Wappenstein Gets Complete Pardon

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 8.—Final pardon was granted yesterday by Governor W. H. C. Wappenstein, former chief of police, Seattle, convicted July, 1911, and sentenced to three to 10 years for receiving a bribe. December 19, 1913, Wappenstein was conditionally pardoned, on the agreement that he keep away from Seattle and live on his farm. This condition has been complied with. The custom is to grant a full pardon after one year of conditional pardon.
