Not a Trust.

Philadelphia, Jan. 2.—An opinion denying the government's petition for dissolution of the Keystone Case Company as a trust, for alleged violation of the Sherman law, was handed down here today by United States District Judge McPherson. His opinion, however, enjoined the company from carrying out alleged boycott methods.

French Success at Steinbach Denied

German Claim French Assaults Upon the Alsatian Town Have Been Rejected—German Progress Claimed.

Berlin, via Wireless to London, Jan. 2.—The slaughter of German non-combatants by the systematic bombardment of villages behind the Kaiser's lines was charged by the war office today against the French. At one place it was said 50 persons were killed.

French successes at Steinbach and in its vicinity were denied. Instead, it was declared the Gallie assaults in this district had been repulsed.

Substantial progress by the German forces was also claimed in the Argonne forest, north of Verdun and between Villy and Apremont. The French resisted these advances, it was stated, with a series of counterattacks, which were vigorously repulsed, with the capture of 33 French officers and about 100 men.

The Kaiser's troops were said to have taken the entire forest of Brules and to hold all the allies' trenches there.

Second Day Bigger Than Diego's First

City and Exposition Grounds Crowded With Guests to See Close of Special Opening Festivities.

San Diego, Cal., Jan. 2.—The unexpected happened in San Diego today, when the closing of the first of the Panama exposition opening festivities. Instead of decreasing, the visiting thousands increased, and today the city was overflowing with guests, who crowded the streets and cars and the exposition grounds.

Fully 50,000 people cheered the military and naval parade this morning as it passed through the streets and wound up the hills to the exposition. It was one of the most inspiring spectacles in the city's history.

The celebration closes tonight with a big carnival on the isthmus.

December Was Dry Month.

December, 1914, was the driest December for this city since records were kept since 1876, according to the figures on file at the United States weather bureau. Only 2.56 inches of rain fell during the entire month, the normal for the month being 7.34 inches. Through the warm weather both before and after the long cold spell experienced during the middle of the month, the mean temperature for the month did not fall as low as was expected.

Dorothy Arnold Rumor Started

Diary Found in Los Angeles Said to Have Been Written by Long Lost New York Heiress.

Los Angeles, Jan. 2.—Rumors that Dorothy Arnold, New York heiress, who disappeared in 1910, is in Los Angeles, were revived today by the finding in Sunset boulevard of a diary which may have been kept by the young woman during the years she has been missing. The diary was found by a Japanese servant of Dustin Farnum, actor, and is now in the latter's possession.

The alleged chronicle of the girl's life tells of four years spent on the Chinese coast and contains comments upon the life there of unfortunate American girls.

"But I am not weak; I am strong," the following entry says, "and there is always the muddy Whang Poo."

In addition to personal matters, the diary contains many New York addresses and telephone numbers. It also makes many references to members of the Arnold family and their friends.

There were several letters in a packet which contained the diary, and all were signed "Dorothy" or "D. Arnold." One was addressed to Miss Mary Lyons, 450 State street, Washington. It said at the gathering, Dr. Arnold, would reach her.

Daly Wants New Transfer Simplified

WAR SUMMARY BY J. W. T. MASON

Former European Manager for the United Press.

New York, Jan. 2.—In the formidable, the British lost Friday their first capital vessel sunk in the English channel in 1914, though the former war began. Arrest Follows Disturbance Which Results at a Gathering to Celebrate New Year's.

For interrupting a New Year's party that his wife was giving for several women friends and threatening to kill everyone present at the gathering, Dr. A. T. Kelly, optician, residing at 200 Graham avenue, was bound over to the grand jury this morning.

Mrs. Kelly testified that her husband on numerous occasions had threatened her life, and that yesterday he started to carry out the threat. He made the statement then, she said, that capital punishment having been abolished, he had nothing to fear. He threatened them with an open knife, she asserted.

The women who were present at the party testified against Kelly. The latter, in his own defense, said he was intoxicated and remembered nothing of what happened. Kelly was arrested while the disturbance was in progress by patrolman Odale, who answered a hurry-up call made to the police station.

WELL KNOWN ACTOR AND FORMER STAGE MANAGER HERE, DEAD

Billy Bernard Victim of Stroke of Paralysis in New York Where He Recently Lived.

STRICKEN TWO YEARS AGO

Member of the First Stock Company at the Baker Theatre—Native of Auckland, New Zealand.

Will Bernard, well known in Portland, where for a number of years he was stage director of the Baker theatre, is dead in New York, according to telegraphic information received this morning by M. R. Spaulding, secretary of the "Elks" club. Mr. Bernard died as the result of paralysis. He was first stricken nearly two years ago while on a vacation trip. A number of months he was a patient in a neurological institute in New York.

Mr. Bernard was a member of the first stock company at the Baker theatre. He usually played the heavy part. He left Portland at the end of the season of 1913 and went to Vancouver, B. C., and from there to New York to stage a production. He was born in Auckland, N. Z., in 1884, and leaves a widow and daughter, Dorothy Bernard, who is winning a name for herself as a leading woman in the east.

GRAND JURY IS PLEASED

Of their own accord the members of the grand jury this afternoon made a statement upholding the use of notice served by District Attorney Evans and his deputies on persons under investigation before they are taken to the grand jury room to testify in their own behalf, and emphasizing their appreciation of the fairness of the district attorney's office. The statement is a rare one, and charges made by Circuit Judge McGinn that unfair methods were used to secure confessions and evidence during the trial of the grand jury on a charge growing out of indictments against members of the alleged "arson trust."
