

WOMEN WARNED NOT TO GO TO CALIFORNIA SEARCHING FOR WORK

State Immigration and Housing Committee Says There Is Over-Supply Now.

TEN APPLICANTS TO A JOB

Department Stores Flooded With Applications for Work; Many Go Expecting Work During the Fair.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Jan. 7.—"Women, if you are looking for work, don't come to California," is the warning sounded by the California Immigration and Housing commission after a thorough investigation of conditions existing among unemployed women of the state. The commission asserts that labor conditions among women have never been so bad in San Francisco as they are this winter.

Investigation showed that 10,000 women have filed applications with the Panama-Pacific Exposition for employment, while the number of positions that will be open to women is limited to 1000. The applicants hail from every section of the country, and many of them, without waiting for a favorable reply, have already arrived in San Francisco and have swelled the ranks of unemployed women here.

One big San Francisco department store received 177 personal applications from women for work from October 14 to December 4, 1914. Of this number, 110 were made by eastern women who are in San Francisco and who are in need. Another large store here had so many applications from cities outside California that a circular letter was sent broadcast advising young girls and women not to come to this state in the hope of securing employment.

"Our investigations showed," said the commission's report, "that there are between 15,000 and 20,000 unemployed women, stenographers and office assistants in California. The situation in other lines is equally bad. There has been a great influx for months of women and girls to San Francisco owing to an impression that there will be a large demand for women in all lines of employment during the exposition. This impression is erroneous."

RECIPE FOR MAKING 'MONEY' FOUND UPON ALLEGED WIFE-BEATER

Charles W. Jarvis Searched at Police Station, Yields a Clue to Further Discovery.

Eugene, Or., Jan. 7.—After he had been arrested for assault and battery upon his wife, there was found in the pockets of Charles W. Jarvis of Eugene a recipe for the making of counterfeit money. His house was searched and the officers found a complete outfit for the manufacture of spurious dollars.

Jarvis, it is charged, deserted his family here for years ago and his whereabouts until a few days ago were unknown by the officers. He beat his wife Tuesday night, it is alleged, and she swore out a warrant for his arrest. He was arrested on the street late yesterday and at the jail the recipe was found.

Deputy Sheriff George Croner and District Attorney J. M. Devers searched the house and found the counterfeit outfit, besides a quantity of materials used in making the coins. None of the coins have been located.

Jarvis is in the county jail and the United States marshal's office in Portland has been notified of the discovery.

Barber Shoots Woman.

MANY SEEK JOBS

Sheriff Hurlburt Faces Stack of Applications and Indorsements.

Sheriff Tom Hurlburt, prepared shortly after he took office Monday, to tackle a mass weighing about 10 pounds which contains a batch of applications for positions. The formidable looking package reposes on top of the desk in the sheriff's office. It is carefully wrapped and labeled. The new sheriff knows what the package contains because he has already gone through it hurriedly.

"I have a big job on my hands in checking up on all those applications," said Sheriff Hurlburt. "There are not only personal letters but recommendations from friends of the applicants. In several instances the endless chain of letter writing seems to have been practiced. First, the application was made, then by prearrangement, the friends of the seeker, began writing personal letters to me praising the applicant."

"One petition in the package is a curiosity. It bears the names of scores of citizens indorsing the applicant," Mr. Hurlburt says that in a few days he will likely announce some changes in addition to those already made.

JAPANESE ACCUSED OF AIDING PLOTTERS AGAINST REPUBLIC

Foes of President Yuan Shi Kai Harbored in Japan, Where His Power Feared.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Shanghai, Jan. 7.—Supporters here of President Yuan Shi Kai are openly though not officially, accusing the Japanese of being behind much of the native dissatisfaction with the present Peking regime.

Yuan, they say, is disliked at Tokio because he seems likely to establish too strong a government for the mickado to dominate. They point out that such men as Dr. Sun Yat Sen, when driven into exile for conspiring against the president, have invariably been welcomed in Japan despite the fact that their views are such as the Japanese authorities will not tolerate, if they know of them, among the Japanese themselves.

plotting in safe refuges in Tokio, Kobe, Nagasaki and elsewhere, all protests from Peking that Japan is being used by agitators against the Chinese government for the development of their plans meeting with nothing but bland disregard.

Aside from protection and moral support, Tokio officialdom is declared in all probability to be lending financial assistance to the revolutionists where it seems necessary. If outside conditions do not render such action undesirable, Yuan's friends maintain that Japan will be extremely likely to attempt securing a further grip on China by actual intervention in the event of another revolution.

Should it appear that other powers would not countenance this, it is predicted that the Japanese government will do its utmost to substitute for President Yuan's strong rule a regime they themselves will be able to manage.

Suing Postal for Youngster's Death

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 7.—John H. Smith, as administrator of the estate of Oscar Smith, has filed a suit in the

circuit court here asking damages in the sum of \$1500 from the Postal Telegraph company, and G. C. McGilvray of Canyonville, as an employer, for the death of Oscar Smith. The complaint alleges that during the month of April or May, 1914, McGilvray piled a number of telegraph poles on an unclosed lot near the railroad tracks and that on May 31 Oscar Smith, aged 12 years, climbed on them with the result that they fell, injuring him to such an extent that he died on June 5 of that year.

Elevator Drops 7 Stories; Ten Hurt

Berkeley Civil Engineer Probably Fatally Injured in Crash of Lift in California-Pacific Building.

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—Ten persons were injured this afternoon, one probably fatally, when an elevator in the California-Pacific building at Sutter and Montgomery streets, fell seven stories. Harold Fitting, a civil engineer of Berkeley, was reported dying

at the Harbor hospital, of concussion of the brain.

The others most seriously injured were: Allen Wisholt, Oakland, fractured ankle; J. W. Fitting, Alameda, both legs broken; Earl Frassy, San Francisco, contusions of the back and broken left foot; Paul McDonald, San Francisco, fractured skull; H. Cohn, San Francisco, right leg and left arm broken; W. Easton, Santa Maria, both knees broken and left hand crushed; Edward W. Howard, San Francisco, both legs broken; Chester Stubb, San Francisco, both legs broken.

Some failure in the mechanism of the elevator was responsible for the accident. The elevator, car and shaft

were inspected last Friday and pronounced safe.

Alleged Smugglers Indicted.
Los Angeles, Jan. 7.—Five persons are under federal indictment here today, accused of conspiracy in connection with a recent alleged smuggling operation that resulted in their capture at San Pedro. They are J. B. Miller, Juan Marino, Sam Shang, Jew Sing and Ow Kum Chiu. Federal agents represented that they had discovered the details of a smuggling plot which was planned to bring Chinese into the United States from Mexico, in which the defendants participated.
